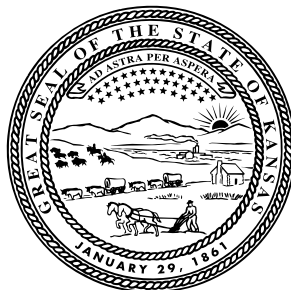

Attorney General**2102 Update to Guidelines for Takings of Private Property**

The Private Property Protection Act (Act), K.S.A. 77-701 *et seq.*, requires the Attorney General to compile and annually update guidelines to be used by state agencies in determining whether proposed government action may constitute a taking of private property. These guidelines are to be based on cases decided by the United States Supreme Court and the Kansas Supreme Court.¹ Govern-

ment action is defined as legislation, regulations or directives, or agency guidelines and procedures for the issuing of licenses or permits.² The Act expressly excludes other types of activity, such as the formal exercise of eminent domain.³

Under the criteria of the Act, there are three cases to include in the 2012 update to the Attorney General's Guidelines⁴:

Arkansas Game and Fish Commission v. United States, 133 S. Ct. 511 (2012). The United States Supreme Court reversed the Federal Circuit's holding that government-induced flooding constitutes a taking only if the flooding is permanent or inevitably recurring. The Supreme Court reiterated that "takings temporary in duration can be compensable" and declined to adopt a "blanket temporary-flooding exception to [its] Takings Clause jurisprudence."

Kansas One-Call System, Inc. v. State, 294 Kan. 220 (2012). A company that operated an excavation notification center for public utilities argued that a statute limiting the fees it could charge certain utilities violated the company's constitutional rights under the Takings Clause. The Kansas Supreme Court disagreed, holding that the fee limitation did not constitute a taking because the company was not legally required to operate the notification center but instead "voluntarily agreed to participate in a price-regulated program or activity." Alternatively, the Court held, the company's takings claim was foreclosed by the fact that it could adjust other fees to cover the additional expenses. "Where an entity can pass along costs to others, such as customers or members, just compensation is available for any taking that may have occurred, negating any Fifth Amendment [takings] claim."

Zimmerman v. Hudson, 293 Kan. 332 (2011). Landowners who had entered into contracts for the development of commercial wind farms on their properties filed suit after the board of county commissioners adopted zoning restrictions prohibiting such wind farms. On appeal, the Kansas Supreme Court explained that the district court erred in holding that the reasonableness of the governmental action is the appropriate standard to be used in determining whether a taking occurred, but the Supreme Court affirmed the district court's rejection of the takings claims on other grounds. Even before the new zoning restrictions, construction of the wind farms was contingent on obtaining conditional use permits, and the county commissioners had absolute discretion to grant or deny these permits. Accordingly, the landowners had no "vested right" in the construction of wind farms. Without such a right, the landowners had no viable takings claim.

Request for Comments

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is soliciting comments regarding a proposed air quality construction permit. Westar Energy, Inc. (Westar) has applied for an air quality construction permit in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-300 to initiate an emission reduction project at its Tecumseh Energy Center, Unit 8/10, in Tecumseh, Kansas. Emissions of oxides of nitrogen (NO_x), carbon monoxide (CO) and greenhouse gases (GHGs) were evaluated during the permit review process. Westar Energy, Inc., 818 S. Kansas Ave., P.O. Box 889, Topeka, 66601, proposes to initiate a NO_x reduction project on Unit 8/10 at the Tecumseh Energy Center located at 2nd and DuPont Road, Tecumseh, 66542.

The proposed permit is to be issued in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-350, prevention of significant deterioration (PSD), which adopt the federal standards, procedures and requirements of 40 CFR 52.21 by reference. These air quality regulations apply to major stationary emission sources located in areas designated as "attainment" under the federal Clean Air Act (CAA). Attainment areas are areas where the air quality meets or is better than the national ambient air quality standards (NAAQS).

The PSD regulations require evaluation of emission reduction techniques to identify the best available control technology (BACT) for each pollutant for which the emission rate exceeds the PSD significant level. The purpose of BACT is to affect the maximum degree of reduction achievable, taking into account energy, environmental and economic impacts for each pollutant under review. Evaluation of the estimated emissions for the proposed Tecumseh Energy Center Unit 8/10 project indicates that the emission rate of carbon monoxide exceeds the significance level. Westar conducted the required BACT analysis for CO. The department has reviewed Westar's BACT analysis and concurs with its finding that good combustion practices are BACT for CO.

An ambient impact analysis was performed on the potential air emissions of CO from the proposed modifications to the existing burner and combustion system on Unit 8/10. The CO screening modeling analysis demonstrated no significant impact on the 1-hour or 8-hour ambient air quality and that the emissions would not cause or contribute to any violation of ambient air standards. The EPA has not established Class II maximum allowable increments for CO. Accordingly, no calculation of the potential consumption of increment is possible. No Class I areas are located within 100 km of the facility. Any federal land manager who has reason to believe he/she may have a Class I area adversely impacted by the emissions from the expansion project has the opportunity to present KDHE with analysis of the adverse impact on the air quality-related values of that Class I area during the comment period. No adverse impacts on soils and vegetation in the area are expected.

A public comment period has been established until noon February 5 to allow citizens the opportunity to express any concerns they may have about this proposed permitting action. All comments should be submitted in writing to Rick Bolfig, KDHE, Bureau of Air, 1000 S.W. Jackson, Suite 310, Topeka, 66612-1366.

