In accordance with Kansas Administrative Regulations 28-16-57a through 63, 28-18-1 through 17, 28-18a-1 through 31 and 33, 28-16-150 through 154, 28-46-7, and the authority vested with the state by the administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, various draft water pollution control documents (permits, notices to revoke and reissue, notices to terminate) have been prepared and/or permit applications have been received for discharges to waters of the United States and the state of Kansas for the class of discharges described below.

The proposed actions concerning the draft documents are based on staff review, applying the appropriate standards, regulations, and effluent limitations of the state of Kansas and the Environmental Protection Agency. The final action will result in a Federal National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Authorization and/or a Kansas Water Pollution Control permit being issued, subject to certain conditions, revocation, and reissuance of the designated permit or termination of the designated permit.

Notice of Proposed Nursing Facility Medicaid Rates for State Fiscal Year 2027; Methodology for Calculating Proposed Rates, and Rate Justifications; Notice of Intent to Amend the Medicaid State Plan; Request for Written Comments; and Notice of Intent to Publish Final Rates

Under the Medicaid program, 42 U.S.C. 1396 et seq., the State of Kansas pays nursing facilities, nursing facilities for mental health, and hospital long-term care units (hereafter collectively referred to as nursing facilities) a daily rate for care provided to residents who are eligible for Medicaid benefits. The Secretary of Aging and Disability Services administers the nursing facility program, which includes hospital long-term care units, and the nursing facility for mental health program. The Secretary acts on behalf of the Kansas Department of Health and Environment Division of Health Care Finance (DHCF), the single state Medicaid agency.

As required by 42 U.S.C. 1396a(a)(13), as amended by Section 4711 of the Balanced Budget Act of 1997, P.L. No. 105-33, 101 Stat. 251, 507-08 (August 5, 1997), the Secretary of the Kansas Department for Aging and Disability Services (KDADS) is publishing the proposed Medicaid per diem rates for Medicaid-certified nursing facilities for State Fiscal Year 2027, the methodology underlying the establishment of the nursing facility rates, and the justifications for those rates. KDADS and DHCF are also providing notice of the state's intent to submit amendments to the Medicaid State Plan to the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services' Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) on or before September 30, 2026.

I. Methodology Used to Calculate Medicaid Per Diem Rates for Nursing Facilities.

In general, the state uses a prospective, cost-based, facility-specific rate-setting methodology to calculate nursing facility Medicaid per diem rates, including the rates listed in this notice. The state's rate-setting methodology is contained primarily in the following described documents and authorities and in the exhibits, attachments, regulations, or other authorities referenced in them:

A. The following portions of the Kansas Medicaid State Plan maintained by DHCF are being revised:

1. Attachment 4.19D, Part I, Subpart C, Exhibit C-1, inclusive;

The text of the portions of the Medicaid State Plan identified above in section IA.1, but not the documents, authorities and the materials incorporated therein by reference, is reprinted in this notice. The Medicaid State Plan provisions set out in this notice appears in the version which the state currently intends to submit to CMS on or before September 30, 2026. The Medicaid State Plan amendment that the state ultimately submits to CMS may differ from the version contained in this notice.

Copies of the documents and authorities containing the state's rate-setting methodology are available upon written request. A.1 Attachment 4.19D, Part I, Subpart C, Exhibit C-1: Methods and Standards for Establishing Payment Rates for Nursing Facilities

Under the Medicaid program, the State of Kansas pays nursing facilities (NF), nursing facilities for mental health (NFMH), and hospital long-term care units (hereafter collectively referred to as nursing facilities) a daily rate for care provided to residents who are eligible for Medicaid benefits. The narrative explanation of the nursing facility reimbursement formula is divided into 11 sections. The sections are: Cost Reports, Rate Determination, Quarterly Case Mix Index Calculation, Resident Days, Inflation Factors, Upper Payment Limits, Quarterly Case Mix Rate Adjustment, Real and Personal Property Fee, Incentive Factors, Rate Effective Date, and Retroactive Rate Adjustments.

1. Cost Reports

The Nursing Facility Financial and Statistical Report (MS2004) is the uniform cost report. It is included in Kansas Administrative Regulation (K.A.R.) 129-10-17. It organizes the commonly incurred business expenses of providers into three reimbursable cost centers (operating, indirect health care, and direct health care). Ownership costs (i.e., mortgage interest, depreciation, lease, and amortization of leasehold improvements) are reported but reimbursed through the real and personal property fee. There is a non-reimbursable/non-resident related cost center so that total operating expenses can be reconciled to the providers' accounting records.

All cost reports are desk reviewed by agency auditors. Adjustments are made, when necessary, to the reported costs in arriving at the allowable historic costs for the rate computations.

Calendar Year End Cost Reports

All providers that have operated a facility for 12 or more months on December 31 shall file a calendar year cost report. The requirements for filing the calendar year cost report are found in K.A.R. 129-10-17.

When a non-arms length or related party change of provider takes place or an owner of the real estate assumes the operations from a lessee, the facility will be treated as an ongoing operation. In this situation, the related provider or owner shall be required to file the calendar year end cost report. The new operator or owner is responsible for obtaining the cost report information from the prior operator for the months during the calendar year in which the new operator was not involved in running the facility. The cost report information from the old and new operators shall be combined to prepare a 12-month calendar year end cost report.

Projected Cost Reports

The filing of projected cost reports are limited to: 1) newly constructed facilities; 2) existing facilities new to the Medicaid program; or 3) a provider re-entering the Medicaid program that has not actively participated or billed services for 24 months or more. The requirements are found in K.A.R. 129-10-17.

2. Rate Determination

Rates for Existing Nursing Facilities

Medicaid rates for Kansas NFs are determined using a prospective, facility-specific rate-setting system. The rate is determined from the base cost data submitted by the provider. The current base cost data is the combined calendar year cost data from each available report submitted by the current provider during 2023, 2024, and 2025.

If the current provider has not submitted a calendar year report during the base cost data period, the cost data submitted by the previous provider for that same period will be used as the base cost data. Once the provider completes their first 24 months in the program, their first calendar year cost report will become the provider's base cost data.

The allowable expenses are divided into three cost centers. The cost centers are Operating, Indirect Health Care and Direct Health Care. They are defined in K.A.R. 129-10-18.

The allowable historic per diem cost is determined by dividing the allowable resident related expenses in each cost center by resident days. Before determining the per diem cost, each year's cost data is adjusted from the midpoint of that year to December 31, 2026. The resident days and inflation factors used in the rate determination will be explained in greater detail in the following sections.

The inflated allowable historic per diem cost for each cost center is then compared to the cost center upper payment limit. The allowable per diem rate is the lesser of the inflated allowable historic per diem cost in each cost center or the cost center upper payment limit. Each cost center has a separate upper payment limit. If each cost center upper payment limit is exceeded, the allowable per diem rate is the sum of the three cost center upper payment limits. There is also a separate upper payment limit for owner, related party, administrator, and co-administrator compensation. The upper payment limits will be explained in more detail in a separate section.

The case mix of the residents adjusts the Direct Health Care cost center. The reasoning behind a case mix payment system is that the characteristics of the residents in a facility should be considered in determining the payment rate. The idea is that certain resident characteristics can be used to predict future costs to care for residents with those same characteristics. For these reasons, it is desirable to use the case mix classification for each facility in adjusting provider rates.

There are add-ons to the allowable per diem rate. The add-ons consist of the incentive factor, the real and personal property fee, and per diems to cover costs not included in the cost report data. The incentive factor and real and personal property fee are explained in separate sections of this exhibit. The rate components are explained in separate subparts of Attachment 4.19D of the State Plan. The add-ons plus the allowable per diem rate equal the total per diem rate.

Rates for New Construction and New Facilities (New Enrollment Status)

The per diem rate for newly constructed nursing facilities, or new facilities to the Kansas Medical Assistance program shall be based on a projected cost report submitted in accordance with K.A.R. 129-10-17.

