The state of Kansas Medicaid is proposing a state plan change to be effective January 1, 2013 through December 31, 2014, for payment rates to primary care physicians for furnishing primary care services. Payment rates must be not less than 100 percent of Medicare (if greater, the Medicare payment rate in effect in 2009 is to be used). Primary care physicians are defined as physicians with a primary specialty designation of family medicine, general internal medicine or pediatric medicine. Primary care services include those in the Evaluation and Management category under the Healthcare Common Procedure Coding System (HCPCS) used by Medicare (99201 - 99499), and services related to immunization and administration for vaccines and toxoids ( $90465,90466,90467,90471,90472,90473$ and 90474). Medicaid managed care plans must make payments to physicians consistent with these minimum payment rates, regardless of the manner in which payments are made by the plans, including capitation or partial capitation payments. This provision is mandated by the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act.
The Division of Health Care Finance anticipates a fiscal impact of $\$ 6,900,000$ for FFY 2013 and $\$ 9,200,000$ for FFY 2014.

## Request for Comments

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is soliciting comments regarding a proposed air quality construction permit. Mid-Kansas Electric Company, LLC (Mid-Kansas), located at 301 W. 13th St., Hays, 67601, has applied for an air quality construction permit in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-300 to install 24 new spark-ignition Caterpillar four-stroke lean-burn reciprocating internal combustion engine (Caterpillar 4SLB RICE) electricity generating units using pipeline quality natural gas. Each engine will be nominally rated at 10 megawatts (MW) of electricity for a combined power output of approximately 240 MW . The facility also will include two $450-\mathrm{kW}$ pipeline quality natural gas-fired emergency AC generators, a 190-HP diesel-fueled emergency fire pump, and a $2 \mathrm{mmBtu} / \mathrm{hr}$ natural gas-fired indirect fuel gas heater. The proposed facility, known as Rubart Station, will be located in the Northwest Quarter of Section 1, Township 29 South, Range 35 West, Grant County, Kansas, approximately 14 miles east of Ulysses.

Emissions of particulate matter (PM), PM equal to or less than 10 microns in diameter $\left(\mathrm{PM}_{10}\right)$, PM equal to or
less than 2.5 microns in diameter $\left(\mathrm{PM}_{2.5}\right)$, volatile organic compounds (VOCs), oxides of nitrogen $\left(\mathrm{NO}_{\mathrm{x}}\right)$, sulfur dioxide $\left(\mathrm{SO}_{2}\right)$, carbon monoxide (CO), sulfuric acid mist $\left(\mathrm{H}_{2} \mathrm{SO}_{4}\right)$, hazardous air pollutants (HAPs) and greenhouse gases (GHGs) were evaluated during the permit review process.

The proposed permit is to be issued in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-350, prevention of significant deterioration (PSD), which adopt the federal standards, procedures and requirements of 40 CFR 52.21 by reference. These air quality regulations apply to major stationary emission sources located in areas designated as "attainment" under the federal Clean Air Act (CAA). Attainment areas are areas where the air quality meets or is better than the National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS).

The PSD regulations require evaluation of emission reduction techniques to identify the best available control technology (BACT) for each regulated pollutant, including GHGs, for which the emission rate exceeds the PSD significant level. The purpose of BACT is to affect the maximum degree of reduction achievable, taking into account energy, environmental and economic impacts for each regulated pollutant under review. Evaluation of the estimated emissions for the proposed Rubart Station project indicates that the emission rates of $\mathrm{NO}_{x}, \mathrm{CO}, \mathrm{PM}$, $\mathrm{PM}_{10}, \mathrm{PM}_{2.5}$, VOCs and GHGs all exceed the significance levels. Mid-Kansas conducted the required BACT analyses. The department has reviewed Mid-Kansas' BACT analyses for the Rubart Station project and concurs with its findings as follows:

