This study/plan will complete the needed transportation and land use planning for an approximately 15 mi.2 near the BNSF Intermodal Facility. Key components of the study/plan are: (1) an update to the Johnson County Arterial Roadway Network Plan with recommendations and capital program phasing for additional transportation system improvements; (2) identification and analysis of issues associated with the potential alignment of U.S. 56 along 199th Street from Edgerton to I-35; (3) a bicycle/pedestrian trail plan/concept plan for Johnson County Parks District land in the area with connections between Edgerton, Gardner, and Hillsdale Lake in Miami County; (4) a Safe Routes to Schools Plan for Nike Elementary; (5) a land use component testing alternative land use scenarios using travel demand modeling and highway capacity analysis software to ensure that planned developments will not exceed the capacity of the transportation system; and (6) a natural resource component with BMPs (MARC Eco-Logical) to protect Hillsdale Lake and JOCO Parkland as development occurs.

Notice of Intent to Establish a New Motor Vehicle Dealer License

Notice has been received from GPI KS-SH Inc., Shawnee Mission Hyundai of its intent to establish a new and used vehicle dealership inclusive of selling Hyundai franchised vehicles at 7050 W. Frontage Road, Merriam, Kansas.

Pursuant to K.S.A. 8-2430(a)(5), any existing new motor vehicle dealer may protest the proposed establishment of the new Hyundai dealership, GPI KS-SH Inc., Shawnee Mission Hyundai, at 7050 W. Frontage Road, Merriam, Kansas, if that existing new motor vehicle dealer has a franchise agreement for the same line-make vehicle as that which is to be sold or offered for sale by GPI KS-SH Inc., Shawnee Mission Hyundai, at 7050 W. Frontage Road, Merriam, Kansas, and provided that the existing new motor vehicle dealer is physically located such that its relevant market area, as defined in K.S.A. 8-2430(e), includes the location where the new Hyundai dealership will be located.

Pursuant to K.S.A. 8-2430(a), any petition or complaint by any dealer with standing to protest must be filed with the Director of Vehicles within 30 days of this notice. Opinion No. 2012-01

Written February 15, 2012, to Krista Engel, Kansas Department on Aging, Topeka.

Synopsis: While the KanCare contracts will consist of both competitive bid as well as negotiated components, a team evaluator will not approve or disapprove the contract, or provide significant factual or specific information, advice or recommendations in relation to the negotiated terms of the contract, and thus will not “participate in the making of the contract” with the successful vendor as that term is used in K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 46-233(a)(2). Consequently, a team evaluator member is not prohibited under the state level conflict of interest laws from future employment with any of the selected KanCare vendors.

Cited herein: K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 46-233.

Dear Ms. Engel:

This opinion is in response to your letter dated January 20, 2012, wherein you request an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission concerning the application of the State Governmental Ethics Laws, K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* We note at the outset that the Commission’s jurisdiction is limited to the applicability of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and the Commission’s opinion does not address whether some other statutory system, common law theory, or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry.

Factual Statement

You inform the Commission that you are currently employed by the Kansas Department on Aging in an unclassified position. In this position you are required to participate in the KanCare RFP (request for proposal) bid reviews as a team evaluator member. The responsibilities of a team evaluator in reviewing KanCare RFPs consist of first, becoming familiar with assigned RFP requirements, and then reviewing the submitted bids against those assigned sections of the RFP. A team evaluator evaluates, *i.e.*, makes a judgment, whether the bid meets the requirements. All of the team evaluators’ comments are then submitted to the team co-leader who compiles the comments into a document that is submitted to the team leader. That person compiles all comments from all teams which are then submitted to the project director, who then forwards the comments to the Procurement Negotiation Committee (PNC). By statute¹ the PNC is comprised of the following persons or their designee: (1) the Secretary of the Department of Administration; (2) the Director of Purchases; and (3) the chief administrative officer of the state agency desiring to make the procurement, which in the case of the KanCare contract will be the Secretary of the Department of Health and Environment.

Based on information provided online concerning the KanCare RFP, the contract or contracts will be combined competitive bid/negotiated contracts.² Additionally, Department of Administration personnel inform that once the team evaluators submit their comments, their role is concluded. Any negotiation that may subsequently occur will be conducted by the PNC, with technical or subject

matter expertise provided by the team leaders and/or co-leaders.