The cost information from the projected cost report and the first historic cost report covering the projected cost report period shall be adjusted to December 31, 2026. This adjustment will be based on the S&P Global , National Skilled Nursing Facility Market Basket Without Capital Index (S&P Index). The S&P indices listed in the latest available quarterly publication will be used to adjust the reported cost data from the midpoint of the cost report period to December 31, 2026. The provider shall remain in new enrollment status until the base data period is reestablished. During this time, the adjusted cost data shall be used to determine all rates for the provider. Any additional factor for inflation that is applied to cost data for established providers shall be applied to the adjusted cost data for each provider in new enrollment status.

Rates for Facilities Recognized as a Change of Provider (Change of Provider Status)

The payment rate for the first 24 months of operation shall be based on the base cost data of the previous owner or provider. This base cost data shall include data from each calendar year cost report that was filed by the previous provider from 2023-2025. If base cost data is not available, the most recent calendar year data for the previous provider shall be used. Beginning with the first day of the 25th month of operation the payment rate shall be based on the historical cost data for the first calendar year submitted by the new provider.

All data used to set rates for facilities recognized as a change-of-provider shall be adjusted to December 31, 2026. This adjustment will be based on the S&P Index. The S&P indices listed in the latest available quarterly publication will be used to adjust the reported cost data from the midpoint of the cost report period to December 31, 2026. The provider shall remain in change-of-provider status until the base data period is reestablished. During this time, the adjusted cost data shall be used to determine all rates for the provider.

Any additional factor for inflation that is applied to cost data for established providers shall be applied to the adjusted cost data for each provider in change of provider status.

Rates for Facilities Re-entering the Program (Reenrollment Status)

The per diem rate for each provider reentering the Medicaid program shall be determined from a projected cost report if the provider has not actively participated in the program by the submission of any current resident service billings to the program for 24 months or more. The per diem rate for all other providers reentering the program shall be determined from the base cost data filed with the agency or the most recent cost report filed preceding the base cost data period.

All cost data used to set rates for facilities reentering the program shall be adjusted to December 31, 2026. This adjustment will be based on the S&P Index. The S&P indices listed in the latest available quarterly publication will be used to adjust the reported cost data from the midpoint of the cost report period to December 31, 2026. The provider shall remain in reenrollment status until the base data period is reestablished. During this time, the adjusted cost data shall be used to determine all rates for the provider. Any additional factor for inflation that is applied to cost data for established providers shall be applied to the adjusted cost data for each provider in reenrollment status.

3. Quarterly Case Mix Index Calculation

Providers are required to submit to the agency the uniform assessment instrument, which is the Minimum Data Set (MDS), for each resident in the facility. The MDS assessments are maintained in a computer database.

Effective July 1, 2024 the Patient Driven Payment Model (PDPM) Nursing component classification is used as the resident classification system to determine all case- mix indices, using data from the MDS submitted by each facility. The 25 PDPM case mix groups (CMG) and corresponding case mix indices (CMI) developed by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) and implemented as of October 1, 2019, shall be the basis for calculating facility average case mix indices to be used to adjust the Direct Health Care costs in the determination of upper payment limits and rate calculation. Resident assessments that cannot be classified will be assigned the lowest CMI for the State.

Each resident in the facility on the first day of each calendar quarter with a completed and submitted assessment shall be assigned a PDPM nursing CMG calculated on the resident's most current assessment available on the first day of each calendar quarter. This PDPM nursing CMG shall be translated to the corresponding CMI based on the PDPM weights effective October 1, 2019. From the individual resident case mix indices, average case mix indices for all residents and for each payment source type (Medicaid, Medicare and Other) are calculated for each Medicaid nursing facility four times per year based on the assessment information available on the first day of each calendar quarter.

The facility-wide average CMI is the simple average, carried to four decimal places, of all resident case mix indices. The Medicaid-average CMI is the simple average, carried to four decimal places, of all indices for residents, including those receiving hospice services, where Medicaid is known to be a per diem payer source on the first day of the calendar quarter or at any time during the preceding quarter. The private-pay/other average CMI is the simple average, carried to four decimal places, of all indices for residents where neither Medicaid nor Medicare were known to be the payer source on the first day of the calendar quarter or at any time during the preceding quarter. Case mix indices for ventilator-dependent residents for whom additional reimbursement has been determined shall be excluded from the average CMI calculations.

Rates will be adjusted for case mix twice annually using case mix data from the two quarters preceding the rate effective date. The case mix averages used for the rate adjustments will be the simple average of the case mix averages for each quarter. The resident listing cut-off for calculating the average CMIs for each quarter will be the first day of the quarter. The following are the dates for the resident listings and the rate periods in which the average Medicaid CMIs will be used in the semi-annual rate-setting process.

Rate Effective Date

July 1

January 1

Cut-Off Dates for Quarterly CMI

January 1 and April 1

July 1 and October 1

The resident listings will be distributed to providers prior to the dates the semi-annual case mix adjusted rates are determined. This will allow the providers time to review the resident listings and make corrections before they are notified of new rates. The cut off schedule may need to be modified in the event accurate resident listings and Medicaid CMI scores cannot be obtained from the MDS database.

4. Resident Days

Facilities with 60 beds or less

For facilities with 60 beds or less, the allowable historic per diem costs for all cost centers are determined by dividing the allowable resident related expenses by the actual resident days during the cost report period(s) used to establish the base cost data.

Facilities with more than 60 beds

For facilities with more than 60 beds, the allowable historic per diem costs for the Direct Health Care cost center and for food and utilities in the Indirect Health Care cost center are determined by dividing the allowable resident related expenses by the actual resident days during the cost report period(s) used to establish the base cost data. The allowable historic per diem cost for the Operating and Indirect Health Care Cost Centers less food and utilities is subject to an 85% minimum occupancy rule. For these providers, the greater of the actual resident days for the cost report period(s) used to establish the base cost data or the 85% minimum occupancy based on the number of licensed bed days during the cost report period(s) used to establish the base cost data is used as the total resident days in the rate calculation for the Operating cost center and the Indirect Health Care cost center less food and utilities. All licensed beds are required to be certified to participate in the Medicaid program.

There are two exceptions to the 85% minimum occupancy rule for facilities with more than 60 beds. The first is that it does not apply to a provider who is allowed to file a projected cost report for an interim rate. Both the rates determined from the projected cost report and the historic cost report covering the projected cost report period are based on the actual resident days for the period.

The second exception is for the first cost report filed by a new provider who assumes the rate of the previous provider. If the 85% minimum occupancy rule was applied to the previous provider's rate, it is also applied when the rate is assigned to the new provider. However, when the new provider files a historic cost report for any part of the first 12 months of operation, the rate determined from the cost report will be based on actual days and not be subject to the 85% minimum occupancy rule for the months in the first year of operation. The 85% minimum occupancy rule is then reapplied to the rate when the new provider reports resident days and costs for the 13th month of operation and after.

5. Inflation Factors

Inflation will be applied to the allowable reported costs from the calendar year cost report(s) used to determine the base cost data from the midpoint of each cost report period to December 31, 2026. The inflation will be based on the S&P Global, CMS Nursing Home without Capital Market Basket index.

The S&P Global, CMS Nursing Home without Capital Market Basket Indices listed in the latest available quarterly publication will be used to determine the inflation tables for the payment schedules processed during the payment rate period. This may require the use of forecasted factors in the inflation table. The inflation tables will not be revised until the next payment rate period.

The inflation factor will not be applied to the following costs:

1. Owner/Related Party Compensation
2. Interest Expense
3. Real and Personal Property Taxes

6. Upper Payment Limits

There are three types of upper payment limits that will be described. One is the owner/related party/administrator/co-administrator limit. The second is the real and personal property fee limit. The last type of limit is an upper payment limit for each cost center. The upper payment limits are in effect during the payment rate period unless otherwise specified by a State Plan amendment.

Owner/Related Party/Administrator/Co-Administrator Limits

Since salaries and other compensation of owners are not subject to the usual market constraints, specific limits are placed on the amounts reported. First, amounts paid to non-working owners and directors are not an allowable cost. Second, owners and related parties who perform resident related services are limited to a salary chart based on the Kansas Civil Service classifications and wages for comparable positions. Owners and related parties who provide resident related services on less than a full time basis have their compensation limited by the percent of their total work time to a standard work week. A standard work week is defined as 40 hours. The owners and related parties must be professionally qualified to perform services which require licensure or certification.