- For the Caterpillar 4SLB RICE, selective catalytic reduction (SCR) is BACT for $\mathrm{NO}_{\mathrm{x}}$, oxidation catalyst and good combustion practices are BACT for CO and VOC, combustion controls and low ash fuels are BACT for $\mathrm{PM}, \mathrm{PM}_{10}$ and $\mathrm{PM}_{2.5}$, use of efficient leanburn engines and use of natural gas fuel are BACT for GHGs;
- For the emergency AC generators, combustion control is BACT for $\mathrm{NO}_{x}, \mathrm{CO}, \mathrm{VOC}, \mathrm{PM}, \mathrm{PM}_{10}, \mathrm{PM}_{2.5}$ and GHGs;
- For the emergency fire pump, combustion control is BACT for $\mathrm{NO}_{x}, \mathrm{CO}$ and VOC, combustion controls and low ash fuels are BACT for $\mathrm{PM}, \mathrm{PM}_{10}, \mathrm{PM}_{2.5}$, and selection of the most efficient engines that meet the project needs is BACT for GHGs; and
- For the fuel gas heater, low $\mathrm{NO}_{x}$ burners and combustion control is BACT for NOx, good combustion practices is BACT for CO and VOC, combustion control is BACT for $\mathrm{PM}, \mathrm{PM}_{10}$ and $\mathrm{PM}_{2.5}$, and use of clean fuels, maintaining and tuning the heater, and recordkeeping are BACT for GHGs.
An ambient impact analysis was performed on the potential air emissions of $\mathrm{NO}_{2}, \mathrm{PM}_{10}, \mathrm{PM}_{2.5}$ and CO from the Rubart Station project.
- Detailed modeling for the 1-hour and annual $\mathrm{NO}_{2}$ demonstrated that the proposed Rubart Station will not cause or significantly contribute to any violation of the 1-hour and annual $\mathrm{NO}_{2}$ NAAQS. It also demonstrated that 6.0 percent of the annual $\mathrm{NO}_{2}$ Class II area maximum allowable increment is expected to be
consumed by the proposed project. The EPA has not established a Class II area maximum allowable increment for 1-hour $\mathrm{NO}_{2}$. Accordingly, no calculation of the potential consumption of such increment is possible.
- Detailed modeling for $\mathrm{PM}_{10}$ demonstrated that the proposed Rubart Station will not cause or significantly contribute to any violation of the 24 -hour $\mathrm{PM}_{10}$ NAAQS. It also demonstrated that 28.4 percent of the 24-hour $\mathrm{PM}_{10}$ Class II area maximum allowable increment is expected to be consumed by the proposed project. A screening modeling analysis for $\mathrm{PM}_{10}$ demonstrated that the proposed Rubart Station will not cause or significantly contribute to a violation of the annual $\mathrm{PM}_{10}$ NAAQS.
- Detailed modeling for $\mathrm{PM}_{2.5}$ demonstrated the proposed Rubart Station will not cause or significantly contribute to any violation of the 24-hour and annual $\mathrm{PM}_{2.5}$ NAAQS. It also demonstrated that 94.8 percent of the 24 -hour $\mathrm{PM}_{2.5}$ and 21.0 percent of the annual $\mathrm{PM}_{2.5}$ Class II area maximum allowable increments for $\mathrm{PM}_{2.5}$ are expected to be consumed.
- An analysis of visibility was conducted for Meade State Park and Ulysses Airport. The VISCREEN model results indicate no exceedances of the screening criteria at either location. No adverse impacts on soils and vegetation in the area are expected. Any federal land manager who has reason to believe they may have a Class I area adversely impacted by the emissions from the proposed project has the opportunity to present KDHE with a demonstration of the adverse impact on the air quality-related values of the federal Class I area during the comment period.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is soliciting comments regarding a proposed air quality construction permit. Abengoa Bioenergy Biomass of Kansas, LLC (ABBK), located at 16150 Main Circle Drive, Suite 200, Chesterfield, MO 63017, has applied for an air quality construction permit in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-300 to append ABBK's September 16, 2011, permit by installing four emergency generator engines in Section 18, Township 33 South, Range 37 West, Stevens County, Kansas, near Hugoton. Emission of particulate matter (PM), PM equal to or less than 10 microns in diameter $\left(\mathrm{PM}_{10}\right)$, PM equal to or less than 2.5 microns in diameter $\left(\mathrm{PM}_{2.5}\right)$, volatile organic compounds (VOCs), oxides of nitrogen $\left(\mathrm{NO}_{\mathrm{x}}\right)$, sulfur dioxide $\left(\mathrm{SO}_{2}\right)$, carbon monoxide (CO), hazardous air pollutants (HAPs) and greenhouse gases (GHGs) were evaluated during the permit review process.