Question

Within this context, you ask whether a team evaluator member would be prohibited under the state level conflict of interest laws from future employment with any of the selected KanCare vendors.

Analysis and Opinion

The issue you raise, while fact specific, is controlled by K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 46-233(a)(2) which in pertinent part provides:

[W]henver any individual has participated as a state officer or employee in the making of any contract with any person or business, such individual shall not accept employment with such person or business as an employee, independent contractor or subcontractor until two years after performance of the contract is completed or until two years after the individual terminates employment as a state office or employee, whichever is sooner.³

To be “[s]ubstantially involved in the preparation or participate in the making of a contract” means:

having approved or disapproved a contract or having provided significant factual or specific information or advice or recommendations in relation to the negotiated terms of the contract.⁴

This prohibition against future employment by a state officer or employee, however, does not apply to “[c]ontracts let after competitive bidding has been advertised for by published notice.”⁵

In 2000 the Commission recognized that when K.S.A. 46-233 was initially written, only two types of state contracts existed: (1) pure negotiated contracts, commonly referred to as sole source contracts, and (2) pure competitive bid contracts, also known as sealed bid/lowest bid contracts. Since enactment of that statute, a third type of state contract was developed: a competitively bid/negotiated contract where the contract is let pursuant to a competitive bid procedure, but subsequently each individual bidder may be negotiated with individually. Due to this development, the Commission made the following determination in relation to K.S.A. 46-233:

[A]n individual who is substantially involved in the preparation of a pure competitive bid contract or whose involvement in a contract is limited to the competitive bid portion of a competitively bid/negotiated contract, will not be subject to the prohibitions contained in K.S.A. [1999 Supp.] 46-233(a) and (b). Conversely, an individual who is substantially involved in the preparation of a pure negotiated contract or who is substantially involved in the preparation of the negotiated portion of a competitively bid/negotiated type of contract will be subject to the prohibitions contained in K.S.A. [1999 Supp.] 46-233(a) and (b).⁶

Conclusion

While the KanCare contracts will consist of both competitive bid components as well as negotiated components, a team evaluator will not approve or disapprove the contract, or provide significant factual or specific information, advice or recommendations in relation to the negotiated terms of the contract, and thus will not “participate in the making of the contract” with the successful

vendor as that term is used in K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 46-233(a)(2). Consequently, a team evaluator member is not prohibited under the state level conflict of interest laws from future employment with any of the selected Kan-Care vendors.

Opinion No. 2012-02

Written February 15, 2012, to Dennis M. Wilson, Executive Director, Kansas Lottery, Topeka.

Synopsis: A Kansas Lottery employee may sign up for a casino's "players' club" on the same basis as any member of the general public. Thus, any non-gaming discount or other member benefits would be provided to the employee solely due to his or her membership in the casino's "players club," not because of the employee's official position, and may be accepted.

Assuming that the rules of the "players' club" allow a third party to accumulate points or credits on a member's club account, the benefit of accumulated points or credits would be provided to the employee solely due to his or her membership in the casino's "players club," not because of the employee's official position, and may be accepted and redeemed by the employee.

One of the exceptions to the prohibition against accepting discounted meals from a source outside of state government is for "any meal the value of which is \$25 or less."¹ Therefore, if the value of a non-discounted meal at a casino employee dining room or at a casino food and beverage outlet that offers casino employees a discounted rate for food and beverages is \$25 or less, a Kansas Lottery employee may purchase the meal at the discounted rate. However, a Kansas Lottery employee may not accept a discount if the value of the non-discounted meal is more than \$25.

A Kansas Lottery employee may purchase food or beverages in the casino's employee dining room at a non-discounted rate.

Dear Mr. Wilson:

This opinion is in response to your letter dated January 30, 2012, wherein you request an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission (Commission), concerning application of the state level conflict of interest laws, K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* We note at the outset that the Commission's jurisdiction is limited to the applicability of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* and the Commission's opinion does not address whether some other statutory system, common law theory, or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry.