The compensation paid to owners and related parties shall be allocated to the appropriate cost center for the type of service performed. Each cost center has an expense line for owner/related party compensation. There is also a cost report schedule titled, "Statement of Owners and Related Parties." This schedule requires information concerning the percent of ownership (if over five percent), the time spent in the function, the compensation, and a description of the work performed for each owner and/or related party. Any salaries reported in excess of the Kansas Civil Service based salary chart are transferred to the Operating cost center where the excess is subject to the Owner/Related Party/Administrator/Co-Administrator per diem compensation limit.

Schedule C is an array of non-owner administrator and co-administrator salaries. The schedule includes the calendar year 2025 historic cost reports in the database from all active nursing facility providers. The salary information in the array is not adjusted for inflation. The per diem data is calculated using an 85% minimum occupancy level for those providers in operation for more than 12 months with more than 60 beds. Schedule C for the owner/related party/administrator/co-administrator per diem compensation limit is the first schedule run during the rate setting.

Schedule C is used to set the per diem limitation for all non-owner administrator and co-administrator salaries and owner/related party compensation in excess of the civil service based salary limitation schedule. The per diem limit for a 50-bed or larger home is set at the 90th percentile on all salaries reported for non-owner administrators and co-administrators. A limitation table is then established for facilities with less than 50 beds. This table begins with a reasonable salary per diem for an administrator of a 15-bed or less facility. The per diem limit for a 15-bed or less facility is inflated based on the State of Kansas annual cost of living allowance for classified employees for the rate period. A linear relationship is then established between the compensation of the administrator of the 15-bed facility and the compensation of the administrator of a 50-bed facility. The linear relationship determines the per diem limit for the facilities between 15 and 50 beds.

The per diem limits apply to the non-owner administrators and co-administrators and the compensation paid to owners and related parties who perform an administrative function or consultant type of service. The per diem limit also applies to the salaries in excess of the civil service based salary chart in other cost centers that are transferred to the operating cost center.

Real and Personal Property Fee Limit

The property component of the reimbursement methodology consists of the real and personal property fee that is explained in more detail in a later section. The upper payment limit is 105% of the median determined from a total resident day-weighted array of the property fees in effect April 1, 2026.

Cost Center Upper Payment Limits

Schedule B is an array of all per diem costs for each of the three cost centers-Operating, Indirect Health Care, and Direct Health Care. The schedule includes a per diem determined from the base cost data from all active nursing facility providers. Projected cost reports are excluded when calculating the limit.

The per diem expenses for the Operating cost center and the Indirect Health Care cost center less food and utilities are subject to the 85% minimum occupancy for facilities over 60 beds. All previous desk review and field audit adjustments are considered in the per diem expense calculations. The costs are adjusted by the owner/related party/administrator/co-administrator limit.

Prior to the Schedule B arrays, the cost data on certain expense lines is adjusted from the midpoint of the cost report period to December 31, 2026. This will bring the costs reported by the providers to a common point in time for comparisons. The inflation will be based on the S&P Global, CMS Nursing Home Without Capital Market Basket Index.

Certain costs are exempt from the inflation application when setting the upper payment limits. They include owner/related party compensation, interest expense, and real and personal property taxes.

The costs used for the Direct Health Care cost center will include expenditures made during the cost report period on behalf of the facility from the Long Term Care Rapid Response Staffing Support Center grant. These expenditures will be included in the adjusted Direct Health Care cost prior to applying inflation. See A.2 for more details.

Schedule B is the median compilations. These compilations are needed for setting the upper payment limit for each cost center. The median for each cost center is weighted based on total resident days. The upper payment limits will be set using the following:

Operating	110% of the median
Indirect Health Care	115% of the median
Direct Health Care	130% of the median

Direct Health Care Cost Center Limit

The Kansas reimbursement methodology has a component for a case mix payment adjustment. The Direct Health Care cost center rate component and upper payment limit are adjusted by the facility average CMI.

For the purpose of setting the upper payment limit in the Direct Health Care cost center, the facility cost report period CMI and the statewide average CMI will be calculated. The facility cost report period CMI is the resident day-weighted average of the quarterly facility-wide average case mix indices, carried to four decimal places. The quarters used in this average will be the quarters that most closely coincide with the financial and statistical reporting period. For example, a 01/01/20XX-12/31/20XX financial and statistical reporting period would use the facility-wide average case mix indices for quarters beginning 04/01/XX, 07/01/XX, 10/01/XX and 01/01/XY. The statewide average CMI is the resident day-weighted average, carried to four decimal places, of the facility cost report period case mix indices for all Medicaid facilities.

The statewide average CMI and facility cost report period CMI are used to set the upper payment limit for the Direct Health Care cost center. The limit is based on all facilities with a historic cost report in the database. There are three steps in establishing the base upper payment limit.

The first step is to normalize each facility's inflated Direct Health Care costs to the statewide average CMI. This is done by dividing the statewide average CMI for the cost report year by the facility's cost report period CMI, then multiplying this answer by the facility's inflated costs. This step is repeated for each cost report year for which data is included in the base cost data.

The second step is to determine per diem costs and array them to determine the median. The per diem cost is determined by dividing the total of each provider's inflated case mix adjusted base direct health care costs by the total days provided during the base cost data period. The median is located using a day-weighted methodology. That is, the median cost is the per diem cost for the facility in the array at which point the cumulative total of all resident days first equals or exceeds half the number of the total resident days for all providers. The facility with the median resident day in the array sets the median inflated direct health care cost. For example, if there are eight million resident days, the facility in the array with the 4 millionth day would set the median.

The final step in calculating the base Direct Health Care upper payment limit is to apply the percentage factor to the median cost. For example, if the median cost is \$150 and the upper payment limit is based on 130% of the median, then the upper payment limit for the statewide average CMI would be \$195 ($D=130\% \times \150).

7. Quarterly Case Mix Rate Adjustment

The allowance for the Direct Health Care cost component will be based on the average Medicaid CMI in the facility. The first step in calculating the allowance is to determine the Allowable Direct Health Care Per Diem Cost. This is the lesser of the facility's per diem cost from the base cost data period or the Direct Health Care upper payment limit. Because the direct health care costs were previously adjusted for the statewide average CMI, the Allowable Direct Health Care Per Diem Cost corresponds to the statewide average CMI.

The next step is to determine the Medicaid acuity adjusted allowable Direct Health Care cost. The facility's Medicaid CMI is determined by averaging the facility average Medicaid CMI from the two quarters preceding the rate effective date. The facility's Medicaid CMI is then divided by the statewide average CMI for the cost data period. Finally, this result, is then multiplied by the Allowable Direct Health Care per diem cost. The result is referred to as the Medicaid Acuity Adjustment.

The Medicaid Acuity Adjustment is calculated semi-annually to account for changes in the Medicaid CMI. To illustrate this calculation, take the following situation: The facility's direct health care per diem cost is \$120.00, the Direct Health Care per diem limit is \$195.00, and these are both tied to a statewide average CMI of 1.000, and the facility's current Medicaid CMI is 0.9000. Since the per diem costs are less than the limit the Allowable Direct Health Care Cost is \$120.00, and this is matched with the statewide average CMI of 1.0000. To calculate the Medicaid Acuity Adjustment, first divide the Medicaid CMI by the statewide average CMI, then multiply the result by the Allowable Direct Health Care Cost. In this case that would result in \$108.00 ($0.9000/1.0000 \times \120.00). Because the facility's current Medicaid CMI is less than the statewide average CMI the Medicaid Acuity Adjustment moves the direct health care per diem down proportionally. In contrast, if the Medicaid CMI for the next semi-annual adjustment rose to 1.1000, the Medicaid Acuity Adjustment would be \$132.00 ($1.1000/1.0000 \times \120.00). Again the Medicaid Acuity Adjustment changes the Allowable Direct Health Care Per Diem Cost to match the current Medicaid CMI.

