Jayhawk Fine Chemicals produces specialty chemicals that are used as epoxy curing agents, as intermediates in the production of high temperature polymers, and for the pharmaceutical and agricultural industries. Laboratory rinse, boiler blowdown, cooling tower blowdown, steam condensate, and sandvik cooling water, commingled with contaminated groundwater and stormwater runoff (001AG), are directed to a constructed wetland treatment system for treatment prior to discharge (Outfall 001A1) to the Lake Oxbow and intermittently to the Spring River (Outfall 002). A portion of the recovered water from the treatment processes is used for cooling tower make-up water. The average wastewater flow received for treatment from this facility is about 0.072 million gallons per day. The proposed permit requires monitoring for nitrate + nitrite, ammonia, sulfates, total dissolved solids, VOCs and effluent flow.

Persons wishing to comment on the draft documents and/or permit applications must submit their comments in writing to the Kansas Department of Health and Environment if they wish to have the comments considered in the decision-making process. All comments regarding the draft documents or application notices received on or before October 19 will be considered in the formulation of the final determinations regarding this public notice. After review of any comments received during the public notice period, the secretary of the Department of Health and Environment will issue a determination regarding final agency action on each draft document/application. If response to any draft document/application indicates significant public interest, a public hearing may be held in conformance with K.A.R. 28-16-61 (28-46-21 for UIC).

All draft documents/applications and the supporting information including any comments received are on file and may be inspected at the offices of the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Bureau of Water. These documents are available upon request at the copying cost assessed by KDHE. A summary of the proposed regulations follows. There is no anticipated economic impact on the Board of Technical Professions, any other governmental agency or the public.

K.A.R. 66-6-1. Seals and signatures. This regulation is being revised to clarify the licensee's name on the seal. Language is added to clarify when a professional seal is required.

K.A.R. 66-8-3. Engineering examinations. Language has been added to this regulation to specify that an applicant must meet certain educational requirements.

K.A.R. 66-8-6. Reexamination. This regulation is being revised to change language to indicate "possible" violations of any testing agreement.

K.A.R. 66-9-7. Educational standard acceptable to the board for reciprocity applicants. This regulation is being revised to adopt by reference the most current edition of the architectural certification guidelines.

K.A.R. 66-10-1. Architectural experience of a character satisfactory to the board. This regulation is being revised to adopt by reference the most current edition of the intern development program guidelines.

K.A.R. 66-10-3. Architectural experience required of a reciprocity applicant. This regulation is being revised to adopt by reference the most current edition of the architectural certification guidelines.

K.A.R. 66-10-9. Engineering experience of a character that is satisfactory to the board. This regulation is being revised to add the requirement that acceptable experience must include at least two years of engineering experience gained in the United States. Clarification is being made concerning concurrent experience credits.

K.A.R. 66-10-13. Geology experience of a character that is satisfactory to the board. This regulation is being revised to clarify who may provide references.

K.A.R. 66-10-14. Professional engineering, land surveying, and geology experience standards acceptable to the board for reciprocity applicants. This regulation is revised to require that those individuals supplying references for an engineering applicant must be licensed in the United States. Revisions also clarify who may provide references for geology applicants.

K.A.R. 66-11-1. Intern engineer certificate. This regulation is revised to add the requirement of an application form and approval by the board.

K.A.R. 66-11-2. This regulation is being revoked due to changes in the fundamentals of engineering exam process.

K.A.R. 66-14-1. Requirements. This regulation is revised to add the requirement that a provider of a continuing education activity on the Kansas minimum standards must be preapproved by the board and the conditions for approval.

Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of changes to an existing rule and regulation on a (continued) permanent basis effective 15 days after publication in the Kansas Register. Telephone conference is not available.

