Electronic copies of the letting proposals and plans are available on the KDOT website at <http://www.ksdot.org/burconsmain/contracts/proposal.asp>. The website will allow the contractor to request approval from KDOT to bid as a prime contractor and be included on the "Bid Holders List," or to be included on the "Non-Bid Holders List" as a subcontractor/supplier. KDOT's approval is required to bid as a prime contractor. To bid as a prime contractor, KDOT needs to be notified of the intent to bid not later than the close of business on the Monday preceding the scheduled letting date. Failure to obtain prior approval to bid as a prime contractor on any projects listed below will be reason to reject the bid. The secretary of the Kansas Department of Transportation reserves the right to reject bids that do not comply with all requirements for preparing a bidding proposal as specified in the 2007 edition of the Kansas Department of Transportation Standard Specifications for State Road and Bridge Construction.

KDOT will only accept electronic Internet proposals online using the Bid Express website at <http://www.bidx.com> until 1 p.m. local time on August 21, 2013. KDOT will open and read these proposals at the Eisenhower State Office Building, 700 S.W. Harrison, Topeka, at 1:30 p.m. local time on August 21. Failure to complete the required contract provision and certify the completeness of the preceding state-

A public hearing will be conducted at 2 p.m. Thursday, September 26, in the second floor auditorium of Memorial Hall, 120 S.W. 10th Ave., Topeka, to consider the adoption of a proposed regulation of the Office of the Attorney General, Concealed Carry Licensing Unit, on a permanent basis.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments for the proposed regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Concealed Carry Licensing Unit, 120 S.W. 10th Ave., 2nd Floor, Topeka, 66612, or by email to ksagcc@ksag.org. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally regarding the adoption of the proposed regulation during the public hearing. In order to provide all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. K.A.R. 16-11-7. Signage. This amends an existing regulation that sets out signage parameters for those buildings that want to prohibit the licensed concealed carry of handguns within those buildings. This amendment speaks specifically to state and municipal buildings following amendments to the personal and family protection act (K.S.A. 75-7c01 et seq.) by 2013 Senate Substitute for House Bill 2052 (HB 2052). More specifically, this amendment will require different signs to be posted on any state or municipal building, as those terms are defined in the act, if steps have been taken to exercise exemptions that are allowed in HB 2052.

This amendment concerning signage should have minimal economic impact on state agencies and municipalities, and that economic impact will only exist if the agency or municipality exercises one of the allowed exemptions of section 2 of HB 2052.

All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally regarding the adoption of the proposed regulations during the public hearing. In order to provide all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. The following regulations are all new regulations, and all listed regulations relate to the Kansas roofing contractor registration act, also known as the roofing registration act.

K.A.R. 16-8-1. Definitions. This regulation sets forth the definitions for several terms that are not otherwise defined by the roofing registration act. Since these definitions simply clarify current policy, this regulation is not anticipated to have any economic impact.

K.A.R. 16-8-2. Initial application. This regulation sets forth the process and requirements for filing an initial application for a certificate of registration pursuant to the roofing registration act. Since this regulation simply clarifies current policy, this regulation is not anticipated to have any economic impact.

K.A.R. 16-8-3. Renewal application. This regulation sets forth the process and requirements for filing a renewal application for a certificate of registration pursuant to the roofing registration act. Since this regulation simply clarifies current policy, this regulation is not anticipated to have any economic impact.

K.A.R. 16-8-4. Suspension, revocation, and reinstatement. This regulation clarifies the attorney general's ability to suspend or revoke a registrant's certificate of registration. This regulation also sets forth the process for seeking reinstatement of such certificate of registration. Since this regulation simply clarifies current policy, this regulation is not anticipated to have any economic impact.

K.A.R. 16-8-5. Incomplete applications. This regulation describes the attorney general's guidelines when an incomplete application for registration is submitted to the attorney general. Since this regulation simply clarifies current policy, this regulation is not anticipated to have any economic impact.

K.A.R. 16-8-6. Fees. This regulation sets forth a schedule of fees for all fees described in the roofing registration act. This regulation is anticipated to have an economic impact. The following fees will apply to applicants or registrants, as applicable; \$250 for each initial or renewal; \$500 for renewal of a suspended registration certificate; \$750 for reinstatement of a revoked registration certificate; \$250 for late renewal; and \$25 for a change of name or address. The attorney general believes that the costs are set at the minimum amount necessary to implement and administer the act while upholding the requirements of the act.