8. Real and Personal Property Fee

The property component of the reimbursement methodology consists of the real and personal property fee (property fee). The property fee is paid in lieu of an allowable cost of mortgage interest, depreciation, lease expense and/or amortization of leasehold improvements. The fee is facility specific and does not change as a result of a change of ownership, change in lease, or with re-enrollment in the Medicaid program. The original property fee was comprised of two components, a property allowance and a property value factor. The differentiation of the fee into these components was eliminated effective July 1, 2002. At that time each facility's fee was re-established based on the sum of the property allowance and value factor. The providers receive the lower of the inflated property fee or the upper payment limit.

For providers re-enrolling in the Kansas Medical Assistance program or providers enrolling for the first time but operating in a facility that was previously enrolled in the program, the property fee shall be the sum of the last effective property allowance and the last effective value factor for that facility. The property fee will be inflated to 12/31/08 and then compared to the upper payment limit. The property fee will be the lower of the facility-specific inflated property fee or the upper payment limit.

Providers entering the Kansas Medical Assistance program for the first time, who are operating in a building for which a fee has not previously been established, shall have a property fee calculated from the ownership costs reported on the cost report. This fee shall include appropriate components for rent or lease expense, interest expense on real estate mortgage, amortization of leasehold improvements, and depreciation on buildings and equipment. The process for calculating the property fee for providers entering the Kansas Medical Assistance program for the first time is explained in greater detail in K.A.R. 129-10-25.

There is a provision for changing the property fee. This is for a rebasing when capital expenditure thresholds are met (\$25,000 for homes under 51 beds and \$50,000 for homes over 50 beds). The original property fee remains constant but the additional factor for the rebasing is added. The property fee rebasing is explained in greater detail in K.A.R. 129-10-25. The rebased property fee is subject to the upper payment limit.

9. Incentive Factors

An incentive factor will be awarded to both NF and NF-MH providers that meet certain outcome measures criteria. The criteria for NF and NF-MH providers will be determined separately based on arrays of outcome measures for each provider group.

Nursing Facility Quality and Efficiency Incentive Factor

The Nursing Facility Incentive Factor is a per diem amount determined by four per diem add-ons providers can earn for various outcomes measures. Providers that maintain a case mix adjusted staffing ratio at or above the 75th percentile will earn a \$3.00 per diem add-on. Providers that fall below the 75th percentile staffing ratio but improve their staffing ratio by 10% or more will earn a \$0.50 per diem add-on. Providers that achieve a staff retention rate at or above the 75th percentile will earn a \$2.50 per diem add-on as long as contracted labor costs do not exceed 10% of the provider's total direct health care labor costs. Providers that have a staff retention rate lower than the 75th percentile but that increase their staff retention rate by 10% or more will receive a per diem add-on of \$0.50 as long as contracted labor costs do not exceed 10% of the provider's total direct health care labor costs. Providers that have a Medicaid occupancy percentage of 65% or more will receive a \$0.75 per diem add-on. Finally, providers that maintain quality measures (QM) at or above the 75th percentile based upon long-stay QM scoring assigned, using the most recent QM data available as of March 15th, and the most current CMS Five Star Users Guide available as of that date, will earn a \$1.25 per diem add-on. The total of all the per diem add-ons a provider qualifies for will be their incentive factor.

The table below summarizes the incentive factor outcomes and per diem add-ons:

The Culture Change/Person-Centered Care Incentive Program

The Culture Change/Person-Centered Care Incentive Program (PEAK 2.0) includes nine different incentive levels to recognize homes that are either pursuing culture change, have made major achievements in the pursuit of culture change, have met minimum competencies in person-centered care, have sustained person-centered care, or are mentoring others in person-centered care.

Each incentive level has a specific pay-for-performance incentive per diem attached to it that homes can earn by meeting defined outcomes. The first six levels (Level 0 – Level 5) are intended to encourage quality improvement for homes that have not yet met the minimum competency requirements for a person-centered care home.

Level 6 recognizes those homes that have attained a minimum level of core competency in person-centered care. Level 7 and Level 8 are reserved for those homes that have demonstrated sustained person-centered care for multiple years and have gone on to mentor other homes in their pursuit of person-centered care. The table below provides a brief overview of each of the levels.

Nursing Facility for Mental Health Quality and Efficiency Incentive Factor

The Quality and Efficiency Incentive plan for Nursing Facilities for Mental Health (NFMH) will be established separately from nursing facilities. Nursing Facilities for Mental Health serve people who often do not need the NF level of care on a long-term basis. There is a desire to provide incentive for NFMHs to work cooperatively and in coordination with Community Mental Health Centers to facilitate the return of persons to the community.

The Quality and Efficiency Incentive Factor is a per diem add-on ranging from zero to seven dollars and fifty cents. It is designed to encourage quality care, efficiency and cooperation with discharge planning. The incentive factor is determined by five outcome measures: case-mix adjusted nurse staffing ratio; operating expense; staff turnover rate; staff retention rate; and occupancy rate. Each provider is awarded points based on their outcomes measures and the total points for each provider determine the per diem incentive factor included in the provider's rate calculation.

Providers may earn up to two incentive points for their case mix adjusted nurse staffing ratio. They will receive two points if their case-mix adjusted staffing ratio equals or exceeds 3.47, which is 120% of the statewide NFMH median of 2.89. They will receive one point if the ratio is less than 120% of the NFMH median but greater than or equal to 3.18, which is 110% of the statewide NFMH median. Providers with staffing ratios below 110% of the NFMH median will receive no points for this incentive measure.

NFMH providers may earn one point for low occupancy outcomes measures. If they have total occupancy less than 90% they will earn a point.

NFMH providers may earn one point for low operating expense outcomes measures. The provider will earn one point if the per diem operating expenses are below \$37.19, or 90% of the statewide median of \$41.32.

NFMH providers may earn up to two points for the turnover rate outcomes measure. Providers with direct health care staff turnover equal to or below 52%, the 75th percentile statewide, will earn two points as long as contracted labor costs do not exceed 10% of the provider's total direct health care labor costs. Providers with direct health care staff turnover greater than 52% but equal to or below 72%, the 50th percentile statewide, will earn one point as long as contracted labor costs do not exceed 10% of the provider's total direct health care labor costs.

Finally, NFMH providers may earn up to two points for the retention rate outcomes measure. Providers with staff retention rates at or above 71%, the 75th percentile statewide will earn two points. Providers with staff retention rates below 71% but at or above 65%, the 50th percentile statewide, will earn one point.

The survey and certification performance of each NF and NFMH provider will be reviewed quarterly to determine each provider's eligibility for incentive factor payments. In order to qualify for an incentive, factor a home must not have received any health care survey deficiency of scope and severity level "H" or higher during the survey review period. Homes that receive "G" level deficiencies, but no "H" level or higher deficiencies, and that correct the "G" level deficiencies within 30 days of the survey, will be eligible to receive 50% of the calculated incentive factor. Homes that receive no deficiencies higher than scope and severity level "F" will be eligible to receive 100% of the calculated incentive factor. The survey and certification review period will be the 12-month period ending one quarter prior to the incentive eligibility review date. The following table lists the incentive eligibility review dates and corresponding review period end dates.

10. Rate Effective Date

Rate effective dates are determined in accordance with K.A.R. 129-10-19. The rate may be revised for an add-on reimbursement factor (i.e., rebased property fee), desk review adjustment or field audit adjustment.

11. Retroactive Rate Adjustments

Retroactive adjustments, as in a retrospective system, are made for the following three conditions:

A retroactive rate adjustment and direct cash settlement is made if the agency determines that the base year cost report data used to determine the prospective payment rate was in error. The prospective payment rate period is adjusted for the corrections.

If a projected cost report is approved to determine an interim rate, a settlement is also made after a historic cost report is filed for the same period.

All settlements are subject to upper payment limits. A provider is considered to be in projection status if they are operating on a projected rate and they are subject to the retroactive rate adjustment.

A.2 Medicaid Add-On

To compensate and incentivize providers with high Medicaid participation, the Kansas Legislature appropriated funding for State Fiscal Year 2026 with a Medicaid Add-On. This per diem add-on was implemented effective July 1, 2025 in the amount of \$20.00 per member. The Medicaid Add-On will expire on June 30, 2026. Rates effective July 1, 2026 do not include a Medicaid Add-On.

