Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 2 p.m. Monday, November 29, in the third floor conference room, Kansas Insurance Department, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed rules and regulations.

The 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to John Wine, Kansas Insurance Department, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka, 66612-1678, via facsimile at (785) 291-3673, or via e-mail at jwine@ ksinsurance.org. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and the economic impact statement in an accessible format. A summary of the proposed regulations and the economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 40-1-48. Risk-based capital instructions for health organizations. This regulation adopts by reference the most recent version of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners (NAIC) health risk-based capital reports, including overview and instructions, for companies. Risk-based capital is a method of measuring the minimum amount of capital appropriate for an insurance entity to support its overall business operation in consideration of its size and risk profile. Risk-based capital standards for health organizations were enacted in Kansas in the year 2000 and have been amended. This regulation sets out the requirements and format of the risk-based capital report that all domestic health organizations are required to file each year.

The economic impact on companies, if any, is positive because the reports that are required to be filed in Kansas are uniform formats as established by the NAIC. NAIC rules, regulations and instructions are promulgated after input from the insurance industry and regulators nationwide. Companies will generally be familiar with the format and requirements of these reports.

The economic impact will be positive, if any, because the reports that are required to be filed in Kansas are uniform formats as established by the NAIC. There will be little or no economic impact on the Kansas Insurance Department, consumers, small businesses or other governmental agencies.

K.A.R. 40-7-26. Public adjuster; examinations.

K.A.R. 40-7-27. Public adjuster; reporting requirements.

These regulations are being proposed to comply with the requirement in K.S.A. 2009 Supp. 40-5518 that the Kansas Insurance Commissioner promulgate regulations necessary to carry out the provisions of the public adjusters licensing act (K.S.A. 2009 Supp. 5501 et seq.). Because there is only one Kansas-licensed public adjuster, it has been difficult to determine precisely what was necessary.

The proposed regulations are not mandated by federal law.

Because there has been only one Kansas public adjuster licensed, these regulations should not have any economic impact on any other entity. There will be no known economic impact on the Insurance Department or other government agencies, small businesses or the general public.

The Kansas Insurance Department made the requirements similar to those imposed on licensed agents so that members of the industry would have general familiarity with the process, and no other less costly or less intrusive approach for achieving the stated purpose was found.

Generally, any premium offered or discount taken will be increased or reduced by a percentage equal to the percentage by which the principal amount of the bonds is increased or reduced; provided that the county's financial advisor will make every effort to ensure that the net compensation to the successful bidder(s) as a percentage of the adjusted par amount does not increase or decrease from what it would have been if no adjustment had been made to the principal amounts shown in the maturity schedules included herein. The successful bidder(s) may not withdraw its bid or change the interest rates bid as a result of any changes made to the principal amount of either series of the bonds as described herein. At the request of the county, the successful bidder(s) agree(s) to resize the appropriate bond issue, adjust the premium and provide a revised maturity schedule to the county promptly after receipt of notification of such a request by the county.

The bonds will bear interest from their date at the rates to be determined when the bonds are sold as hereinafter provided, payable semiannually on March 1 and September 1 in each year, commencing September 1, 2011. Request for Comments

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is soliciting comments regarding a proposed air quality construction permit. Sunflower Electric Power Corporation (Sunflower) located at 301 W. 13th St., Hays, has applied for an air quality construction permit in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-300 to construct one (1) new 895 MW coal-fired steam generating unit and associated ancillary equipment (Holcomb expansion) at its generating station located at 2440 Holcomb Lane, Holcomb. Emission of particulate matter (PM), PM equal to or less than 10 microns in diameter (PM₁₀), PM equal to or less than 2.5 microns in diameter $(PM_{2.5})$, volatile organic compounds (VOCs), oxides of nitrogen (NOx), sulfur dioxide (SO_2) , carbon monoxide (CO) and sulfuric acid mist (H₂SO₄) were evaluated during the permit review process.

The proposed permit is to be issued in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-350, prevention of significant deterioration (PSD), which adopt the federal standards, procedures and requirements of 40 CFR 52.21 by reference. These air quality regulations apply to major stationary emission sources located in areas designated as "attainment" under the federal Clean Air Act (CAA). Attainment areas are areas where the air quality meets or is better than the national ambient air quality standards (NAAQS).