Factual Statement

You inform the Commission that each of three new casinos with state owned and operated games, which are regulated by the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission rather than the Kansas Lottery, will offer a variety of amenities, including the following:

1. Food and beverage outlets, including restaurants, snack bars, and similar facilities that are open to the general public;
2. Non-alcoholic beverages offered free to the general public;
3. Employee dining facilities that are not open to the general public, at which employees of the casino are typically afforded a discounted rate or perhaps even free food and beverages; and
4. Some of the casino facilities will variously include a hotel, spa, retail outlets and so forth.

Additionally, qualifying members of the general public (*i.e.*, patrons at least 21 years of age who are not on the state's "self-exclusion list") may sign up for a casino's "players' club" for which there is no fee.

You further inform the Commission that actual gambling is not required to obtain membership or to use the benefits of membership for a variety of non-gambling activities. Merely being a member of a casino's players' club may allow the member to receive certain discounts on food or beverages offered at one or more of the casino's public food outlets, discounted room rates or other amenities at a hotel, discounts at retailer outlets located at the casino, etc. Also, the possibility exists that a casino manager will "co-op" with other businesses within the community to offer free or discounted items or services to patrons of the businesses who are also members of the casino's players' club.

Further, using a players' club card while playing slot machines and other casino games typically allows a player to accumulate "points" or credits. Accumulated points can then be utilized for free play on the slot machines and other games or redeemed for a variety of items or discounts on those items (meals, hotel rooms, gift items, etc.).

Finally, you advise that Kansas Lottery employees work on-site at the casinos to perform audits, but are by

law prohibited from playing any of the games in the three casinos with state-owned and operated games.

Questions, Analysis and Opinion

A. Gifts, economic opportunity, loan, gratuity, special discount or service. You pose three questions regarding Kansas Lottery employees, including the five appointed members of the Kansas Lottery Commission, in relation to the casinos' players' clubs.

Each of these questions may be analyzed under K.S.A. 46-237a(b) that prohibits state officers and employees in the executive branch of state government from "accept[ing] any gift, economic opportunity, loan, gratuity, special discount or service provided because of such person's official position" in the absence of an applicable exception.

1. May a Kansas Lottery employee who is at least 21 years of age and not on the state's self-exclusion list become a member of one or more of the three casinos' players' clubs and receive any non-gaming discounts and other benefits that may be offered to such members?

In 1998, the Commission addressed a similar issue and concluded:

In applying K.S.A. 46-237a(b), so long as the items are being provided to the officer or employee solely due to his or her membership in the organization or participation in a program, and not because of the officer or employee's "official position," the items could be accepted.²

As indicated, a Kansas Lottery employee may sign up for a casino's "players' club" on the same basis as any member of the general public. Thus, any non-gaming discount or other member benefits would be provided to the employee solely due to his or her membership in the casino's "players club," not because of the employee's official position, and may be accepted.

2. Although a Kansas Lottery employee may not legally gamble at any of the casinos offering state-owned and operated games, may that employee allow a third party who is legally permitted to gamble at such a casino to utilize the employee's players' club membership in order to accumulate points or credits on the employee's players' club account?

Assuming that the rules of the "players' club" allow a third party to accumulate points or credits on a member's club account, again the benefit of accumulated points or credits would be provided to the employee solely due to his or her membership in the casino's "players club," not because of the employee's official position, and may be accepted.

3. If the answer to number 2 is "yes," then may the Kansas Lottery employee redeem the accumulated points for non-gaming discounts and other benefits and otherwise take advantage of any non-gaming benefits that may be available due to the third party's utilization of the employee's membership in the players' club?

Again, assuming that the rules of the "players' club" allow a third party to accumulate points or credits on a member's club account and allow the member to redeem the accumulated points for non-gaming discounts and

benefits, such would be provided to the employee solely due to his or her membership in the casino's "players' club," not because of the employee's official position, and may be accepted.

B. Meals, food and beverages. You also pose three questions regarding Kansas Lottery employees, including the five appointed members of the Kansas Lottery Commission, in relation to acceptance of discounted meals, food and beverages.

Each of these questions may be analyzed under K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 46-237a(c) which generally prohibits state officers and employees in the executive branch from "accept[ing] free or special discount meals from a source outside of state government," unless an applicable exception applies.