A.3 Rapid Response Staffing Grant Adjustment

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment began partnering with KFMC Health Improvement Partners (KFMC) in 2022 to assist long-term care facilities impacted by COVID-19 with emergency temporary staffing services through the Rapid Response Staffing Support Center Grant program. This program provided qualifying nursing facilities with short-term (up to two weeks) emergency staffing services. The costs of the emergency staffing services provided to each facility were covered entirely by the program with no expenditures from the facility. Therefore this additional staffing and the costs related to it are not reflected in the Medicaid cost reports. To account for grant program expenditures made on behalf of each Medicaid nursing facility, a Rapid Response Staffing Grant Adjustment was added to each participating facility's total reported Direct Health Care Costs for each applicable year in the base cost data period. The Rapid Response Staffing Grant Adjustment will reflect the amount of grant funds expended in a given cost report year to provide emergency staffing services to the facility. This amount will be combined with the total reported costs and cost report adjustments to determine the total adjusted costs for Direct Health Care for each cost report year included in the base data period. The grant expenditures will be subject to inflation and case mix adjustments applied to the Direct Health Care costs for each year. The grant expenditures will then flow through the rate calculation as part of the Direct Health Care costs subject to the cost center limitation and Medicaid acuity adjustment to determine the Direct Health Care per diem rate component.

1. Qualifying Providers:

All providers identified by KFMC as receiving emergency temporary staffing services through the Rapid Response Staffing Support Center Grant program.

2. Rapid Response Staffing Grant Adjustment:

The annual grant expenditure amount made on behalf of each facility will be added to the Direct Health Care costs prior to adjusting for inflation and case mix.

II. Medicaid Per Diem Rates for Kansas Nursing Facilities

A. Cost Center Limitations

The state establishes the following cost center limitations which are used in setting rates effective July 1, 2026.

These amounts were determined according to the "Reimbursement Limitations" section. The Direct Healthcare Limit is calculated based on a CMI of 1.2936, which is the statewide average.

B. Case Mix Index

These proposed rates are based upon each nursing facility's Medicaid CMI calculated as the average of the quarterly Medicaid CMI averages with a cutoff dates of January 1, 2026 and April 1, 2026. The CMI calculations use the PDPM Nursing component CMI values implemented by CMS effective October 1, 2019. In Section II.C below, each nursing facility's Medicaid average CMI is listed beside its per diem rate.

C. Rates

The following list includes the calculated Medicaid rate for each nursing facility provider currently enrolled in the Medicaid program and the Medicaid case mix index used to determine each rate.

III. Justifications for the Rates

1. The proposed rates are calculated according to the rate-setting methodology in the Kansas Medicaid State Plan and pending amendments thereto.
2. The proposed rates are calculated according to a methodology which satisfies the requirements of K.S.A. 39-708c(x) and the DHCF regulations in K.A.R. Article 129-10 implementing that statute and applicable federal law.
3. The State's analyses project that the rates:
 - a. Would result in payment, in the aggregate of 96.80% of the Medicaid day weighted average inflated allowable nursing facility costs statewide; and
 - b. Would result in a maximum allowable rate of \$356.01 (for a CMI of 1.2936); with the total average allowable rate being \$293.10.
4. Estimated annual aggregate expenditures in the Medicaid nursing facility services payment program will decrease approximately \$16.3 million.*
5. The state estimates that the rates will continue to make quality care and services available under the Medicaid State Plan at least to the extent that care and services are available to the general population in the geographic area. The state's analyses indicate:
 - a. Service providers operating a total of 291 nursing facilities and hospital-based long-term care units (representing 96.08% of all the licensed nursing facilities and long-term care units in Kansas) participate in the Medicaid program;
 - b. There is at least one Medicaid-certified nursing facility and/or nursing facility for mental health, or Medicaid-certified hospital-based long-term care unit in 94 of the 105 counties in Kansas;
 - c. The statewide average occupancy rate for nursing facilities participating in Medicaid is 82.41%;
 - d. The statewide average Medicaid occupancy rate for participating facilities is 61.39%; and
 - e. The rates would cover 102.99%** of the estimated Medicaid direct health care costs incurred by participating nursing facilities statewide.
6. Federal Medicaid regulations at 42 C.F.R. 447.272 impose an aggregate upper payment limit that states may pay for Medicaid nursing facility services. The state's analysis indicates that the methodology will result in compliance with the federal regulation.

* The Medicaid Add-On was removed from estimated aggregate expenditures for SFY 2027 and is scheduled to sunset June 30, 2026.

State of Disaster Emergency Proclamation

By virtue of the authority vested in me by the Kansas Emergency Management Act, Chapter 48, Article 9, of the Kansas Statutes Annotated, to meet the inherent dangers of disasters to which the State and its citizens have been exposed, and upon advice of the State Adjutant General as the Director of the Division of Emergency Management, I hereby proclaim a State of Disaster Emergency as follows:

NATURE OF THE DISASTER

The combination of above normal temperatures, low relative humidity, and strong winds created elevated fire danger across the state. Red Flag Warnings were issued by the National Weather Service over nearly all the state, with elevated fire weather conditions expected to continue for several days. Local jurisdictions may require support from the state to augment fire suppression.

I hereby proclaim, direct and order the Adjutant General of the State of Kansas to activate the disaster response and recovery portions of the Kansas Response Plan and to utilize all available resources of the state to cope with the disaster as necessary. The Adjutant General shall coordinate local and inter-jurisdictional disaster plans applicable to the political subdivisions of areas affected by this Proclamation.

Any or all of the powers conferred upon the Governor by the Kansas Emergency Management Act may be delegated to the Adjutant General as deemed appropriate during this period of proclaimed State of Disaster Emergency. This may be delegated by written orders, or oral orders subsequently reduced to writing with reference to this Proclamation.

I hereby suspend the provisions of any regulatory statute prescribing the procedures for conduct of state business, or the order or rules and regulations of any state agency which implements such statute, if strict compliance with the provisions of such statutes, order or rule and regulation would prevent, hinder, or delay in any way necessary action in coping with the disaster as set forth in KSA 48-925(c)(1).

House Bill No. 2433

AN ACT concerning the regulation of water use; clarifying county authority over the transfer or appropriation of water; placing such authority with the chief engineer and water transfer hearing panel; amending K.S.A. 2025 Supp. 19-101a and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 2025 Supp. 19-101a is hereby amended to read as follows: 19-101a. (a) The board of county commissioners may transact all county business and perform all powers of local legislation and administration it deems appropriate, subject only to the following limitations, restrictions or prohibitions:

- (1) Counties shall be subject to all acts of the legislature ~~which~~ *that* apply uniformly to all counties.
- (2) Counties may not affect the courts located therein.
- (3) Counties shall be subject to acts of the legislature prescribing limits of indebtedness.
- (4) In the exercise of powers of local legislation and administration authorized under provisions of this section, the home rule power conferred on cities to determine their local affairs and government shall not be superseded or impaired without the consent of the governing body of each city within a county ~~which~~ *that* may be affected.
- (5) Counties may not legislate on social welfare administered under state law enacted pursuant to or in conformity with public law No. 271 – 74th congress, or amendments thereof.
- (6) Counties shall be subject to all acts of the legislature concerning elections, election commissioners and officers and their duties as such officers and the election of county officers.
- (7) Counties shall be subject to the limitations and prohibitions imposed under K.S.A. 12-187 through 12-195, and amendments thereto, prescribing limitations upon the levy of retailers' sales taxes by counties.
- (8) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in statutes made nonuniform in application solely by reason of authorizing exceptions for counties having adopted a charter for county government.
- (9) No county may levy ad valorem taxes under the authority of this section upon real property located within any redevelopment project area established under the authority of K.S.A. 12-1772, and amendments thereto, unless the resolution authorizing the same specifically authorized a portion of the proceeds of such levy to be

used to pay the principal of and interest upon bonds issued by a city under the authority of K.S.A. 12-1774, and amendments thereto.

