2013 Update to Guidelines for Takings of Private Property

The Private Property Protection Act, K.S.A. 77-701 *et seq.*, requires the Attorney General to compile and annually update guidelines to be used by state agencies in determining whether proposed government action may constitute a taking of private property. These guidelines are to be based on cases decided by the United States Supreme Court and the Kansas Supreme Court.¹ Government action is defined as legislation, regulations or directives, or agency guidelines and procedures for the issuing of licenses or permits.² The Act expressly excludes other types of activity, such as the formal exercise of eminent domain.³

Under the criteria of the Act, there is one case to include in the 2013 update to the Attorney General's Guidelines⁴:

In *Koontz v. St. Johns River Water Management District*, 507 U.S. ____, 133 S. Ct. 2586 (2013), a water management district denied a property owner's request for a land use permit but stated that the permit would be approved if the property owner paid for improvements to land owned by the district a few miles away. The property owner sued, claiming that the district's demand violated the U.S. Supreme Court's decisions in *Nollan v. California Coastal Commission*, 483 U.S. 825 (1987), and *Dolan v. City of Tigard*, 512 U.S. 374 (1994). These cases held that a taking occurs when the government conditions approval of a land use permit on a property owner's agreement to

give up a property interest and there is not a "nexus" and "rough proportionality" between the government's demand and the effects of the requested land use.

The Florida Supreme Court concluded that no Takings Clause violation occurred because (1) *Nollan* and *Dolan* only apply when a permit is conditionally granted, not when a permit is denied, and (2) *Nollan* and *Dolan* do not govern when the government demands money, rather than an interest in real property, in exchange for a land use permit.

The U.S. Supreme Court reversed, rejecting both of these conclusions. The Justices unanimously agreed that there is no distinction between conditionally granting a land use permit and denying a land use permit while stating that the permit will be approved if certain conditions are met. On the second issue, the Court split 5-4, with the majority concluding that demands for money can give rise to a takings claim. While recognizing that taxes and user fees are not takings, the Court held that monetary exactions that burden a specific parcel of land must satisfy the nexus and rough proportionality requirements of *Nollan* and *Dolan*.

**Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations**

A public hearing will be conducted at 1:30 p.m. Thursday, March 6, in Room 1051 of the Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in four existing rules and regulations relating to renewal fees for registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, licensed mental health technicians, advance practice registered nurses, and registered nurse anesthetists. The proposed changes will decrease the renewal fees in all four regulations.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the executive administrator of the Board of Nursing, Room 1051, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views, orally or in writing, concerning the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. Phone comments will be taken by calling 877-278-8686 (access code 495187) at 1:30 p.m. the day of the hearing. In order to give all persons the opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentations to five minutes.

A summary of the proposed regulations and the economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 60-4-101. Payment of fees. The proposed language decreases the biennial renewal fee for the registered nurse and the licensed practical nurse by \$5.00. The proposed language will change the renewal fee from \$60.00 to \$55.00. This will be an approximately \$151,045.00 annual decrease of revenue for the Kansas State Board of Nursing and each registered nurse and licensed practical nurse will save \$5.00 when they renew their license. There is no economic impact for other governmental entities or private business.

K.A.R. 60-8-101. Payment of fees. The proposed language decreases the biennial renewal fee for the licensed

mental health technician by \$5.00. The proposed language will change the renewal fee from \$60.00 to \$55.00. This will be an approximately \$440.00 decrease of revenue every other year for the Kansas State Board of Nursing and each licensed mental health technician will save \$5.00 when they renew their license. There is no economic impact for other governmental entities or private business.

K.A.R. 60-11-119. Payment of fees. The proposed language decreases the biennial renewal fee for the advanced practice registered nurse by \$5.00. The proposed language will change the renewal fee from \$60.00 to \$55.00. This will be an approximately \$7,955.00 annual decrease of revenue for the Kansas State Board of Nursing and each advanced practice registered nurse will save \$5.00 when they renew their license. There is no economic impact for other governmental entities or private business.

K.A.R. 60-13-101. Payment of fees. The proposed language decreases the biennial renewal fee for the registered nurse anesthetist by \$5.00. The proposed language will change the renewal fee from \$60.00 to \$55.00. This will be an approximately \$2,340.00 annual decrease of revenue for the Kansas State Board of Nursing and each registered nurse anesthetist will save \$5.00 when they renew their license. There is no economic impact for other governmental entities or private business.

Request for Comments

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment received Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) hazardous waste Part A and Part B permit renewal applications from Safety-Kleen Systems, Inc. (operator) and David R. Ruffin (owner). The facility is located at 600 E. Trail St., Dodge City, Kansas, and has an EPA identification number KSD980686844.