4. May a Kansas Lottery employee purchase food or beverages in the casino's employee dining room at the same discounted rate (if any, including free food and beverages) as casino employees?

One of the exceptions to the prohibition against accepting discounted meals from a source outside of state government is for "any meal the value of which is \$25 or less."³ Therefore, if the value of the non-discounted meal is \$25 or less, a Kansas Lottery employee may purchase the meal at the discounted rate. However, a Kansas Lottery employee may not accept a discount if the value of the non-discounted meal is more than \$25.

5. If the answer to number 4 is "No," then may a Kansas Lottery employee purchase food or beverages in the casino's employee dining room at a non-discounted rate?

Because the answer to question 4 is, "it depends," this question will be addressed. A Kansas Lottery employee may purchase food or beverages in the casino's employee dining room at a non-discounted rate.

6. Regarding casino food and beverage outlets that are open to the general public, if a restaurant offers casino employees (but not the general public) a discounted rate for food or beverages, may a Kansas Lottery employee also receive the same discount?

The answer to this question is the same as question 4. One of exceptions to the prohibition against accepting discounted meals from a source outside of state government is for "any meal the value of which is \$25 or less."⁴ Therefore, if the value of the non-discounted meal is \$25 or less, a Kansas Lottery employee may purchase a meal at a casino food and beverage outlet that offers casino employees a discounted rate for food and beverages at the discounted rate. However, a Kansas Lottery employee may not accept a discount if the value of the non-discounted meal is more than \$25.

The bond will be payable solely from amounts received from the respective borrower, the obligation of which will be sufficient to pay the principal of, interest and redemption premium, if any, on the bond when it becomes due.

All individuals who appear at the hearing will be given an opportunity to express their views concerning the proposal to issue the bond to finance the project, and all written comments previously filed with the KDFA at its offices at 555 S. Executive Order 12-02 for Regional Emergencies Conditional and Temporary Relief from Motor Carrier Rules and Regulations

WHEREAS, K.S.A. 48-925(b) provides that the Governor may issue orders and proclamations which shall have the force and effect of law under subsection (b) of K.S.A. 48-924; and

WHEREAS, Drought conditions exist which require the operation of motor carriers and drivers of commercial motor vehicles for the purposes of providing direct assistance for relief efforts in the State of Kansas; and

WHEREAS, Drought conditions also exist in the States of Texas and Oklahoma, who have issued regional emergency declarations to aid in their relief efforts; and

WHEREAS, This disaster has caused or threatens to cause an emergency as defined in 49 C.F.R. 390.5, as adopted by K.A.R. 82-4-3f and which has or threatens to interrupt the delivery of essential services or essential supplies or otherwise immediately threatens physical harm or injury to persons, the public welfare and/or substantial damage to property,

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby acknowledge a state of emergency exists in Kansas and declare it necessary to assist and expedite all disaster recovery efforts. I also acknowledge the regional emergencies declared by the States of Texas and Oklahoma. In order to accommodate these needs and to provide assistance to the citizens of Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas in this extreme situation, I hereby order the following:

1. This declaration only applies to motor carriers hauling hay to livestock in any drought stricken areas; and
2. In accordance with Title 49 C.F.R. § 390.23, the requirements contained in the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations, Title 49 C.F.R. Parts 390-399 are hereby suspended for motor carriers providing relief to the State of Kansas through the duration of the motor carrier's assistance in the disaster relief effort not to exceed a period of thirty (30) days from the date of the initial declaration unless the order is rescinded or expanded by executive order or concurrent resolution of the legislature; and
3. All other applicable state and federal laws/regulations shall apply including but not limited to: Title 49 C.F.R. Part 382, Controlled Substances and Alcohol Use and Testing; the Kansas Motor Vehicle Driver's License Act, K.S.A. 8-234 *et seq.* and Title 49 C.F.R. Part 383 Commercial Driver's License Standards as adopted by the Kansas Uniform Commercial Drivers' License Act, K.S.A. 8-2,125 *et seq.*, the federal Minimum Levels of Financial Responsibility (insurance requirements) Title 49 C.F.R. Part 387 as adopted by K.A.R. 82-4-3n and state insurance requirements as provided in K.A.R. 82-4-23; and, adherence to the regulations governing the Transportation of Hazardous Materials as provided in Title