(10) Counties shall have no power under this section to exempt from any statute authorizing or requiring the levy of taxes and providing substitute and additional provisions on the same subject, unless the resolution authorizing the same specifically provides for a portion of the proceeds of such levy to be used to pay a portion of the principal and interest on bonds issued by cities under the authority of K.S.A. 12-1774, and amendments thereto.

(11) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in the provisions of K.S.A. 19-4601 through 19-4625, and amendments thereto.

(12) Except as otherwise specifically authorized by K.S.A. 12-1,101 through 12-1,109, and amendments thereto, counties may not levy and collect taxes on incomes from whatever source derived.

(13) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in K.S.A. 19-430, and amendments thereto.

(14) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in K.S.A. 19-302, 19-502b, 19-503, 19-805 or 19-1202, and amendments thereto.

(15) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in K.S.A. 19-15,139, 19-15,140 and 19-15,141, and amendments thereto.

(16) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in the provisions of K.S.A. 12-1223, 12-1225, 12-1225a, 12-1225b, 12-1225c and 12-1226, and amendments thereto, or the provisions of K.S.A. 12-1260 through 12-1270 and 12-1276, and amendments thereto.

(17) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in the provisions of K.S.A. 19-211, and amendments thereto.

(18) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in the provisions of K.S.A. 19-4001 through 19-4015, and amendments thereto.

(19) Counties may not regulate the production or drilling of any oil or gas well in any manner ~~which~~ *that* would result in the duplication of regulation by the state corporation commission and the Kansas department of health and environment pursuant to chapter 55 and chapter 65 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated, and amendments thereto, and any rules and regulations adopted pursuant thereto. Counties may not require any license or permit for the drilling or production of oil and gas wells. Counties may not impose any fee or charge for the drilling or production of any oil or gas well.

(20) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in K.S.A. 79-41a04, and amendments thereto.

(21) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in K.S.A. 79-1611, and amendments thereto.

(22) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in K.S.A. 79-1494, and amendments thereto.

(23) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in K.S.A. 19-202(b), and amendments thereto.

(24) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in K.S.A. 19-204(b), and amendments thereto.

(25) Counties may not levy or impose an excise, severance or any other tax in the nature of an excise tax upon the physical severance and production of any mineral or other material from the earth or water.

(26) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in K.S.A. 79-2017 or 79-2101, and amendments thereto.

- (27) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in K.S.A. 2-3302, 2-3305, 2-3307, 2-3318, 17-5904, 17-5908, 47-1219, 65-171d, 65-1,178 through 65-1,199, and 65-3001 through 65-3028, and amendments thereto.
- (28) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in K.S.A. 80-121, and amendments thereto.
- (29) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in K.S.A. 19-228, and amendments thereto.
- (30) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in the Kansas 911 act.
- (31) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in K.S.A. 26-601, and amendments thereto.
- (32) (A) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in the Kansas liquor control act except as provided by ~~paragraph~~ subparagraph (B).
- (B) Counties may adopt resolutions ~~which~~ that are not in conflict with the Kansas liquor control act.
- (33) (A) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in the Kansas cereal malt beverage act except as provided by ~~paragraph~~ subparagraph (B).
- (B) Counties may adopt resolutions ~~which~~ that are not in conflict with the Kansas cereal malt beverage act.
- (34) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in the Kansas lottery act.
- (35) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in the Kansas expanded lottery act.
- (36) Counties may neither exempt from nor effect changes to the eminent domain procedure act.
- (37) Any county granted authority pursuant to the provisions of K.S.A. 19-5001 through 19-5005, and amendments thereto, shall be subject to the limitations and prohibitions imposed under K.S.A. 19-5001 through 19-5005, and amendments thereto.
- (38) Except as otherwise specifically authorized by K.S.A. 19-5001 through 19-5005, and amendments thereto, counties may not exercise any authority granted pursuant to K.S.A. 19-5001 through 19-5005, and amendments thereto, including the imposition or levy of any retailers' sales tax.
- (39) Counties may not exempt from or effect changes in K.S.A. 65-201 and 65-202(a), (b), (d), (e) and (f), and amendments thereto.
- (40) (A) *A county shall not enact or enforce any resolution or otherwise regulate the transfer or appropriation of water in any manner that conflicts or interferes with, is more stringent than or would result in the duplication of the control, regulation, enforcement or oversight of the transfer or appropriation of water by the chief engineer or the water transfer hearing panel pursuant to chapter 82a of the Kansas Statutes Annotated, and amendments thereto, or any rules and regulations adopted pursuant thereto.*
- (B) *Counties shall not:*
- (i) *Require any license or permit, including, but not limited to, any conditional use permit, to appropriate or transfer water; or*
- (ii) *impose any condition, restriction, limitation, requirement, fee or charge to appropriate or transfer water.*
- (C) *The provisions of this paragraph shall be applied prospectively and retroactively and shall apply to all existing and future county resolutions to the extent that such resolutions affect past, present or future transfers or appropriations of water.*
- (D) *Nothing in this paragraph shall be construed to prohibit a county from utilizing zoning or sanitary code requirements to regulate the location or use of domestic water wells.*

(b) Counties shall apply the powers of local legislation granted in subsection (a) by resolution of the board of county commissioners. If no statutory authority exists for such local legislation other than that set forth in subsection (a) and the local legislation proposed under the authority of such subsection is not contrary to any act of the legislature, such local legislation shall become effective upon passage of a resolution of the board and publication in the official county newspaper. If the legislation proposed by the board under authority of subsection (a) is contrary to an act of the legislature ~~which~~ *that* is applicable to the particular county but not uniformly applicable to all counties, such legislation shall become effective by passage of a charter resolution in the manner provided in K.S.A. 19-101b, and amendments thereto.

(c) Any resolution adopted by a county ~~which~~ *that* conflicts with the restrictions in subsection (a) is null and void.

House Bill No. 2555

AN ACT concerning rural health; requiring grant applications, expenditure information, reports and other documentation concerning the rural health transformation program to be presented and provided to the state finance council, house of representatives committee on appropriations, senate committee on ways and means and legislative budget committee.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. (a) All grant applications from a partner, stakeholder or subawardee requesting moneys from the rural health transformation program established pursuant to section 71401 of public law 119-21, following review of such application by the Kansas rural health innovation alliance, shall be presented to the state finance council at a state finance council meeting. Such application information presented to the state finance council shall include the:

- (1) Partner, stakeholder or subawardee receiving the grant;
- (2) purpose of the grant including planned expenditures;
- (3) physical location and, if applicable, the local impacted community where the intended expenditures shall be made; and
- (4) outcomes to be achieved by each grant.

(b) As soon as practicable following the expenditure, information concerning the moneys expended by the state of Kansas from the centers for medicare and medicaid services pursuant to section 71401 of public law 119-21 for the rural health transformation program and any other federal law that appropriates moneys to the state for the rural health transformation program shall be presented to the state finance council at a state finance council meeting.

(c) Any report and other documentation required to be submitted to the centers for medicare and medicaid services pursuant to section 71401 of public law 119-21 shall be provided to the state finance council. Each grant recipient shall provide to the state finance council quarterly reports of the metrics used to measure success of the intended outcomes and key performance indicators achieved through the awarded grant.

(d) All grant applications, expenditure information, reports and other documentation required to be presented and provided pursuant to this section shall also be presented and provided to the house of representatives committee on appropriations and the senate committee on ways and means at a committee meeting during

AN ACT concerning courts; relating to the supreme court nominating commission; requiring certain records of the commission to be released under the open records act; amending K.S.A. 20-123 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 20-123 is hereby amended to read as follows: 20-123. (a) When the chairperson and other members of the commission chosen by the members of the bar have been elected, and after the names of the nonlawyer members appointed by the governor have been certified to the clerk of the supreme court as provided in this act, the clerk shall make a record thereof in the clerk's office and shall notify the members of the commission of their election and appointment. The commission shall meet from time to time as may be necessary to discharge the responsibilities of the commission. Such meetings shall be held at such place as the clerk of the supreme court may arrange. Such meeting shall be held upon the call of the chairperson, or in the event of the chairperson's failure to call a meeting when a meeting is necessary, upon the call of any four members of the commission. The commission shall act only at a meeting, and may act only by the concurrence of a majority of its members. The commission shall have power to adopt such reasonable and proper rules and regulations for the conduct of its proceedings and the discharge of its duties as are consistent with this act and the constitution of the state of Kansas.