KDHE is providing notice of its intent to renew the RCRA hazardous waste management permit for the facility. The facility will be permitted for storage of hazardous waste in approved containers and tanks, in accordance with 40 CFR 264 Subpart I and J, in the hazardous waste storage area. The container storage area will be permitted to handle a maximum capacity of 2,304 gallons. The tank storage units will be permitted to handle a maximum capacity of 10,125 gallons.

In October 1985, the state of Kansas received final authorization from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to implement a hazardous waste management program in lieu of the federal program, except for those portions covered by the 1984 Hazardous and Solid Waste Amendments (HSWA). Prior to 1985, KDHE had interim authorization to implement the program under EPA supervision. In September 2013, authority for the corrective action portion of the RCRA program was delegated to the state of Kansas.

The draft permit sets forth in a concise document all of the applicable requirements that KDHE will require the permittee to comply with during the 10-year duration of the permit. The draft hazardous waste permit includes standard permit conditions, general facility conditions, provisions for storage in containers and tanks, and air emission standards, as well as corrective action requirements. Section VI addresses corrective action for all releases or future releases of hazardous waste or hazardous constituents from any solid waste management unit (SWMU) or area of concern (AOC) at this facility. Section VI includes general conditions, process steps and a facility submission summary for corrective action activities.

The draft permit is being considered for issuance under authority of K.S.A. 65-3430 et seq. and K.A.R. 28-31-4 through 28-31-279a, and Subtitle C of RCRA, as amended by HSWA. Documents that support the permit conditions specified in the draft permit are part of the administrative record. Applicable regulations are found in 40 CFR Parts 124, 260 through 264, 268 and 270, as specified in this permit. All citations found in the draft permit to federal regulations are for the sake of convenience. Some modifications to federal regulations by applicable state regulations are noted in this permit, but all modifications to federal regulations by state regulations are incorporated. To the extent that state regulations exclude any sections of applicable federal regulations, those sections are not in effect. In the instance of inconsistent language or discrepancies between conditions found in the permit, state regulations or federal regulations, the language of the more

stringent provision will govern; otherwise, state law governs.

State hazardous waste laws require that the public be given at least 45 days to review the administrative record for the draft permit prior to KDHE taking a final action. The purpose of having a public comment period is to ensure that interested parties have the opportunity to evaluate the conditions specified in the draft permit and to provide their input into the permit decision-making process. A copy of the administrative record, which includes the draft permit, the fact sheet, the permit application and all information pertaining to this permit action, is available for public review January 2-February 18, Monday through Friday, during normal business hours, at the following locations:

As specified in 40 CFR 124.11, during the public comment period any interested person may request a public hearing in writing, which states the nature of the issues proposed to be raised in a public hearing. In the event that a hearing is scheduled, advance notice of the date will be given to the public. In accordance with 40 CFR 124.12, during a public hearing any person may submit oral or written statements and data concerning the draft permit or Part B application. The secretary of KDHE will make the decision regarding the issuance of the permit after the close of the public comment period. The secretary will consider all comments received during the public hearing and comment period.

When the final decision to issue or deny the permit is made, notice will be given to the applicant, to all persons who submitted written comments, and to those who requested notice of the final permit decision. If none of the comments received during the public comment period results in revisions to the draft permit, the permit will become effective immediately upon issuance of the final permit decision. If comments received during the public comment period result in revisions, the permit will become effective 30 days after service of notice of the final decision to allow for public review of the revisions in accordance with 40 CFR 124.15 and K.A.R. 28-31-124(c)(8). Appeals of the final permit decision for the permit must be filed within 15 days after service of notice in accordance with K.S.A. 65-3440 and K.S.A. 77-601 et seq.

Failure to complete the required contract provision and certify the completeness of the preceding statement when electronically signing the proposal will make the bid nonresponsive and not eligible for award consideration.

Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 31.—ACCREDITATION

91-31-32. Performance and quality criteria. (a)

Each school shall be assigned its accreditation status based upon the extent to which the school has met the performance and quality criteria established by the state board in this regulation.

(b) The performance criteria shall be as follows:

(1) Except as provided in subsection (d), having met the percentage prescribed by the state board of students performing at or above the proficient level on state assessments or having increased overall student achievement by a percentage prescribed by the state board;

(2) having 95% or more of all students and 95% or more of each student subgroup take the state assessments;

(3) having an attendance rate equal to or greater than that prescribed by the state board; and

(4) for high schools, having a graduation rate equal to or greater than that prescribed by the state board.