K.A.R. 16-8-7. Status of registration. This regulation clarifies the various statuses of registration for an applicant or current registrant pursuant to the roofing registration act. Since this regulation simply clarifies current policy, this regulation is not anticipated to have any economic impact.

Article 11.—PERSONAL AND FAMILY
PROTECTION ACT

16-11-7. Signs. (a) For the purposes of this regulation, the terms "state or municipal building," "state," and "municipal" shall have the meaning specified in L. 2013, ch. 105, § 2, and amendments thereto.

(b) No license issued pursuant to or recognized under the personal and family protection act shall authorize the licensee to carry a concealed handgun into any building other than a state or municipal building if the building is conspicuously posted with signs that include the graphic in the document titled "buildings other than state and municipal buildings: signage adopted by the Kansas attorney general," dated June 20, 2013, which is hereby adopted by reference.

(c) No license issued pursuant to or recognized under the personal and family protection act shall authorize the licensee to carry a concealed handgun into any state or municipal building if the governing body or, if no governing body exists, the chief administrative officer for that state or municipal building has performed the following:

(1) Either installed adequate security measures or temporarily exempted the state or municipal building from L. 2013, ch. 105, § 2, and amendments thereto; and

(2) conspicuously posted signs that include the graphic and text in either of the following documents, which are hereby adopted by reference:

(A) "State and municipal buildings: signage adopted by the Kansas attorney general," dated June 20, 2013; or

(B) "state and municipal buildings: signage adopted by the Kansas attorney general," dated July 10, 2013.

The top of the text shall be at least one inch but no more than two inches below the graphic. The text shall be in black letters and shall be no smaller than the text below the graphic in either of the documents adopted in this subsection. The text "State or Municipal Building, 2013 HB 2052 EXEMPT" or "State or Municipal Building, EXEMPT" shall be printed in boldface.

(d) "Conspicuously posted," when used to describe any sign specified in this regulation, shall mean that the sign meets the following requirements:

(1) Has a white background;

(2) includes the graphic design that is contained in the documents adopted in this regulation and that meets the following requirements:

(A) Depicts the handgun in black ink;

(B) depicts the circle with a diagonal slash across the handgun in red ink; and

(C) is at least six inches in diameter;

(3) contains no text or other markings within the one-inch area surrounding the graphic design;

(4) contains no text other than the text specified in the documents adopted in paragraph (c)(2);

(5) is visible from the exterior of the building and is not obstructed by doors, sliding doorways, displays, or other postings;

(6) is posted at the eye level of an adult, which shall mean that the entire sign is between four feet and six feet from the ground;

(7) is posted not more than 12 inches to the right or left of each exterior public and nonpublic entrance to the building; and

(8) is legible. Each sign that becomes illegible shall be replaced immediately.

(e) A copy of each sign that meets the requirements of subsection (b) or paragraph (c)(2) may be obtained by contacting the office of the attorney general or may be reproduced from the web site of the office of the attorney general. 102-7-3. Educational requirements. (a)(1) "Core faculty member" means an individual who is part of the teaching staff of a program covered by this regulation and who meets the following conditions:

(A) Has education, training, and experience consistent with the individual's role within the program and consistent with the published description of the goals, philosophy, and educational purpose of the program;

(B) has primary professional employment at the institution in which the program is housed; and

(C) is identified with the program and is centrally involved in program development, decision making, and student training as demonstrated by consistent inclusion of the individual's name in public and departmental documents.

(2) "In residence," when used to describe a student, means that the student is present at the physical location

of the institution or at any other location approved by the board for the purpose of completing coursework, during which the student and one or more core faculty members or adjunct faculty members are in face-to-face contact.

(3) "Primary professional employment" means at least 20 hours each week of instruction, research, or any other service to the institution in the course of employment, and related administrative work.

(4) "Skill-based coursework" means those courses that allow students to work on basic helping skills including open-ended questions, clarification, interpretation, response to feelings, and summarization.

(b) To qualify for licensure as an addiction counselor with a baccalaureate degree in addiction counseling or a baccalaureate degree in a related field that included all coursework requirements, the applicant shall hold one of the following:

(1) A baccalaureate degree in addiction counseling or a related field. When the degree was granted, the program met the standards approved by the board;

(2) a baccalaureate degree in addiction counseling or a related field, if the applicant began the program on or before May 1, 2011 and the baccalaureate degree is conferred on or before June 1, 2012, from a program that was approved by the Kansas department of social and rehabilitation services, division of addiction and prevention services; or

(3) a baccalaureate degree in addiction counseling or a related field, if the applicant began the program on or before June 30, 2012, from a program that included at least 30 semester hours, or the academic equivalent, in coursework on substance use disorders and that meets the coursework requirements in subsection (c).

