Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Tuesday, October 2, in the fourth floor training room of the Kansas Department of Agriculture, 109 S.W. 9th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed regulations.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Secretary of Agriculture, 109 S.W. 9th, 4th Floor, Topeka, 66612, or by email at leslie.garner@kda.ks.gov. Comments also may be made through the department's website, http://www.ksda.gov, under the proposed regulation. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Leslie Garner at (785) 296-4623 or fax (785) 368-6668. Handicapped parking is located at the southwest corner of 9th and Kansas Ave., and the north entrance to the building is accessible to individuals with disabilities.

These regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 4-28-6 will establish fees for food establishments with retail and nonretail food sales. The regulation establishes renewal dates and procedures. The regulation defines retail and nonretail food sales.

The regulation is necessary in order to maintain current food safety fees after 2012 Senate Substitute for House Bill

2730 changed the statute. Starting July 1, there are no longer separate licenses for retail food stores and food service establishments. Because of this change, the department needed to revise the regulation to collect fees for food establishments.

K.A.R. 4-28-3, K.A.R. 4-28-4 and K.A.R. 4-28-7, related to unrelated application and license fees, are being repealed.

Economic Impact Statement: There will be minimal costs associated with revising forms and databases upon the Kansas Department of Agriculture and no economic impact upon governmental agencies, private businesses and individuals.

K.A.R. 4-28-31 is necessary in order to collect license fees to cover the additional annual food safety inspection mandated by the National School Lunch Act. This additional inspection and subsequent fee was requested by the Kansas Department of Education, and it has approved the language proposed in this regulation.

Economic Impact Statement: There will be costs to the Department of Agriculture associated with providing the second school food safety inspection each year. Costs are estimated to be approximately \$282,000. All costs are funded through the associated application and license fee proposed in this regulation.

The license fee for an education facility with a school lunch program subject to the National School Lunch Act will be increased from \$200 to \$415. The license fee for an education facility with a satellite school lunch program subject to the National School Lunch Act will be increased from \$130 to \$340. The total cost for the 1,322 facilities subject to this regulation will be approximately \$282,000.