(c) The quality criteria shall consist of the following quality measures, which shall be required to be in place at each school:

(1) A school improvement plan that includes a results-based staff development plan;

(2) an external technical assistance team;

(3) locally determined assessments that are aligned with the state standards;

(4) formal training for teachers regarding the state assessments and curriculum standards;

(5) 100% of the teachers assigned to teach in those areas assessed by the state or described as core academic subjects by the United States department of education, and 95% or more of all other faculty, fully certified for the positions they hold;

(6) policies that meet the requirements of S.B.R. 91-31-34;

(7) local graduation requirements that include at least those requirements imposed by the state board;

(8) curricula that allow each student to meet the regent's qualified admissions requirements and the state scholarship program;

(continued)

(9) programs and services to support student learning and growth at both the elementary and secondary levels, including the following:

- (A) Computer literacy;
- (B) counseling services;
- (C) fine arts;
- (D) language arts;
- (E) library services;
- (F) mathematics;
- (G) physical education, which shall include instruction in health and human sexuality;
- (H) science;
- (I) services for students with special learning needs; and

(J) history, government, and celebrate freedom week. Each local board of education shall include the following in its history and government curriculum:

(i) Within one of the grades seven through 12, a course of instruction in Kansas history and government. The course of instruction shall be offered for at least nine consecutive weeks. The local board of education shall waive this requirement for any student who transfers into the district at a grade level above that in which the course is taught; and

(ii) for grades kindergarten through eight, instruction concerning the original intent, meaning, and importance of the declaration of independence and the United States constitution, including the bill of rights, in their historical contexts, pursuant to L. 2013, ch. 121, sec. 2 and amendments thereto. The study of the declaration of independence shall include the study of the relationship of the ideas expressed in that document to subsequent American history;

(10) programs and services to support student learning and growth at the secondary level, including the following:

- (A) Business;
- (B) family and consumer science;
- (C) foreign language; and
- (D) industrial and technical education; and
- (11) local policies ensuring compliance with other accreditation regulations and state education laws.

(d) If the grade configuration of a school does not include any of the grades included in the state assessment program, the school shall use an assessment that is aligned with the state standards. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution and K.S.A. 2013 Supp. 72-1130; effective July 1, 2005; amended Jan. 10, 2014.)

Crime Victims Compensation Board

Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 1.—DEFINITIONS

20-1-1. Definitions. For the purpose of the act and the board's regulations, each of the following terms shall have the meaning specified in this regulation:

(a) "Accomplice" means one who unites with another in a crime, by aiding or abetting in the crime, by advising or encouraging the crime, or by inciting the criminal conduct causing the claimant's injury.

(b) "Act" means K.S.A. 74-7301 et seq., and amendments thereto.

(c) "Allowable expense" means "allowance expense" as defined in K.S.A. 74-7301, and amendments thereto.

(d) "Extenuating circumstances" means facts that cause reasonable charges for reasonably needed mental health counseling to exceed the presumptive limits specified in K.A.R. 20-2-3.

(e) "Grief therapy" means the counseling or treatment of a victim by reason of family grief.

(f) "Mental health counseling" means a confidential service that provides problem solving and support concerning emotional issues that result from criminal victimization. Mental health counseling has as its primary purpose the enhancement, protection, and restoration of the victim's sense of well-being and social functioning skills. This term shall not include any of the following:

(1) Efforts to verify or validate claims or reports of criminally injurious conduct;

(2) advocacy functions, including attendance at medical or law enforcement procedures or criminal justice proceedings; or

(3) crisis telephone counseling.

(g) "Victim by reason of family grief" means the spouse, children, siblings, parents, legal guardian, step-parents, and grandparents of a homicide victim. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-7304; effective May 1, 1980; amended May 1, 1984; amended Nov. 15, 1993; amended Jan. 10, 2014.)

20-1-2. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1979 Supp. 74-7304; effective May 1, 1980; revoked Jan. 10, 2014.)

Article 2.—CLAIMS

20-2-1. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-7304; effective May 1, 1980; amended May 1, 1984; revoked Jan. 10, 2014.)

20-2-2. Cooperation with the board. (a) All claimants and claimants' attorneys shall fully cooperate with the board and the board's investigators, agents, and representatives. If a claimant or a claimant's attorney fails to fully cooperate, the claim may be reduced or denied by the board.

(b) Failure to fully cooperate shall include the following:

(1) Failing to fully complete the application for compensation provided by the board;

(2) not responding to requests for information or evidence; and

(3) knowingly making false statements to the board or the board’s investigators, agents, and representatives. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7304; implementing K.S.A. 74-7304 and 74-7309; effective May 1, 1980; amended May 1, 1984; amended Jan. 10, 2014.)