The proposed permit is to be issued in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-350, prevention of significant deterioration (PSD), which adopt the federal standards, procedures and requirements of 40 CFR 52.21 by reference. These air quality regulations apply to major stationary emission sources located in areas designated as "attainment" under the federal Clean Air Act (CAA). Attainment areas are areas where the air quality meets or is better than the national ambient air quality standards (NAAQS). The proposed permit is appending the September 16, 2011, PSD permit for a biomass to ethanol and

biomass-to-energy production facility issued to ABBK. The proposed permit will include four natural gas-fired spark ignition emergency engines, connected to corresponding electrical power generators, to support the steam turbine generator and auxiliary utility support systems during boiler startup, shutdown and malfunction events. The emergency power generators will produce electrical power for critical equipment when biomassfired boiler power operation is interrupted.

The PSD regulations require evaluation of emission reduction techniques to identify the best available control technology (BACT) for each regulated pollutant, including greenhouse gases (GHGs), for which the emission rate exceeds the PSD significant level. The purpose of BACT is to affect the maximum degree of reduction achievable, taking into account energy, environmental and economic impacts for each regulated pollutant under review. Evaluation of the estimated emissions for the September 16, 2011, ABBK project indicated that the emission rate of oxides of nitrogen, sulfur dioxide, carbon monoxide, particulate matter and GHGs all exceeded the significance levels and $A B B K$ conducted the required BACT analyses. Since the proposed permit is appending the September 16, 2011, permit, ABBK also conducted the required BACT analyses for the four emergency power generators. The department has reviewed ABBK's BACT analyses and concurs with its findings that for the four emergency power generators, installing low-emission design leanburn engines, following good combustion practices and firing pipeline quality natural gas is BACT for $\mathrm{NO}_{x}, \mathrm{SO}_{2}$, $\mathrm{CO}, \mathrm{PM}, \mathrm{PM}_{10}$ and $\mathrm{PM}_{2.5}$. Installing low-emission, energy efficient design lean-burn engines, following good combustion practices and firing pipeline quality natural gas is BACT for GHGs.

An ambient impact analysis was performed on the potential air emissions of $\mathrm{SO}_{2}, \mathrm{PM}_{10}, \mathrm{PM}_{2.5}$ and CO from this proposed project changes.

- The $\mathrm{SO}_{2}$ screening modeling demonstrated no significant impact on the 3-hour NAAQS. Detailed modeling for $\mathrm{SO}_{2}$ demonstrated that the emissions from the planned source will not cause or contribute to any violation of the 24 -hour NAAQS and that 12.22 percent of the 24 -hour Class II maximum allowable increments for $\mathrm{SO}_{2}$ are expected to be consumed.
- Detailed modeling for $\mathrm{PM}_{10}$ demonstrated that the emissions will not cause or contribute to any violation of the 24 -hour NAAQS and that 96.27 percent of the 24-hour $\mathrm{PM}_{10}$ Class II maximum allowable increments for $\mathrm{PM}_{10}$ are expected to be consumed.
- Detailed modeling for $\mathrm{PM}_{2.5}$ demonstrated that the emissions will not cause or contribute to any violation of the 24 -hour $\mathrm{PM}_{2.5}$ NAAQS and that 96.56 percent of the 24 -hour $\mathrm{PM}_{2.5}$ Class II maximum allowable increment for $\mathrm{PM}_{2.5}$ is expected to be consumed.
- The CO screening modeling analysis demonstrated no significant impact on the 1 -hour or 8 -hour NAAQS. The EPA has not established any Class II maximum allowable increments for CO. Accordingly, no calculation of the potential consumption of such increment is possible.
- The proposed project change is not expected to have an impact on the visibility analyses for Cimarron National Grasslands and Hugoton Municipal Airport, or
the soil and vegetation analysis already conducted for the September 16, 2011, permit. Any federal land manager who has reason to believe they may have a Class I area adversely impacted by the emissions from the proposed project has the opportunity to present KDHE with a demonstration of the adverse impact on the air quality-related values of the federal Class I area during the comment period.