- 49 C.F.R. 397 and adopted by K.A.R. 82-4-3k and Parts: 107, 171-173, 177, 178 and 180 as adopted by K.A.R. 82-4-20; and
4. For motor carriers providing relief to Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas, the registration and fuel tax permits as enforced by the Kansas Department of Revenue are temporarily suspended; and
 5. For motor carriers providing relief to Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas the licensing, certification and permitting rules and regulations as required by the Kansas Corporation Commission are temporarily suspended; and
 6. Participating motor carriers who are providing relief to Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas are not required to obtain an over-dimensional permit from the Kansas Department of Transportation; and
 7. Participating motor carriers are not permitted to travel during nighttime; and
 8. Participating motor carriers are not allowed to drive during inclement weather conditions. *Oversize or overweight loads shall not be transported when visibility is less than one-half mile, or when conditions of moderate to heavy rain, sleet, snow, fog, or smoke exist, or when highway surfaces are slippery due to ice, packed snow, or rain.*
 9. Participating motor carriers are limited to a load that does not exceed 12 feet in width and does not exceed a height of 14 feet, six inches.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 12-02 and shall become effective immediately.

Article 5.—MULTI-STATE ON-LINE GAMES AND DRAWINGS

111-5-33. Multi-Draw. (a) In addition to a single play for each \$1.00, a player may also have his or her selections entered in multiple drawings. Multi-draw tickets must be purchased for consecutive drawings beginning with the next drawing. This is done by marking one of the multi-draw boxes designated by 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, or 15 on the play slip. The additional draw period(s) for which the ticket is valid will then appear on the computer generated ticket given to the player by the retailer.

(b) A player must pay an additional \$1.00 per play for each additional drawing in which he or she wishes to play.

(c) Unless one of the multi-draw boxes is marked and the additional amount paid, the play will only be eligible for the current drawing up to 8:59 p.m. the day of the drawing.

(d) A player may purchase only the same numbers on the same boards for multiple drawings.

(e) Multi-draw tickets for Powerball drawings conducted after the January 14, 2012, business day shall not be available for purchase prior to the business day beginning January 15, 2012.

(f) A business day for the purposes of this game shall be defined at subsection (p) of K.A.R. 111-6-1.

(g) These amendments shall take effect January 15, 2012. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992; amended, T-111-8-11-97, July 18, 1997; amended, T-111-10-27-97, Sept. 12, 1997; amended, T-111-10-15-02, Sept. 13, 2002; amended, T-111-2-20-09, Dec. 11, 2008; amended, T-111-2-9-12, Nov. 16, 2011.)

Article 17.—SPECIFIC ONLINE DRAWING RULES

111-17-3. Mega Millions to Kansas Speedway second-chance online drawing. (a) The Kansas lottery shall conduct a second-chance online drawing entitled "Mega Millions to Kansas Speedway." The Kansas lottery will accept online entries into the drawing no earlier than December 4, 2011, and no later than 12:00 p.m. on March 15, 2012. The drawing will be conducted on or around Friday, March 16, 2012, and the winners will be announced shortly thereafter. Specific tickets eligible for entry into this second-chance online drawing shall be any non-winning single ticket of \$5 or more of Kansas lottery Mega Millions. Eligible non-winning tickets for entry into the drawing must be purchased during the time period beginning at the start of the business day on December 4, 2011, and no later than 12:00 p.m. on March 15, 2012.

(b) The Kansas lottery will select 100 entries as winners and alternate winners of a Kansas Speedway prize package in the "Mega Millions to Kansas Speedway" second-chance online drawing conducted on or about March 16, 2012. The first 40 entries drawn (numbered 1 through 40) will be winners of a Kansas Speedway prize package in the "Mega Millions to Kansas Speedway" second-chance online drawing. The next 60 entries drawn (numbered 41 through 100) will serve as alternate entries for the prize packages. The alternate entries will be used only if one or more of the original winners cannot be located or is de-

clared ineligible, or fails to present a fully-executed claim form to lottery headquarters by 5:00 p.m. of the fourteenth calendar day following the drawings. The alternate entries will be used, if necessary, in the order drawn. If an alternate winner cannot be located, is declared ineligible, or fails to present a fully-executed claim form to lottery headquarters by 5:00 p.m. of the fourteenth calendar day following a claim form being sent to the alternate winner, the alternate winner process shall be repeated until the prize is properly claimed or until such time as no alternate winners remain, whichever occurs first.