(c) Each applicant for licensure as an addiction counselor shall have satisfactorily completed formal academic coursework that contributes to the development of a broad conceptual framework for addiction counseling theory and practice. This formal academic coursework shall be distributed across the substantive content areas specified in this subsection. For applicants who graduate on or after July 1, 2013, two of the following courses shall be completed while the student is in residence: methods of individual counseling, methods of group counseling, practicum one, or practicum two. A maximum of three semester hours, or the academic equivalent, may be completed in independent study. Except for the required courses in a practicum or its equivalent, there shall be at least three discrete and unduplicated semester hours, or the academic equivalent, in each of the following content areas:

(1) Introduction to addiction, which shall include the study of the nature of addiction and other substance use-related problems; models, theories, philosophies, principles, implications for medical and mental health conditions that coexist with addiction, and evidence-based strategies of addiction prevention, treatment, relapse prevention, continuing care, and recovery; and the impact of addiction on the individual, family, and society;

(2) methods of individual counseling, which shall include the study of culturally sensitive, ethical, evidence-based methods and approaches to individual counseling; methods for establishing effective therapeutic relation-

ships, developing realistic and achievable treatment goals, and assessing client substance use, functioning, motivation, and progress; and strategies for crisis prevention and intervention;

(3) methods of group counseling, which shall include the study of culturally sensitive, ethical, evidence-based models and approaches to group counseling; group facilitation and counseling skills; and methods for establishing group goals and treatment outcomes;

(4) addiction pharmacology, which shall include the study of the nature of psychoactive chemicals; the behavioral, psychological, physiological, and social effects of psychoactive substance use; symptoms of intoxication, withdrawal, and toxicity; toxicity screen options, limitations, and legal implications; and the use of pharmacotherapy for treatment of addiction;

(5) co-occurring disorders, which shall include the study of the symptoms of mental health and other disorders prevalent in individuals with substance use disorders, screening and assessment tools used to detect and evaluate the presence and severity of co-occurring disorders, and evidence-based strategies for managing risks associated with treating individuals who have co-occurring disorders;

(6) addiction services coordination, which shall include the study of administrative, clinical, evaluative, and referral activities used to connect clients with treatment services and other community resources; navigation and coordination across multiple systems; and case management and advocacy skills used to assist clients in achieving their treatment and recovery goals;

(7) legal and ethical issues, which shall include the study of established codes of ethical conduct, standards of professional behavior and scope of practice; client rights, responsibilities, and informed consent; and confidentiality and other legal considerations in counseling;

(8) family and community studies, which shall include the study of family, social, and community systems; the impact of addiction on the family and society; and the development of cultural competence in the treatment and recovery process;

(9) at least six semester credit hours, or the academic equivalent, of practicum or its equivalent, which shall include the following:

(A) An experience that integrates didactic learning that is related to substance use disorders with face-to-face, direct counseling experience that includes intake and assessment, counseling, treatment planning, discharge planning, documentation, and case management activities;

(B) at least 400 clock-hours of practice; and

(C) at least one hour of supervision for every 10 hours of practice. Supervision shall be provided by the educational program's faculty and agency staff, at least one of whom shall be licensed in the behavioral sciences; and

(10) for applicants who graduate on and after July 1, 2012, at least three discrete and unduplicated semester hours, or the academic equivalent, in the study of research, which shall include the study of basic research design and methodology; critical evaluation and interpretation of professional research reports; introduction to

(continued)

data collection, performance measurement, and outcome evaluation; and the application of research results in a treatment setting.

(d) To qualify for licensure as an addiction counselor with a baccalaureate degree in a related field with additional coursework in addiction counseling, the following requirements shall be met:

(1) The college or university at which the applicant completed a baccalaureate degree in a related field shall be regionally accredited with accreditation standards equivalent to those met by Kansas colleges and universities.

(2) The applicant shall meet the coursework requirements in subsection (c).

(3) The program through which the applicant obtained additional coursework in addiction counseling shall meet the standards approved by the board as specified in subsections (i) and (j).