## Amended Administrative Interpretation No. 1004 December 19, 2012 <br> Guaranteed Asset Protection ("GAP")

Administrative Interpretation No. 1004 was issued October 20, 1994, and first amended August 7, 1997. This Administrative Interpretation provides guidelines that must be followed for creditors to exclude the cost of Guaranteed Asset Protection ("GAP") waiver agreements from the calculation of the finance charge with consumer credit sales and closed-end consumer loans pursuant to the Uniform Consumer Credit Code. A GAP waiver agreement cancels or waives all or part of the outstanding balance due on a consumer's finance agreement in the event physical damage insurance does not pay the consumer's debt in full following a total loss or unrecovered

theft of the vehicle. This Amended Administrative Interpretation is limited to GAP waiver products offered in connection with the finance agreement on a consumer vehicle. For purposes of this Amended Administrative Interpretation, "vehicle" means self-propelled or towed vehicles designed for personal use, including but not limited to automobiles, trucks, motorcycles, recreational vehicles, travel trailers, all-terrain vehicles, snowmobiles, and personal watercraft.

GAP waiver products may be offered to consumers and the charges for GAP products may continue to be excluded from the finance charge in Kansas provided the following conditions are met:

1. There must be a reasonable expectation that the condition will exist where the loan balance will exceed the fair market value of the vehicle at some point in time during the life of the loan in order for a creditor to offer GAP to the consumer. The price charged for GAP shall be subject to the principles of unconscionability expressed in K.S.A. 16a-5-108.
2. In accordance with the Truth in Lending Act and implementing regulations, as they may be amended from time to time, all GAP waiver agreements must:
a. contain a written statement that GAP coverage is not required by the creditor;
b. disclose the cost of the GAP product; and
c. have the consumer affirmatively sign a written request for GAP coverage after receiving the required disclosures.
3. In addition to the requirements of the Truth in Lending Act, all GAP waiver agreements shall contain the following provisions:
a. The GAP waiver agreement must identify the name of the dealership or financial institution selling the GAP product and the GAP Administrator;
b. The GAP waiver agreement remains a part of the finance agreement upon the assignment, sale, or transfer of such finance agreement by the creditor;
c. The consumer must have no less than a 30-day unconditional right to cancel with a full refund of the purchase price of the GAP waiver agreement, provided no amounts have been waived pursuant to the agreement;
d. The GAP waiver agreement must include, at a minimum, coverage of the physical damage insurance deductible up to $\$ 500$; however, the GAP waiver agreement may cover deductibles in excess of $\$ 500$;
e. The GAP waiver agreement must include a warning in bold type that the GAP coverage may not cancel or waive the entire amount owing at the time of loss;
f. The procedure the consumer must follow to obtain GAP waiver benefits under the terms and conditions of the GAP waiver agreement, including a telephone number and address where the consumer may apply for waiver benefits; and
g. The GAP waiver agreement must contain a statement that advises Kansas consumers with questions or complaints may contact the Office of the State Bank Commissioner, 700 S.W. Jackson \#300, Topeka, KS 66603, (785) 296-2266 or toll free 1-877-387-8523.
4. The GAP waiver agreement must provide coverage, subject to conditions and exclusions identified in the agreement, for all physical damage claims or unrecovered theft that constitute a total loss. All conditions and exclusions to GAP coverage must be clearly and conspicuously disclosed in the GAP waiver agreement in easy to read language. A creditor or such other entity acting on the creditor's behalf shall not sell GAP coverage on a vehicle that does not meet the eligibility requirements of the GAP waiver agreement.
5. The amount waived or cancelled pursuant to the GAP waiver agreement shall be computed as the difference between the outstanding balance on the date of loss and the primary insurance carrier's determination of the Actual Cash Value of the vehicle. The GAP waiver agreement must clearly define the method used to determine the outstanding balance on the date of loss in a manner in which a consumer may reasonably be expected to understand, including disclosure of all items that will be excluded from the outstanding balance on the date of loss. (For example: delinquent or deferred payments, late payment charges, refundable items, etc.)
The GAP waiver agreement must uniformly define the term "Actual Cash Value" as the value established by the primary insurance carrier. If there is no primary insurance coverage at the time of the loss, the market value of the vehicle will be determined by the National Automobile Dealers Association ("NADA") Official Used Car Guide or equivalent. Terms such as "Payable Loss" and "Constructive Total Loss" must be consistent with this method of calculating the GAP waiver benefit.
6. The initial creditor that offers a GAP waiver agreement must report the sale of, and forward funds received on all such waivers to the designated GAP Administrator identified in the GAP waiver agreement.
7. Each creditor must insure its GAP waiver obligations under a contractual liability insurance policy issued by an insurer licensed in this state. Additionally, each creditor must maintain copies, in paper or electronic form, of all GAP waiver agreements for a period of not less than three years following the termination of the agreement. GAP administrators must also be prepared to provide records as requested by the Administrator of the Uniform Consumer Credit Code.
Failure to meet the requirements of this Administrative Interpretation will require that the cost of the GAP product to be included in the finance charge and disclosed accordingly.