(c) Each of the 40 winners of a prize package awarded in the "Mega Millions to Kansas Speedway" online drawing conducted on or about March 16, 2012, shall receive a racing trip package for the NASCAR Camping World Truck Series SFP 250 and NASCAR Sprint Cup Series STP 400 races at the Kansas Speedway, April 20 through 22, 2012, for two persons. The racing prize package shall include two tickets each day to the NASCAR Camping World Truck Series SFP 250 and NASCAR Sprint Cup Series STP 400 races at the Kansas Speedway, a double occupancy hotel room and room taxes at the Great Wolf Lodge in Kansas City, Kansas, for the evenings of April 20 and 21, 2012, ground transportation to and from the hotel and racetrack, food and other amenities at the Kansas lottery hospitality chalet, \$400 cash, and mandatory state and federal withholding taxes. Each prize package is valued at approximately \$3,417. The following restrictions shall apply to these prizes:

(1) The Kansas lottery is not responsible for any losses caused by delay or cancellation of said automobile race.

(2) Prize packages are transferable one time and cannot be redeemed for cash.

(3) The lottery shall choose and reserve all hotel rooms.

(4) The lottery shall provide transportation as described herein above. All other transportation is the responsibility of the prize winners.

(5) Prize winners will receive notification of their prize, but the actual prize will be delivered at a time and place to be announced by the lottery.

(6) Any meals, drinks, gratuities, taxes, and other expenses that are not specifically mentioned are not included.

(7) The hotel may require winners to produce a major credit card at the time of check-in. Winners are responsible for all hotel charges incurred in excess of the basic room charge for each prize package. The lottery shall not be responsible for any additional expenses charged to the room.

(d) A winner of a prize will be notified via email that he or she has won a prize. The winner will be instructed how to verify his or her personal identification.

(e) A winner will be sent a claim form via email at the time the winner is notified he or she has won a prize.

(f) A player must return his or her completed claim form, and original non-winning ticket entered into the online event drawings within 14 days following the date of the online event drawing.

(g) Completed claim forms and winning ticket(s) can be mailed by the winner via U.S. Mail to: Kansas lottery,

128 North Kansas Avenue, Topeka, Kansas 66603, or the winner can deliver the completed claim form and winning ticket to the Kansas lottery claims center in Topeka, Kansas.

(h) If a player fails to answer any email, respond to any request for information, or fill out any forms required by the Kansas lottery within the time established in this regulation, said win shall be forfeited and the prize awarded to another alternate winner.

(i) A winner of a prize package in the drawing conducted on or about March 16, 2012, does not need to be present to win a prize.

(j) A player may enter the drawing as many times as desired, but may only win one prize package.

(k) Rules applicable to this online event drawing are contained in K.A.R. 111-17-2 and K.A.R. 111-16-1, *et seq.* (Authorized by K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 74-8710 and 74-8748; implementing K.S.A. 2010 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-2-9-12, Nov. 16, 2011.)

Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 54.—TRAUMA SYSTEM PROGRAM

28-54-1. Definitions. Each of the following terms used in this article shall have the meaning specified in this regulation:

(a) "ACS" means American college of surgeons.

(b) "Department" means Kansas department of health and environment.

(c) "Designation" means a determination by the secretary that a hospital shall provide the trauma care required of a level I trauma center, level II trauma center, level III trauma center, or level IV trauma center.

(d) "Level I trauma center" means a hospital that has the capability to provide the highest level of trauma care for every aspect of injury, from prevention through rehabilitation.

(e) "Level II trauma center" means a hospital that meets the following conditions:

(1) Provides initial trauma care, regardless of the severity of the injury;

(2) is not necessarily able to provide the same comprehensive care as that provided by a level I trauma center; and

(3) does not have trauma research as a primary objective.

(f) "Level III trauma center" means a hospital that provides initial trauma care or arranges for the appropriate transfer of trauma patients to a level I trauma center or a level II trauma center.