(e) To qualify for licensure as an addiction counselor while holding a baccalaureate social work license in Kansas, the applicant shall complete the coursework specified in paragraphs (c)(1), (4), and (9).

(f) To qualify for licensure as a clinical addiction counselor with a master's degree in addiction counseling or a master's degree in a related field that included all coursework requirements, the applicant shall hold one of the following:

(1) A master's degree in addiction counseling or a related field. When the degree was granted, the program met the standards approved by the board;

(2) a master's degree in addiction counseling or a related field, if the applicant began the program on or before May 1, 2011 and the master's degree is conferred on or before June 1, 2012 from a program that was approved by the Kansas department of social and rehabilitation services, division of addiction and prevention services; or

(3) a master's degree in addiction counseling or a related field. Part of the coursework completed for the master's degree shall be at least 30 graduate semester credit hours, or the academic equivalent, supporting the diagnosis and treatment of substance use disorders and shall meet the coursework requirements in subsection (g).

(g) Each applicant for licensure as a clinical addiction counselor shall have satisfactorily completed formal academic coursework that contributes to the development of a broad conceptual framework for addiction counseling theory and practice. This formal academic coursework shall be distributed across the substantive content areas specified in this subsection. For applicants who graduate on or after July 1, 2013, half of all skill-based coursework shall be completed while the student is in residence, as defined in this regulation. A maximum of three graduate semester hours, or the academic equivalent, may be completed in independent study. There shall be at least three discrete and unduplicated graduate semester hours, or the academic equivalent, in each of the following content areas:

(1) Addiction and recovery services, which shall include the study and critical analysis of philosophies and theories of addiction and scientifically supported models of prevention, intervention, treatment, and recovery for addiction and other substance-related problems;

(2) advanced methods of individual and group counseling, which shall include the study of practical skills related to evidence-based, culturally sensitive individual and group counseling techniques and strategies designed to facilitate therapeutic relationships and the educational and psychosocial development of clients as specifically related to their addiction;

(3) advanced pharmacology and substance use disorders, which shall include the study of the pharmacological properties and effects of psychoactive substances; physiological, behavioral, psychological, and social effects of psychoactive substances; drug interactions; medication-assisted addiction treatment; and pharmacological issues related to co-occurring disorders treated with prescription psychotropic medications;

(4) integrative treatment of co-occurring disorders, which shall include the study of the relationship between addiction and co-occurring mental or physical disorders or other conditions and evidenced-based models for the screening, assessment, and collaborative treatment of co-occurring disorders;

(5) assessment and diagnosis, which shall include the study of a comprehensive clinical assessment process that addresses age, gender, disability, and cultural issues; the signs, symptoms, and diagnostic criteria used to establish substance use-disorder diagnoses; and the relationship between diagnosis, treatment, and recovery;

(6) professional ethics and practice, which shall include the study of professional codes of ethics and ethical decision making; client privacy rights and confidentiality; legal responsibilities and liabilities of clinical supervision; and professional identity and development issues;

(7) applied research, which shall include the study of the purposes and techniques of behavioral sciences research, including qualitative and quantitative approaches, research methodology, data collection and analysis, electronic research skills, outcome evaluation, critical evaluation and interpretation of professional research reports, and practical applications of research. A maximum of three semester hours, or the academic equivalent, may be completed in thesis or independent research courses;

(8) practicum or its equivalent, which shall meet the following requirements:

(A) Be a clinical experience that integrates didactic learning supporting the diagnosis and treatment of substance use disorders;

(B) include at least 300 hours of client contact; and

(C) provide at least one hour of supervision for every 10 hours of client contact. Supervision shall be provided by the program's faculty and agency supervisors, at least one of whom shall be licensed at the clinical level by the board; and

(9) six additional graduate semester hours of academic coursework that contributes to the development of advanced knowledge or skills in addiction counseling, supervision, or research.

(h) To qualify for licensure as a clinical addiction counselor with a master's degree in a related field with additional coursework in addiction counseling, the following requirements shall be met:

(1) The college or university at which the applicant completed a master's degree in a related field shall be regionally accredited with accreditation standards equivalent to those met by Kansas colleges and universities.

(2) The applicant shall meet the coursework requirements in subsection (g).

(3) The program through which the applicant obtained additional coursework in addiction counseling shall meet the standards approved by the board as specified in subsections (i) and (j).