Any member of the public may request a public hearing be conducted to provide comments on the proposed issuance of the draft air quality construction permit. The request for a hearing shall be in writing and shall set forth the basis for the request. Written requests to hold a public hearing should be sent to the attention of Rick Bolfig at the address above or by fax to 785-291-3953 and must be received by noon February 5. If a pertinent request is received, a public hearing is tentatively scheduled by KDHE at 6 p.m. February 6 at the Rice Community Center, 432 S.E. Norwood, Topeka. The hearing will continue until audience members have had an opportunity to submit comments. If no pertinent requests to hold the public hearing are received by noon February 5, the public hearing will be cancelled. A notice of the cancellation will be posted at the KDHE website at <http://www.kdheks.gov/bar/publicnotice.html>.

If a hearing is conducted, all interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally or by submission of written materials during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit oral presentations to a specific time limit.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed materials in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation must be made not later than January 25 to Rick Bolfig at 785-296-1576.

Copies of the proposed permit, permit application, all supporting documentation and all information relied upon during the permit application review process are available for public review for a period of 30 days from the date of publication during normal business hours, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., at the KDHE, Bureau of Air, 1000 S.W. The firm's accounting systems must have the following capabilities before the firm may be awarded a contract:

- Valid, reliable and current costs must be available within the system to support cost and pricing data.
- Capability to provide a means of measuring the reasonableness of incurred costs.
- Capability to identify and accumulate allowable costs by contract or project records that will reconcile with the general ledger.

- Ability to provide supporting documentation of actual expenditures for each billing, based on costs.

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Monday, March 18, in Room 1051 of the Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in five existing rules and regulations relating to continuing nursing education and IV therapy. The continuing nursing education proposed changes include decreasing the minimum time 30 minutes that can be computed towards a contact hour. The IV therapy proposed changes include clarifying language of the scope of practice for licensed practical nurses performing IV therapy.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the executive administrator of the Board of Nursing, Room 1051, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views, orally or in writing, concerning the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. Phone comments will be taken by calling 877-278-8686 (access code 135621) at 10 a.m. the day of the hearing. In order to give all persons the opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentations to five minutes.

A summary of the proposed regulations and the economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 60-9-105. Definitions. The proposed changes clarify language and allow the registered nurse and licensed practical nurse to use 30 minutes to be computed towards a contact hour. This is a decrease from one contact hour being the minimum to 30 minutes. There is no economic impact for the State Board of Nursing, other governmental entities, private business or individuals.

K.A.R. 60-9-106. Continuing nursing education for license renewal. The proposed changes clarify language and allow the registered nurse and licensed practical nurse to use 30 minutes to be computed towards a contact hour. This is a decrease from one contact hour being the minimum to 30 minutes. There is no economic impact for the State Board of Nursing, other governmental entities, private business or individuals.

K.A.R. 60-9-107. Approval of continuing nursing education. The proposed changes clarify language and add the requirement that providers list APRN if the course is approved for APRN continuing nursing education. It also allows the registered nurse and licensed practical nurse to use 30 minutes to be computed towards a contact hour. There is no economic impact for the State Board of Nursing, other governmental entities, private business or individuals.

K.A.R. 60-12-106. License renewal. The proposed changes clarify language and allow the licensed mental health technician to use 30 minutes to be computed towards a contact hour. This is a decrease from one contact hour being the minimum to 30 minutes. There is no economic impact for the State Board of Nursing, other governmental entities, private business or individuals.

K.A.R. 60-16-102. Scope of practice for licensed practical nurse performing intravenous fluid therapy. The proposed language changes delete "or solutions," which clarifies that the licensed practical nurse may administer IV solutions. There is no economic impact for the State Board of Nursing, other governmental entities, private business or individuals.

DETERMINATION OF RESIDENCY
FOR FEE PURPOSES

88-3-8a. Military personnel. (a) The resident fee privilege shall be accorded to any person who meets the following conditions:

(1) Is enrolled at any state educational institution, as defined by K.S.A. 76-711 and amendments thereto; and
(2) meets one of the following conditions:

(A) Is actively serving in any armed service of the United States for 30 or more days immediately preceding enrollment and meets one of the following conditions:

(i) Resides in Kansas; or
(ii) is assigned to a permanent duty station located in Kansas;

(B) is a member of the Kansas army or air national guard; or

(C) is the spouse or dependent of a person who meets both of the following conditions:

(i) Is actively serving in any armed service of the United States or the Kansas army or air national guard for 30 or more days immediately preceding enrollment; and

(ii) either resides in Kansas or is assigned to a permanent duty station located in Kansas.

(b) The resident fee privilege accorded to a person who meets the requirements of paragraph (a)(2)(A), or to the spouse or dependents of the person, shall continue if the person is reassigned to a duty station outside the state as long as the person or the person's spouse or dependents maintain continuous enrollment at the institution.

(continued)

(c) The resident fee privilege shall be accorded to a spouse and the qualifying dependents of a person who meets the requirements of paragraph (a)(2)(B) only if the spouse or dependents reside in Kansas.

(d) This regulation shall not be construed to prevent a person in the military service from acquiring or retaining a bona fide residence in Kansas. (Authorized by K.S.A.

76-730; implementing K.S.A. 2011 Supp. 76-729 and K.S.A. 76-730; effective July 27, 2007; amended Jan. 18, 2013.)