The PSD regulations require evaluation of emission reduction techniques to identify the best available control technology (BACT) for each regulated pollutant for which the emission rate exceeds the PSD significant level. The purpose of BACT is to affect the maximum degree of reduction achievable, taking into account energy, environmental and economic impacts for each regulated pollutant under review. Evaluation of the estimated emissions for the proposed Holcomb expansion project indicates that the emission rate of oxides of nitrogen, sulfur dioxide, carbon monoxide, particulate matter, volatile organic compounds and sulfuric acid mist all exceed the significance levels. Sunflower conducted the required BACT analyses. The department has reviewed Sunflower's BACT analyses and concurs with its findings that low NOx burners and overfire air with selective catalytic reduction is BACT for NOx, dry flue gas desulfurization (dry FGD) is BACT for SO₂ and H₂SO₄ and fabric filters is BACT for PM, PM₁₀ and PM_{2.5} for the Holcomb expansion project.

A previous public comment period on this permitting action began on July 1, 2010 and ended August 15, 2010. During that comment period it was determined that the meteorological data were not adjusted for differences in time zones prior to input into the dispersion model while conducting the ambient impact analysis. The model simulates how the proposed project will impact ambient air in surrounding areas.

The revised ambient impact analysis was performed by Sunflower on the potential air emissions of NO_2 , SO_2 , PM_{10} , $PM_{2.5}$ and CO from the Holcomb expansion project.

- The NO₂ screening modeling demonstrated no significant impact on the annual ambient air quality standard and demonstrated that 0.9% of the annual Class II maximum allowable increment for NO₂ is expected to be consumed. Subsequent detailed modeling for the new 1-hour NO₂ ambient air quality standard demonstrates the planned source will not contribute significantly to any modeled ambient air quality violations. The EPA has not established a 1-hour Class II maximum allowable increment for NO₂. Accordingly, no calculation of the potential consumption of such increment is possible.
- The SO₂ screening modeling demonstrated no significant impact on the annual ambient air quality standard and that 2.5% of the annual Class II maximum allowable increment for SO₂ is expected to be consumed. Detailed modeling for SO₂ demonstrates that the emissions will not contribute significantly to any violation of the 1-hour, 3-hour, or 24-hour ambient air quality standards and that 13.4% of the 3-hour and 12.6% of the 24-(continued)

hour Class II maximum allowable increments for SO_2 are expected to be consumed. The EPA has not established a 1-hour Class II maximum allowable increment for SO_2 . Accordingly, no calculation of the potential consumption of such increment is possible.

- The PM_{10} screening modeling demonstrated no significant impact on the annual ambient air quality standard and that 5.8% of the annual Class II maximum allowable increment for PM_{10} is expected to be consumed. Detailed modeling for PM_{10} demonstrates that the emissions will not contribute significantly to any violation of the 24-hour ambient air quality standard and that 40.9% of the 24-hour Class II maximum allowable increments for PM_{10} are expected to be consumed.
- The PM_{2.5} screening modeling demonstrated no significant impact on the 24-hour and annual ambient air quality standards and that emissions will not contribute significantly to any violation of the 24-hour or annual ambient air quality standards. The EPA has not established 24-hour or annual Class II maximum allowable increments for PM_{2.5}. Accordingly, no calculation of the potential consumption of the 24-hour increment or annual increment is possible.
- The CO screening modeling demonstrated no significant impact on the 1-hour or 8-hour ambient air quality standards and that the emissions would not significantly contribute to any violation of ambient air quality standards. The EPA has not established any Class II maximum allowable increments for CO. Accordingly, no calculation of the potential consumption of such increment is possible.

Revised design data were presented for the ambient impact analysis and, based on the results of the revised analysis, minor changes were made to the permit for the emergency generator, fire pump and booster fire pump. The modifications will result in lower emissions. The emergency generator will be designed to meet the requirements of 40 CFR Part 60 Subpart IIII Interim Tier 4 (changed from Tier 2). The post permit potential-to-emit for NOx is 1,910 ton/yr (changed from 1914 ton/yr). The emergency generator NOx limit is 0.50 g/HP-hr (changed from 4.8 g/HP-hr) and PM₁₀/PM_{2.5} limit is 0.10 g/HP-hr (changed from 0.15 g/HP-hr). The diesel fire pump (DFP) and DFP booster pump will not be restricted to what time of day they can operate (changed from requiring the maintenance and testing hours to occur between 9 a.m. and 6 p.m., only).

In June 2007, Sunflower performed a Class I visibility analysis using CALPUFF in response to a December 2006 inquiry by the federal land manager responsible for the Wichita Mountains Class I area. The Holcomb expansion project, as then proposed, included two new units totaling 1400 MW. The analysis determined the projected visibility impacts to be within allowable criteria. In addition, KDHE performed a source-specific CAMx model analysis, which concluded the visibility impacts from the expansion project on the Wichita Mountains Class I area to be within allowable criteria. The visibility impacts of the proposed 895 MW project will be lower than those previously determined. No adverse impacts on soils and vegetation in the area were expected. Any federal land manager who has reason to believe he/she may have a Class I area adversely impacted by the emissions from the expansion project has the opportunity to present KDHE with an analysis of the adverse impact on the air quality-related values of that Class I area during the comment period.