(i) In order to be approved by the board, each addiction counseling program or related-field program, except the related-field degree listed in paragraphs (d)(1) and (h)(1), shall meet the following conditions:

(1) Have established program admission requirements that are based, in part or in full, on objective measures or standardized achievement tests and measures;

(2) offer education and training in addiction counseling, one goal of which is to prepare students for the practice of addiction counseling;

(3) require an established curriculum that encompasses at least one academic year of study for a baccalaureate degree or two academic years of study for a master's degree;

(4) have clear administrative authority and primary responsibility within the program for the core and specialty areas of training in addiction counseling;

(5) have an established, organized, and comprehensive sequence of study that is planned by administrators who are responsible for providing an integrated educational experience in addiction counseling;

(6) for a master's degree program, be coordinated or directed by an identifiable person who holds a graduate degree that was earned from a regionally accredited college or university upon that person's actual completion of a formal academic training program;

(7) have an identifiable, full-time core faculty member who holds an earned graduate degree in addiction counseling or a related field;

(8) have an established, identifiable body of students who are formally enrolled in the program with the goal of obtaining coursework for the concentration in the study of addiction counseling;

(9) require the student's major advisor to be a member of the program faculty;

(10) require each student to complete the institution's requirements for the number of credit hours that must be completed at that institution and to satisfactorily complete an addiction counseling practicum or its equivalent that is provided by the program from which the student completes the concentration in the study of addiction counseling. The required practicum shall meet the following requirements:

(A) Accept as practicum students only applicants enrolled in the addiction counseling or related-field program;

(B) provide the majority of supervision by an individual who is licensed at the clinical level by the board;

(C) exist as a distinct and organized program that is clearly recognizable within an institution or agency, as well as in pertinent public, official documents issued by

the institution or agency, and that is clearly recognizable as a training program for addiction counselors;

(D) identify students as being in training and not as staff members; and

(E) be an integrated and formally organized training experience, not an after-the-fact tabulation of experience; and

(11) conduct an ongoing, objective review and evaluation of each student's learning and progress and report this evaluation in the official student transcripts.

(j) In order to be approved by the board, each addiction counseling program or related-field program, except the related-field degree listed in paragraphs (d)(1) and (h)(1), shall meet the following requirements:

(1) Be regionally accredited, with accreditation standards equivalent to those met by Kansas colleges and universities;

(2) document in official publications, including course catalogs and announcements, the program description and standards and the admission requirements for the addiction counseling or related-field education and training program;

(3) identify and clearly describe in pertinent institutional catalogs the coursework, experiential, and other academic program requirements that must be satisfied before conferral of the degree;

(4) clearly identify and specify in pertinent institutional catalogs the intent to educate and train addiction counselors;

(5) have clearly established the addiction counselor or related-field education program as a coherent entity within the college or university that, when the applicant's degree was conferred, met the program standards in subsection (i);

(6) have conferred the degree upon the applicant's successful completion of an established and required formal program of studies; and

(7) have a library and equipment and resources available that are adequate for the size of the student body and the scope of the program offered.

(k) The following types of study shall not be substituted for or counted toward the coursework requirements of this regulation:

(1) Academic coursework that has been audited rather than graded;

(2) academic coursework for which the applicant received an incomplete or failing grade;

(3) coursework that the board determines is not closely related to the field or practice of addiction counseling;

(4) coursework or training provided by any college, university, institute, or training program that does not meet the requirements of subsections (i) and (j); and

(5) any continuing education, in-service activity, or on-the-job training. Temporary Administrative Regulations

Article 2.—LOTTERY RETAILERS

111-2-308. GasMart gas give-a-way. (a) During the term of this promotion with participating chain number 1694 GasMart USA stores in Kansas, for every Super Kansas Cash single ticket purchase of \$3 or more, the player shall receive an entry for the "GasMart Gas Give-A-Way" promotion drawing. Lottery terminals shall automatically dispense an entry form for each \$3 or more Super Kansas Cash single ticket purchase at participating GasMart Kansas lottery retailers during the term of this promotion. The qualifying Super Kansas Cash purchase may be for a single draw or for multiple draws.

(b) The term of this promotion shall be from the start of the business day on May 19, 2013, through the end of the business day as defined in K.A.R. 111-6-1(p) on June 15, 2013.

(c) During the term of this promotion, drop boxes for the deposit of entries shall be provided by the lottery and placed at all participating GasMart locations. All drop boxes shall be retrieved by the Kansas lottery at the end of the promotion.