(b) (1) The supreme court nominating commission shall be and is hereby deemed to be a public body and shall be subject to the open meetings act, K.S.A. 75-4317 et seq., and amendments thereto.

(2) Except as provided further, the commission shall not recess for a closed or executive meeting for any purpose. The commission, in accordance with K.S.A. 75-4319, and amendments thereto, may recess for a closed or executive meeting only for the purpose of discussing sensitive financial information contained within the personal financial records or official background check of a candidate for judicial nomination.

(3) ~~Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to supersede the commission's discretion to close a record or portion of a record submitted to the commission pursuant to any applicable exception to public disclosure under the open records act.~~ *Notwithstanding the provisions of K.S.A. 45-221(a)(1), and amendments thereto, no rule of the commission or the Kansas supreme court shall be adopted that prohibits disclosure of the records of the commission. All records of the commission, including the names and cities of residence of the people who have been nominated to serve on the commission or as chair of the commission, shall be open and subject to disclosure, except that background check information or sensitive financial information of applicants or nominees for judicial office contained within such records may be closed by the commission.*

Senate Bill No. 396

AN ACT concerning cemeteries; authorizing the reorganization of the Clearwater cemetery district; removing Ohio township from the district.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. (a) The board of trustees of the Clearwater cemetery district located in Sedgwick county is authorized to reorganize such cemetery district by adoption of a resolution of reorganization to remove Ohio township from the district. Such resolution shall be adopted by a majority vote of the trustees.

(b) The reorganized cemetery district shall have three members as follows: The member from the city of Clearwater shall be the mayor, the member from Ninnescah township shall be the township trustee and one member shall be elected at-large. The resolution shall provide for the election of the at-large member of the board of trustees by the board of trustees at the next meeting of such board following the adoption of the resolution. The at-large member shall reside in either the city of Clearwater or Ninnescah township and shall represent the entire district. The at-large member shall stand for election by voters of the district on a nonpartisan basis at the 2026 general election and every four years thereafter. Ohio township and the reorganized Clearwater cemetery district may enter into an interlocal cooperation agreement regarding the future care of cemeteries and the sharing of existing tax funds.

(c) A copy of the reorganization resolution shall be mailed to the Sedgwick county clerk. The reorganization of the cemetery district shall be deemed effective on January 1, 2026.

AN ACT concerning real property; relating to the conveyance of certain property in Wabaunsee county; authorizing Audubon of Kansas to convey such property; requiring any deeds and conveyances related to such property be reviewed and approved by the state historical society; amending K.S.A. 75-2731 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 75-2731 is hereby amended to read as follows: 75-2731. (a) (1) Subject to the provisions of this section, the state historical society is hereby authorized to convey, without consideration, to Audubon of Kansas all of the rights, title and interest in the following described real estate, and any improvements thereon, located in Wabaunsee county, Kansas: Approximately 30 acres of real estate starting at a point on the South section boundary line and running East 120 rods to the East boundary line, then North 80 rods along East boundary line, then West 40 rods, then West by Southwest in a straight line to point of beginning, in Section 28. Township 10 South, Range 10 East of the 6th Principal Meridian.

(b)(2) Conveyance of such rights, title and interest in such real estate, and any improvements thereon, shall be executed in the name of the historical society by the executive director of the historical society. The deed for such conveyance shall be by quitclaim deed.

(c)(3) No exchange and conveyance of real estate and improvements thereon as authorized by this section shall be made by the executive director of the historical society until the deeds and conveyances have been reviewed and approved by the attorney general. The deed for the conveyance shall provide that on July 1, 2026, in the event that any portion of the above-described real estate is not being used for public recreation purposes, by Audubon of Kansas or if Audubon of Kansas ceases to exist, then all rights, title and interest in such portion of such real estate shall revert to the state historical society. ~~The transfer of all rights, title and interest in the real estate conveyed by this section to Audubon of Kansas shall not include any right for Audubon of Kansas to convey any portion of the above described real estate.~~

(d)(4) All costs related to the conveyance *provided in this subsection* shall be paid by the Audubon of Kansas. The conveyance shall not be subject to the provisions of K.S.A. 75-3043a, and amendments thereto.

(b) *On and after the effective date of this act, Audubon of Kansas may convey the real estate described in subsection (a)(1). No conveyance of real estate as authorized by this subsection shall be made by Audubon of Kansas until the deeds and conveyances have been reviewed and approved by the state historical society.*

A summary of the proposed regulations and the economic impact statement of the regulations follows:

The proposed amendments and revocations update requirements for the Kansas Nursing Service Scholarship program. An existing requirement that students receiving the scholarship be enrolled “full-time” would be eliminated, along with language defining “full-time” as 12 or more credit hours per semester. This change would open the scholarship opportunity to students pursuing nursing education on a part-time basis, as well as to students whose full-time nursing programs comprise fewer than 12 credit hours per semester.

The proposed amendments and revocations would also incorporate changes that the Legislature has made to the underlying Program statutes, such as elimination of a sponsorship requirement; and would remove unnecessary financial aid provisions.

There is no anticipated economic impact on specific businesses, sectors, public utility ratepayers, or local governments. Students who qualify for scholarships under this program and who successfully complete their scholarship-funded programs and service requirements will benefit from the scholarships, as will the institutions those students attend. Students who are unable to complete or be excused from their service obligations will be required to repay scholarship funds. Kansas businesses will benefit to the extent additional trained nurses remain in Kansas communities to work after completion of their programs. The regulations themselves will have no direct economic effect, as they only stipulate how the Board of Regents and the participating institutions will implement the Program.

There will be no direct economic impact on other public agencies or private businesses as a result of these regulations. The regulations will neither enhance nor restrict business activities and growth, other than as discussed above.

K.A.R. 17-24-1 is an administrative regulation promulgated by the Office of the State Bank Commissioner requiring licensees to obtain a signed acknowledgement from the consumer. This regulation is being amended to remove the licensee's requirement to obtain a signed acknowledgement and to replace it with a requirement to provide a disclosure to the consumer. The amended regulation will also require the mortgage company to state that the consumer may review the mortgage company's record and history at the Nationwide Multistate Licensing System and Registry.

K.A.R. 17-24-1 Economic Impact: This regulation is expected to have a negligible economic impact. Any mortgage company or loan officer who originates or closes any mortgage loan in the state of Kansas with Kansas consumers would be affected. Mortgage companies will need to review their consumer notices and update them accordingly to ensure they are following the new notice requirements. The mortgage company will have a one-time review of their notice, but the removal of the requirement to obtain a consumer signature will mean that the changes to this regulation will lessen the compliance review process going forward.

K.A.R. 17-24-6 is an administrative regulation promulgated by the Office of the State Bank Commissioner requiring applicants of a mortgage company license or renewal to obtain and submit evidence of a surety bond, the amount of which was determined by the location of the mortgage company or the dollar volume of loans originated in a previous calendar year. This regulation is being amended to match K.A.R. 75-6-31, a regulation under the Uniform Consumer Credit Code applicable to supervised lenders. Like the changes in

K.A.R. 75-6-31, K.A.R. 17-24-6 will streamline the mortgage company bonding requirement. Each mortgage company applicant and licensee shall maintain a minimum of a \$100,000.00 surety bond as of January 1 of each calendar year. This regulation will remove the requirement for a higher surety bond for anyone that originated more than 50 million in Kansas mortgage loans in the last year and the lower surety bond requirements for in-state mortgage companies. The commissioner, under special circumstances, will be authorized to increase the bond requirement to \$1,000,000.00. The criteria used in determining whether an increased bond is required include whether or not the applicant or licensee's business involves technology or methods that may require additional regulatory oversight, prior regulatory or disciplinary actions by the Office of the State Bank Commissioner or any regulatory body of the State of Kansas or any other state or federal regulatory body, and whether or not the business structure or activities of the operation possess elements of risk that may require additional regulatory oversight. This is a new requirement to K.A.R. 17-24-6 but has existed under K.S.A. 75-6-31 for over 20 years.