A public comment period has been established until October 23 to allow citizens the opportunity to express any concerns they may have about the revised modeling analysis and proposed permitting action. All comments should be submitted to KDHE as follows:

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment has received an application to expand the G. T. Management, LLC "Lloyds Loads" construction and demolition (C&D) landfill. The requested modification to expand the landfill would increase the permitted disposal area from 1.8 to 3.3 acres and increase the closure elevation to about 955 feet, approximately 11 feet above the landfill's current elevation. The expanded landfill would be constructed and operated in conformance with state solid waste regulations, accepting only C&D wastes as defined by Kansas statutes. The proposed landfill expansion site is located at 1253 S. 190th St., southwest of Pittsburg in the N¹/₂ of the SE¹/₄ of Section 15, in Township 31 South, Range 24 East in Crawford County.

82-4-3f. General motor carrier safety regulations. (a) With the following exceptions, 49 C.F.R. Part 390, as in effect on October 1, 2009, is hereby adopted by reference:

(1) The following revisions shall be made to 49 C.F.R. 390.3:

(A) In paragraph (a), the phrase "or intrastate" shall be added after the word "interstate."

(B) In paragraph (e)(1), the phrase "all regulations contained in this subchapter" shall be deleted and replaced by "K.A.R. 82-4-3a through K.A.R. 82-4-3o, and K.A.R. 82-4-20."

(C) In paragraph (e)(2), the phrase "all applicable regulations contained in this subchapter" shall be deleted and replaced by "K.A.R. 82-4-3a through K.A.R. 82-4-3o, and K.A.R. 82-4-20."

(D) Paragraph (g)(1) shall be deleted and replaced with the following: "(1) 49 C.F.R. Part 385, subparts A and E, as adopted by K.A.R. 82-4-3d, for carriers subject to the requirements of 49 C.F.R. 385.403, as adopted by K.A.R. 82-4-3d."

(E) Paragraph (g)(4) shall be deleted.

(2) The following revisions shall be made to 49 C.F.R. 390.5:

(M) The definition of "person" shall be deleted and replaced by the following: "'Person' shall have the same meaning as defined in K.S.A. 66-1,108 and amendments thereto."

(N) The following revisions shall be made to the definition of "principal place of business":

4-3g, K.A.R. 82-4-3j, K.A.R. 83-4-3k, and K.A.R. 82-4-3n." (ii) The first instance of the term "Federal" shall be deleted.

(iii) The phrase "of the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration" shall be deleted.

(O) The following sentence shall be inserted before the definition of "radar detector": " 'Private motor carrier

of passengers' shall have the same meaning as defined in K.S.A. 66-1,108 and amendments thereto."

(P) The definition of "Special agent" shall be deleted and replaced by the following: "Special agent or authorized representative means an authorized representative of the commission, and members of the highway patrol or any other law enforcement officers in the state who have been certified in the inspection of motor carriers based on the motor carrier safety assistance program standards."

"(13) the number of drivers that operate within a 100mile radius of the carrier's principal place of business;

"(14) the number of drivers that operate outside a 100-mile radius of the carrier's principal place of business;

"(15) the number of drivers with commercial drivers' licenses;

"(16) the total number of drivers; and

"(17) for Kansas-based, intrastate carriers, a signed and dated statement with the signatory's printed name and title, certifying that the signatory is familiar with the commission's safety regulations and that the information contained in the report is accurate."

(D) In paragraph (d), the term "agency's" shall be deleted and replaced by "FMCSA's." 82-4-30a. Applications for interstate registration. (a) (1) For the purposes of this regulation, "base state" shall have the meaning assigned to "base-state" in 49 U.S.C. 14504a(a)(2), as adopted in paragraph (a)(2) of this regulation.

(2) 49 U.S.C. 14504a(a)(2), as in effect on October 16, 2008, is hereby adopted by reference.

(3) Each interstate motor carrier designating Kansas as the carrier's base state and operating in interstate commerce over the highways of this state under authority issued by the relevant federal agency shall file the uniform application for registration issued by the relevant federal agency. The carrier shall file this application for registration with the transportation division of the state corporation commission.

(c) An interstate regulated motor carrier shall not operate in interstate commerce over the highways of this state unless the carrier is registered in the carrier's base state pursuant to 49 U.S.C. 14504a(a)(2).