This Amended Administrative Interpretation applies to all GAP waiver agreements executed on and after 1/1/2013.

The proposed regulation amendments are for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of the proposed amendments to the regulation and the economic impact follows:

117-7-1. Fees. This regulation is being amended to decrease the original license/certification and renewal of license/certification fees from \$250 to \$225.

The economic impact to appraisers will be a savings of $\$ 25$ annually. The economic impact to the Real Estate Appraisal Board will be a decrease in revenues of approximately $\$ 23,535$ and to the state general fund of $\$ 2,615$. There is no economic impact to other state agencies or to the public.

## Article 56.-REPORTING OF INDUCED TERMINATIONS OF PREGNANCY

28-56-2. General requirements for abortion reports. (a) Each abortion provider, before performing an
abortion and before using the electronic abortion reporting system, shall obtain the following:
(1) A confidential code number from the department; and
(2) a copy of the requirements related to reporting abortions.
(b) Each abortion provider performing less than five abortions annually may use the paper form abortion report.
(c) Each abortion provider performing five or more abortions annually shall use the electronic abortion reporting system to file each abortion report and shall meet the following requirements:
(1) Submit an executed user agreement; and
(2) ensure that each individual authorized by the abortion provider to enter abortion data into the electronic abortion reporting system has a separate user account to access the electronic abortion reporting system.
(d) An abortion report shall be filed for each abortion performed. Each abortion report shall contain the following information:
(1) The confidential code number of the abortion provider filing the abortion report;
(2) the patient's unique identification number as maintained in the abortion provider's medical record. The patient's name and street address shall not be submitted;
(3) the patient's age in years on the patient's last birthday;
(4) the patient's marital status at the time of the abortion;
(5) the month, day, and year the abortion was performed;
(6) the state or United States territory of residence of the patient or, if the patient is not a resident of the United States, the patient's country of residence;
(7) the patient's county of residence if the patient is a resident of a state or territory of the United States or, if the patient is a resident of Canada, the province;
(8) the patient's city or town of residence;
(9) specification of whether the patient resided within the city limits of the city or town of residence;
(10) the hispanic origin of the patient, if applicable;
(11) the patient's ancestry;
(12) the patient's race;
(13) the highest level of education completed by the patient;
(14) the date when the patient's last normal menses began, including the month, day, and year as reported by the patient;
(15) clinical estimate of gestation;
(16) number of previous pregnancies, in the following categories:
(A) Children born live and now living;
(B) children born live and now dead;
(C) previous induced abortions; and
(D) previous spontaneous terminations, including miscarriages, or stillbirths;
(17) the primary abortion procedure used in terminating the pregnancy, including one of the following abortion procedures:
(A) Suction curettage;
(B) sharp curettage;
(C) dilation and evacuation;
(D) administration of mifeprestone;
(E) administration of methotrexate;
(F) prostaglandins delivered by intrauterine instillation or other methods;
(G) hysterotomy;
(H) hysterectomy;
(I) digoxin induction;
(J) partial birth abortion; or
(K) other procedure, which shall be specified;
(18) if applicable, all secondary abortion procedures used in terminating the pregnancy, including any of the following procedures that apply:
(A) Suction curettage;
(B) sharp curettage;
(C) dilation and evacuation;
(D) administration of mifeprestone;
(E) administration of methotrexate;
(F) prostaglandins delivered by intrauterine instillation or other methods;
(G) hysterotomy;
(H) hysterectomy;
(I) digoxin induction;
(J) partial birth abortion; or
(K) other procedure, which shall be specified;
(19) specification of the medical factors and methods used to determine the clinical estimate of gestation; and
(20) specification of whether there was a report of physical, mental, or emotional abuse or neglect filed pursuant to K.S.A. 38-2223, and amendments thereto. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 65-445 and 65-6703; implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 65-6703; effective June 15, 2012; amended Jan. 4, 2013.)