K.A.R. 17-24-6 Economic Impact: This regulation is expected to have an overall reduced economic impact. Mortgage and surety bond companies will be affected by this proposed regulation. Mortgage companies will need to review their existing bond coverages and if necessary, increase or decrease their coverages to meet the requirements set forth by this regulation. It is expected that the decrease in surety bond premiums for out-of-state mortgage companies will outweigh the increase in surety bond premiums for in-state mortgage companies.

K.A.R. 17-24-7 is an administrative regulation promulgated by the Office of the State Bank Commissioner and addresses additional charges that may be charged to a consumer in a covered mortgage transaction. The proposed amendment supplements K.S.A. 2025 Supp. 9-2229 by requiring that certain conditions be met in order for the charges to be deemed allowable. The mortgage loans that apply to K.S.A. 9-2229(a)(3) and this regulation were formerly covered under K.S.A. 16a-2-501 and K.A.R. 75-6-9. K.A.R. 17-24-7 is a new regulation that will match the changes made to K.A.R. 75-6-9.

K.A.R. 17-24-7 Economic Impact: This regulation is expected to have a negligible economic impact. Any bank, credit union, or mortgage company who originates or closes any mortgage loan in the state of Kansas with Kansas consumers will be affected. This regulation is provided for clarity in confirming what additional charges may be assessed and will return to the same restrictions that applied under K.A.R. 75-6-9.

K.A.R. 75-6-9 is an administrative regulation promulgated by the Office of the State Bank Commissioner and addresses additional charges that may be charged under the UCCC to consumers in non-mortgage consumer credit transactions. A similar regulation under the Kansas Mortgage Business Act ("KMBA") and pertaining to mortgage additional charges is concurrently being proposed by the Office of the State Bank Commissioner as a new regulation, K.A.R. 17-24-7. Statutory citations have been updated in this regulation. Subsection (c) was amended to remove a definition within a definition.

K.A.R. 75-6-9 Economic Impact: This regulation is being updated to reflect new statutory citations and is updated for new grammatical styles. Since there are no substantive changes, there is no economic impact.

K.A.R. 75-6-31 is an administrative regulation promulgated by the Office of the State Bank Commissioner requiring applicants of a supervised lender license or renewal to obtain and retain evidence of a surety bond. This regulation removes the bonding requirement for loans secured by an interest in real property as those statutes have been repealed and replaced with new statutes under the KMBA. This regulation update also sets a limit of 1 million upon the administrator when the administrator may require a higher surety bond amount. The criteria used in determining whether an increased bond is required remains the same.

K.A.R. 75-6-31 Economic Impact: This regulation is expected to have no economic impact. There are no entities engaged in making loans secured by interest in real property at this time. Furthermore, the administrator has never set a surety bond over 1 million under the UCCC, so the limitation is not expected to cause any savings.

K.A.R. 75-6-32 is an administrative regulation promulgated by the Office of the State Bank Commissioner requiring consumer credit filers to file notice with the administrator within a certain time frame when commencing business in Kansas and each year thereafter. The regulation is being amended to reflect the new terminology in the statute by changing “notification” to “consumer credit filings” and to change the filing due date of each year from April 30 to August 31.

K.A.R. 75-6-32 Economic Impact: This proposed amendment is expected to have no economic impact. People engaged in consumer credit that are not licensed as supervised lenders will be affected by this proposed regulation. Consumer credit filers may still file notice on April 1 of each year and would still be compliant with the current regulation.

K.A.R. 75-6-36 and K.A.R. 75-6-37 are administrative regulations promulgated by the Office of the State Bank Commissioner. Both regulations pertain to mortgages and both are being revoked because mortgages were removed from the UCCC and transferred to the KMBA. The KMBA has duplicate regulations at K.A.R. 17-24-5 and 17-24-6.

K.A.R. 75-6-36 and K.A.R. 75-6-37 Economic Impact: There is no economic impact. Both regulations are being repealed as they are no longer necessary and do not interpret an existing statute. No consumer or business will be affected.

K.A.R. 75-6-38 is an administrative regulation promulgated by the Office of the State Bank Commissioner and pertains to record retention requirements in a consumer credit transaction. K.A.R. 75-6-38 is being amended for several reasons. All mortgage provisions in the UCCC were repealed and replaced with new statutes in the KMBA at K.S.A. 9-2201 et. seq, effective January 1, 2025. Mortgage specific requirements currently in (b) have been removed. Subsections (a) and (c) apply to all supervised lenders and consumer credit filers regardless of what activity is being conducted. This regulation is now being split into 4 categories to specifically apply to each type of loan activity that is being conducted. Subsection (c) will apply to everyone. Subsection (a) will only apply to supervised lenders and consumer credit providers that originate consumer credit transactions. Subsection (b) will only apply to supervised lenders and consumer credit providers that undertake collection of payments. A new subsection (d) will apply to supervised lenders and consumer credit providers that collect on defaulted debt.

K.A.R. 75-6-38 Economic Impact: The proposed amendments are expected to have a reduced economic impact. The current regulation requires every licensee and consumer credit filer to retain all documents, some of which are not necessary to review as part of an examination. This proposed regulation outlines the specific documents that are required to be retained for each activity. Supervised lenders, consumer credit filers and document retention companies will be affected. It is expected that compliance costs will decrease for each supervised lender and consumer credit filer as there is less documentation required for certain transactions. It is anticipated that supervised lenders and consumer credit filers will find it easier to buy and sell consumer credit transactions due to the reduction in document retention requirements. No cost to the consumer is expected.

Article 46.—UNDERGROUND INJECTION CONTROL REGULATIONS

28-46-46. Underground Injection Control, fees. (a) Pursuant to K.A.R. 28-45-22 and K.A.R. 28-46-45, each permittee shall submit an annual permit fee based on the following type of Class 1 well:

- (1) Permitted, but undrilled, monitored, shut-in well \$1,000
- (2) Permitted active injection non-hazardous well..... \$3,500
- (3) Permitted active hazardous well..... \$5,500
- (4) Permitted active injection non-hazardous well for facilities already subject to fees.....\$1,750
- (5) Permitted active injection hazardous well for facilities already subject to fees.....\$2,750

(b) Each permittee shall submit an annual permit fee based on the following type of Class V well:

- (1) Permitted, but undrilled, monitored, shut-in well \$1,000
- (2) Permitted active injection well..... \$1,500
- (3) Permitted aquifer recharge well \$100

(c) Payment shall be made to the “Kansas department of health and environment – subsurface hydrocarbon storage fund” on or before April 1 of each year.

(d) The fees collected under this regulation shall be nonrefundable.

(e) If ownership of an underground injection control well changes prior to or on April 1 of a given year, no additional fee levied under this provision shall be required, provided the previous owner submitted the fees due on or before April 1. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2025 Supp. 55-1,117; effective April 17, 2026.)

Article 12.—INCOME TAX

92-12-152. Pregnancy resource act tax credit; contributions. (a) "Contribution," as used in K.S.A. 79-32,316, and amendments thereto, shall mean any donation of cash, stocks and bonds, personal property, or real property.

(1) Stocks and bonds shall be valued at the stock market price on the date of the transfer.

(2) Personal property shall be valued at the lesser of its fair market value or the cost to the donor. The value may include costs incurred in making the donation but shall not include sales tax.

(3) The donation of real property shall be allowable for tax credit if title to the real property is in fee simple absolute and is clear of any encumbrances. The amount of tax credit allowable for donations of real property shall be based upon the lesser of two current, independent appraisals conducted by state-licensed appraisers.

(b) Any taxpayer who contributes to a donor advised fund, as defined in section 4966(d)(2)(A) of the internal revenue code, shall not be allowed credit for that contribution even if the taxpayer recommends that the donor advised fund contribute the funds to an eligible charitable organization. (Authorized by K.S.A. 79-3236; implementing K.S.A. 2025 Supp. 79-32,316; effective April 17, 2026.)