Chapter 187, 2005 Session Laws of Kansas transferred specific powers, duties and regulatory authority from the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services to the Division of Health Policy and Finance (DHPF) within the Department of Administration, and then transferred those powers, duties and regulatory authority to the Kansas Health Policy Authority (KHPA), effective July 1, 2006. Executive Reorganization Order (ERO) No. 38 has transferred these powers, duties and regulatory authority to the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Division of Health Care Finance. The ERO provides that KDHE will be the single state agency for Medicaid, Medikan and HealthWave in Kansas effective July 1, 2011.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the proposed regulation as stated in K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 77-421(a)(3). All interested parties may submit written comments before the hearing to Rita Haverkamp, KDHE, Division of Health Care Finance, Room 900-N, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. A summary of the regulation and the economic impact follows:

Article 10.—ADULT CARE HOME PROGRAM

129-10-31. Responsibilities of, assessment of, and disbursements for the nursing facility quality care assessment program.

Summary of Proposed Changes: This change would increase the quality care assessment from \$1,500 per bed per year to the statutory limit of \$1,950 per bed per year effective January 1, 2014. K.S.A. 75-7435 pertains to quality care assessments in skilled nursing care facilities. The statute was amended in 2012 allowing a uniform assessment per licensed bed not to exceed \$1,950. Assessments must be made pursuant to rules and regulations adopted by the secretary of the Kansas Department of Health and Environment. The annual amount of the assessment is to be paid quarterly, with one-fourth due by the 30th day after the end of the month of each calendar quarter.

Federal Mandate: There is no federal mandate.

<u>Economic Impact</u>: It is estimated that the nursing facility quality care assessment will generate \$17,762,000 during state fiscal year (SFY) 2014 without the increased assessment rate. With the increased assessment rate the assessment revenue is projected to be \$20,426,300. The additional \$2,664,300 in assessment revenue would allow for reimbursement system changes resulting in a total of \$5,924,617 of additional program expenditures, including \$3,260,317 in federal matching funds. With the increased assessment rate the assessment revenue in SFY 2015 is projected to be \$23,090,600. The additional \$5,328,600 in assessment revenue would allow for reimbursement system changes resulting in a total of \$11,849,233 of additional program expenditures, including \$6,520,633 in federal matching funds.

<u>Bearer of Cost</u>: Licensed nursing facilities (including long-term care units attached to hospitals).

<u>Affected Parties</u>: Licensed nursing facilities, nursing facility residents, KDHE and KDADS.

<u>Other Methods</u>: The agencies considered leaving the assessment rate at \$1,500 and also considered adjusting the thresholds for defining small nursing homes and high Medicaid nursing homes. The agencies believe this change will produce the most positive fiscal impact for all stakeholders.

Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 7.—MOVEMENT OF LIVESTOCK INTO OR THROUGH KANSAS

9-7-4. Cattle. (a) Tuberculosis.

(1) Breeding cattle six months of age and over shall not be imported into Kansas unless accompanied by an official health certificate showing that the cattle meet the following requirements:

(A) Originated in a herd accredited to be tuberculosisfree;

(B) originated in a tuberculosis-free state; or

(C) have been tested and were found negative for tuberculosis within 60 days before date of entry.

(2) Dairy cattle that are used for breeding and are six months of age or older shall originate from a herd accredited to be tuberculosis-free or shall be tested negative for tuberculosis within 60 days before entry.

(b) Brucellosis.

(1) Brucellosis tests, regardless of method, shall be conducted at a laboratory approved by the United States department of agriculture, animal and plant health inspection service (APHIS).

(2) Breeding cattle six months of age or over imported into Kansas shall meet interstate requirements according to state certification, as outlined in chapter 2 of the United States department of agriculture's document titled "brucellosis eradication: uniform methods and rules, effective October 1, 2003," APHIS publication 91-45-013. The fol-

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lowing portions of this document are hereby adopted by reference:

(A) In chapter 1, part I; and

(B) chapter 2.

(c) Trichomoniasis.

(1) Bulls shall not be imported into Kansas from another state unless they go directly to a licensed slaughter plant or an approved Kansas livestock market, go for feeding purposes only, or are accompanied by a completed certificate of veterinary inspection. The certificate of veterinary inspection shall meet the following requirements:

(A) Have been issued within the past 30 days; and

(B) state whether, to the veterinarian's knowledge, trichomoniasis has occurred in the herd of origin within the past two years.