(g) "Level IV trauma center" means a hospital that provides urgent care for injured persons and the timely transfer of the seriously injured to a level I trauma center,

level II trauma center, or level III trauma center as appropriate.

(h) "Regional trauma council" means one of the six councils, as defined in K.S.A. 75-5663 and amendments thereto, in the state established to address trauma and emergency medical care issues within a specific geographic area and to coordinate services to meet the needs of trauma patients injured within that area.

(i) "Trauma" means any of the following:

(1) Any injury to a person that results from acute exposure to mechanical, thermal, electrical, or chemical energy;

(2) any injury to a person that is caused by the absence of heat or oxygen and that requires immediate medical intervention; or

(3) any injury to a person that requires surgical intervention or treatment to prevent death or permanent disability.

(j) "Trauma facility" means a hospital distinguished by the availability of surgeons, physician specialists, anesthesiology services, nurses, and resuscitation and life-support equipment on a 24-hour basis to care for persons with trauma. This term shall include the following:

(1) Level I trauma centers;

(2) level II trauma centers;

(3) level III trauma centers; and

(4) level IV trauma centers.

(k) "Trauma registry" means the database maintained and operated by the department to collect and analyze reportable patient data on the incidence, severity, and causes of trauma.

(l) "Verification" means the process by which the American college of surgeons confirms a hospital's trauma care capability and performance. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 75-5665; implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 75-5665 and K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 75-5666; effective Nov. 2, 2007; amended March 16, 2012.)

28-54-2. Standards for designation. The designation of a hospital as a level I trauma center, level II trauma center, level III trauma center, or level IV trauma center shall be made by the secretary based on the capability of the hospital to meet the requirements of the requested designation, as specified in this regulation:

(a) For level I trauma centers and level II trauma centers, verification by the American college of surgeons that the hospital meets the standards specified in the "resources for optimal care of the injured patient: 2006," excluding the appendices, published by the American college of surgeons, which is adopted by reference, or a determination by the secretary that the hospital meets equivalent standards;

(b) for level III trauma centers, the "Kansas trauma care facility categorization criteria for level III trauma center," published by the Kansas advisory committee on trauma and dated April 6, 2007, which is adopted by reference; and

(c) for level IV trauma centers, the "Kansas trauma care facility categorization criteria for level IV trauma center," published by the Kansas advisory committee on trauma and dated August 25, 2010, which is adopted by reference. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2011

Supp. 75-5665; effective Nov. 2, 2007; amended March 16, 2012.)

28-54-3. Application for designation. (a)(1) Each hospital administrator that seeks a certificate of designation for its hospital shall submit the following to the secretary:

(A) A designation application on a form provided by the department. Each applicant seeking designation as a level I trauma center, level II trauma center, or level III trauma center shall include one of the following:

(i) A copy of the applicant's current ACS verification certificate; or

(ii) documentation of successful completion of the secretary's on-site survey; and

(B) one of the following nonrefundable application fees:

(i) \$500 for designation as a level I trauma center, level II trauma center, or level III trauma center; or

(ii) \$250 for designation as a level IV trauma center.

(2) An application shall not be deemed complete until all of the required materials have been received. Each applicant shall be notified by the department of the completeness of the application within 30 calendar days after the application is submitted to the department.

(b) Any applicant seeking designation of its hospital as a level III trauma center may request an on-site survey from the department by submitting a request with the application. The applicant shall be notified by the department of the date on which the on-site survey is scheduled and the amount of the nonrefundable fee for the on-site survey, which shall not exceed \$15,000. The applicant shall submit this fee at least 30 calendar days before the date of the on-site survey.

(c) For each hospital seeking a level IV designation, a site visit may be arranged before the three-year designation period, within the three-year designation period, and every three years thereafter to coincide with the three-year designation process.

(d) The findings of the on-site survey team shall be provided to each applicant within 60 calendar days after the date of each survey. If a hospital does not meet the requirements for the level of designation for which the hospital administrator has applied, the hospital administrator shall be notified of the requirements that the hospital is required to meet for designation at the requested level. The hospital administrator shall submit to the secretary a plan of the proposed actions that the hospital will take to ensure compliance with the requirements. A second survey may be required by the secretary. The secretary's survey team shall make a recommendation for the designation to the secretary, based on the hospital's capability to meet the criteria for the requested level of designation.