(d) A player shall complete the entry form provided in its entirety and place that entry form into the drop box at all participating GasMart retailers.

(e) After the term of this promotion has ended, all entries will be combined by the Kansas lottery pursuant to standard lottery drawing procedures. The first entry drawn will win \$200 in gas. The second and third entries drawn will each win \$100 in gas. After the first, second, and third entries have been drawn, four additional entries will be drawn. Each of the four additional entries drawn will win \$75 in gas. After the four additional entries have been drawn, six additional entries will be drawn. Each of the six additional entries drawn will win \$50 in gas.

(f) The Kansas lottery will award the GasMart chain \$1,000 in instant ticket credit.

(g) The drawing is to be held during the week of June 24, 2013, at the GasMart corporate office. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-5-31-13, April 17, 2013.)

111-2-309. Method of entry. (a) Entry into the "GasMart Gas Give-A-Way" promotion shall be accomplished as follows:

(1) During the term of this promotion, with every qualifying purchase of \$3 or more Super Kansas Cash on a single ticket, an entry form shall be automatically produced by the lottery online terminal.

(2) The purchaser must complete the information on the entry form in a legible manner. Only one name shall appear on each entry form.

(3) The completed entry form must be placed into the designated drawing receptacle provided at any participating GasMart store no later than the close of business for that store on June 15, 2013, or June 16, 2013.

(4) The holder of the entry is not required to personally attend the drawing or be present at the time of the drawing to be determined a winner.

(5) The drawing shall be conducted at GasMart's corporate office after the entry deadline for the promotion. After 13 entries are drawn by lottery personnel pursuant to standard Kansas lottery procedures as the winners of prizes identified in K.A.R. 111-2-308(e), two alternate entries for each of the 13 prizes shall be drawn by lottery personnel.

(6) Entry forms obtained during the stated period of time may be entered in the drawing.

(b) There is no limit on the number of entries a person may make, but each person may only win once regardless of the place of entry.

(c) The completed entry form must be placed into the designated drawing receptacle provided at any participating GasMart store no later than the close of business for that store on June 15, or June 16, 2013.

(d) Eligible entrants or winners in the promotion must be 18 years of age or older, and may not be an employee of any GasMart store in Kansas.

(e) Completing the information form on the entry form and entering the ticket into any drawing constitutes authorization to publicly identify the person whose entry is drawn.

(f) Prize winners will be notified by telephone by a Kansas lottery staff member. After lottery staff verify that the winning entry is a valid winner, the gas card prize will be mailed to the winner via express mail by the Kansas lottery or GasMart. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-5-31-13, April 17, 2013.)

111-2-310. Sizzling summer sales retailer incentive promotion. (a) In addition to any compensation awarded a retailer for lottery product sales, the lottery will also offer the following as additional incentive to enhance the sale of all lottery tickets at authorized retailer locations:

(a) The sales program will commence at start of the business day as defined in subsection (p) of K.A.R. 111-6-1, on May 1, 2013, and end at the close of the lottery business day on June 30, 2013.

(b) Kansas lottery retailers who are authorized to sell instant tickets are eligible to participate based upon an increase in their "base sales total." The "base sales total" is arrived at by computing that retailer's total lottery instant ticket sales for May 1, 2012, through June 30, 2012, as compared with instant ticket sales during May 1, 2013, through June 30, 2013. If retailer has no base sales during May 1, 2012, through June 30, 2012, then base criteria will be sales during February 1, 2013 through March 31, 2013. If retailer's sales base is less than \$300, their base will be set at \$300 and their goal will be \$600 for the promotion. Sales are based on pack settlements during promotional period.

(c) Totals will be calculated prior to the drawing which will be conducted on August 16, 2013. Ticket returns by the retailer may lower the percentage increase and may make retailer ineligible for the drawing.

(d) Each retailer in this promotion is eligible to receive an additional incentive at one of the following levels:

(1) If sales increase more than 15.01 percent above the base sales total, a retailer shall receive an entry to win one

of 10 prizes of three free packs of instant scratch tickets as determined by the Kansas lottery.

(2) If sales increase between 10.01 percent and 15.00 percent above the base sales total, a retailer shall receive an entry to win one of 15 prizes of two free packs of instant scratch tickets as determined by the Kansas lottery.

(3) If sales increase between 5.00 percent and 10.00 percent above the base sales total, a retailer shall receive an entry to win one of 25 prizes of a free pack of instant scratch tickets as determined by the Kansas lottery.