(2) Virgin bulls 18 months of age or younger shall not be imported into Kansas from another state unless these bulls are accompanied by a statement attached to the certificate of veterinary inspection. The statement shall be signed by the owner or owner's representative and shall indicate that the bulls have not been sexually exposed to breeding-aged females.

(3) With the exception of bulls exempted in paragraph (c)(4), non-virgin bulls, bulls older than 18 months of age, and bulls of unknown virginity status shall not be imported into Kansas from another state unless these bulls are certified negative for Tritrichomonas foetus, as specified in paragraph (c)(9). A copy of the test results shall be attached to the certificate of veterinary inspection.

(4) Each bull going to a sanctioned rodeo event or to a livestock show where the bull will be shown and then returned to the state of origin without being sexually exposed to any breeding-aged females shall be exempt from the testing requirements of paragraph (c)(3).

(5) Cows and heifers shall not be imported into Kansas from another state unless the cows and heifers go directly to a licensed slaughter plant or an approved Kansas livestock market or are accompanied by a completed certificate of veterinary inspection. The certificate of veterinary inspection shall meet the following requirements:

(A) Have been issued within the past 30 days; and

(B) document that the cows and heifers meet at least one of the following conditions:

(i) Have a calf at side and no exposure since parturition to other than bulls that are certified negative;

(ii) are at least 120 days pregnant;

(iii) are virgin heifers with no sexual exposure to bulls since weaning;

(iv) are documented to have had at least 120 days of sexual isolation;

(v) are heifers or cows exposed only to bulls that are certified negative;

(vi) are purchased for feeding purposes only, with no exposure to bulls after entering Kansas; or

(viii) are moving for the purpose of embryo transfer or other artificial reproduction procedure, with no exposure to bulls after entering Kansas.

(6)(A) Except as provided in paragraph (c)(6)(B), if any non-virgin bull, bull older than 18 months of age, or bull of unknown virginity status changes ownership in Kansas by private sale, public sale, lease, trade, or barter but does not go directly to slaughter, that bull shall be required to be certified negative within 60 days before the change of ownership. Following the test, the owner shall ensure that no female contact occurs before the change of ownership. Each bull that has had contact with any female cattle after the testing shall be retested before movement.

(B) If an individual has a herd management plan to reduce risk of trichomoniasis that has been approved by the commissioner, virgin bulls 24 months of age or younger included within the approved plan shall not be required to be certified negative when changing ownership in Kansas. However, non-virgin bulls, virgin bulls older than 24 months of age, and bulls of unknown virginity status shall be certified negative before changing ownership in Kansas even if these bulls originate from a herd with an approved plan.

(C) Each non-virgin bull, bull older than 18 months of age, and bull of unknown virginity status sold at a livestock market shall have a negative trichomoniasis test, be purchased for feeding purposes only, or go directly to slaughter.

(7) Each bull in Kansas that tests positive for trichomoniasis shall be sold directly for slaughter.

(8) The owner or person in charge of cattle who has reason to believe at least one of those cattle is affected with trichomoniasis shall report this belief to the commissioner as required by K.S.A. 47-622, and amendments thereto, and K.A.R. 9-27-1.

(9) As used in this subsection, "certified negative" shall mean that the sample from a bull has been found negative for Tritrichomonas foetus on one real-time polymerase chain reaction (PCR) test.

The bull shall be individually identified by an official identification method approved by the commissioner. The sample shall be collected by a veterinarian who has participated in trichomoniasis training approved by the commissioner. This training shall include preputial sampling, sample handling and shipping, appropriate recordkeeping, and official animal identification. This training shall be repeated every five years.

Each sample shall be collected into and transported to the lab using a test kit system approved by the commissioner. The sample shall have been submitted for testing to a laboratory approved by the commissioner utilizing a form supplied by the commissioner. On this form, the veterinarian shall be listed, and the owner shall certify that the bull had had at least 14 days of sexual rest before the sample was collected. Certified negative test results shall be valid for 60 days from the time the sample was collected if no female contact occurs during this period.