(e) Each applicant specified in subsection (d) shall be notified by the secretary about the status of designation as a trauma facility within 90 calendar days after the applicant's last survey.

(f) Each applicant who submits a current ACS one-year or three-year verification certificate with an application and the required fee shall be notified by the secretary about the status of designation as a trauma facility within 30 calendar days after these required materials are submitted to the secretary.

(g) Each certificate of designation shall be valid from the date of issuance and for the period specified on the certificate. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 75-5665; effective Nov. 2, 2007; amended March 16, 2012.)

28-54-4. Application for change of designation. (a) Any administrator of a designated trauma facility may request a change of designation by submitting the following to the secretary:

(1) An application for a change of designation on the form provided by the department. Each applicant seeking a change of designation to a level I trauma center, level II trauma center, or level III trauma center shall include one of the following:

(A) A copy of the applicant's current ACS verification certificate for the level of designation sought; or

(B) documentation of successful completion of the secretary's on-site survey for the level of designation sought. The applicant may request an on-site survey from the department by submitting a request with the application; and

(2) one of the following nonrefundable fees:

(A) \$500 for designation as a level I trauma center, level II trauma center, or level III trauma center; or

(B) \$250 for designation as a level IV trauma center.

An application shall not be deemed complete until all of the required materials have been received. Each applicant shall be notified by the department of the completeness of the application within 30 calendar days after the application is submitted to the department.

(b) If the applicant seeking designation of its hospital as a level III trauma center requests an on-site survey by the department, the applicant shall be notified by the department of the date on which the on-site survey is scheduled and the amount of the nonrefundable fee for the on-site survey, which shall not exceed \$15,000. The applicant shall submit this fee at least 30 calendar days before the date of the on-site survey.

(c) The findings of the secretary's on-site survey team shall be provided to the applicant within 60 calendar days after the date of the survey. The survey team shall make a recommendation for the designation to the secretary, based on the hospital's capability to meet the criteria for the requested level of designation.

(d) Each applicant specified in subsection (c) shall be notified by the secretary about the status of designation as a trauma facility within 90 calendar days after the applicant's on-site survey.

(e) Each applicant who submits a current ACS one-year or three-year verification certificate for the level of designation sought with an application and the required fee shall be notified by the secretary about the status of designation as a trauma facility within 30 calendar days after these required materials are submitted to the secretary.

(f) Each change of designation certificate shall be valid from the date of issuance and for the period specified on the certificate. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 75-5665; effective Nov. 2, 2007; amended March 16, 2012.)

(continued)

28-54-5. Certificate of designation; renewal. (a) Each certificate of designation shall be valid for three years from the effective date specified on the certificate.

(b)(1) Each administrator of a designated trauma facility that wants to renew the trauma facility's certificate of designation shall submit the following at least six months before the expiration date specified on the certificate of designation:

(A) An application for renewal of the hospital's designation on a form provided by the department, which shall include the following:

(i) A copy of the applicant's current ACS verification certificate; or

(ii) documentation of successful completion of the secretary's on-site survey. If an applicant for renewal wants to request an on-site survey from the department, the applicant shall meet the requirements specified in K.A.R. 28-54-3(b) or (c) and in K.A.R. 28-54-3(d); and

(B) one of the following nonrefundable renewal fees:

(i) \$500 for designation as a level I trauma center, level II trauma center, or level III trauma center; or

(ii) \$250 for designation as a level IV trauma center.

(2) An application shall not be deemed complete until all of the required materials have been received. Each ap-

licant for renewal shall be notified by the department of the completeness of the application within 30 calendar days after the application is submitted to the department. Except as otherwise provided in subsection (c), failure to renew the certificate of designation before the expiration date shall render the certificate invalid.

(c) The certificate of designation shall not expire on the specified expiration date if all of the required materials specified in paragraph (b)(1) have been submitted to the secretary at least six months before the expiration date on the certificate of designation. In this case, the certificate of designation shall expire on the earlier of the following dates:

(1) The date on which the certificate of designation is renewed; or

(2) the date on which the secretary denies the renewal application. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 75-5665; effective Nov. 2, 2007; amended March 16, 2012.)