20-2-3. Mental health counseling award. Each mental health counseling award shall be subject to the limitations specified in this regulation.

(a) Any victim of a crime may be considered for up to a \$5,000 mental health counseling award.

(1) A standard treatment plan based on this limit shall be approved by the board.

(2) Compensation beyond the \$5,000 maximum for mental health counseling may be awarded if the board finds that extenuating circumstances justify this action and this action is supported by information, reports, or a mental health treatment plan and by recommendations of a mental health counseling provider or physician.

(3) The award for a mental health evaluation shall not exceed \$350, which may be in addition to the \$5,000 maximum. For purposes of this paragraph, mental health evaluation shall mean a diagnostic interview examination, including history, mental status, or disposition, that is administered in order to determine a plan of mental health treatment.

(b) Each victim by reason of family grief may be considered for up to a \$1,500 grief therapy award. Compensation beyond the \$1,500 maximum may be awarded if the board finds that extenuating circumstances justify this action and this action is supported by information, reports, or a mental health treatment plan and by recommendations of a mental health counseling provider or physician.

(c) If the mental health treatment plan for a victim requires that others, not including the offender, be involved in treatment, costs for third-party mental health counseling may be compensable up to the \$5,000 maximum, if the third-party mental health counseling is directly and beneficially related to the plan for treatment of the victim. Mental health counseling involving a third party shall not be compensable unless both of the following conditions are met:

(1) The primary victim is present in the mental health counseling sessions, or the focus of the treatment is to assist in the victim’s recovery.

(2) The mental health treatment plan addresses the need for third-party mental health counseling.

(d) Compensable mental health counseling may be provided in either of the following:

(1) A medical or psychiatric setting under the supervision of a medical doctor or a psychiatrist licensed or registered by the Kansas board of healing arts or comparable governmental agencies in other jurisdictions having similar licensure or registration requirements. The costs of this mental health counseling incurred during inpatient treatment shall be applied toward the maximum claim for inpatient treatment; or

(2) a nonmedical setting by an individual licensed or registered by the Kansas behavioral sciences regulatory

board, the Kansas board of healing arts, or comparable governmental agencies in other jurisdictions having similar licensure or registration requirements, if the mental health counseling falls within the professional parameters of the provider’s license or registration.

(e) Compensation for inpatient hospitalization shall be considered only if the condition is life-threatening and the hospitalization has been recommended by the victim’s physician or mental health counseling provider. Reimbursement for each instance of inpatient treatment and care shall not exceed the cost of treatment for a period of 10 days or \$10,000, whichever is less. Compensation beyond the \$10,000 maximum may be awarded if the board finds that extenuating circumstances justify this action and this action is supported by information, reports, or a mental health treatment plan and by recommendations of a mental health counseling provider or physician.

(f) The following limits on mental health counseling rates shall apply to outpatient mental health counseling:

(1) Individual and family mental health counseling in a nonmedical setting\$90 per hour

(2) Group therapy\$60 per hour

These rates shall apply to individuals performing treatment. Compensation shall not be awarded to pay the costs of persons supervising treatment.

(g) If it is apparent from the treatment plan that the treatment is addressing issues not directly related to the crime, only that portion of the treatment that is addressing the victimization shall be compensable.

(h) Compensation for mental health counseling shall be based on the version of this regulation that was in effect when the service was provided. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7304; implementing K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 74-7301; effective Nov. 15, 1993; amended Jan. 10, 2014.)

20-2-4. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7304; implementing K.S.A. 74-7314; effective May 1, 1980; amended May 1, 1984; revoked Jan. 10, 2014.)

20-2-7. Cooperation with law enforcement. (a) For the purpose of K.S.A. 74-7305 and amendments thereto, full cooperation with appropriate law enforcement agencies shall include the following:

(1) Reporting the crime in a timely manner to permit law enforcement agencies to investigate, identify, and charge those responsible for the crime;

(2) providing information, upon request, to law enforcement officers and prosecutors investigating the crime;

(3) cooperating with law enforcement procedures;

(4) appearing in court to testify as required, unless just cause is shown for any failure to appear; and

(5) requesting that the offender be prosecuted, which is commonly known as “pressing charges.”

(b) The term “law enforcement agencies” shall include the offices and agencies responsible for investigating the crime or prosecuting the offender. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7304; implementing K.S.A. 2013 Supp. 74-7305; effective Nov. 15, 1993; amended Jan. 10, 2014.)

20-2-8. Contributory misconduct. (a) For the purpose of K.S.A. 74-7305 and amendments thereto, “contributory misconduct” may include the following:

(continued)

- (1) Consent, provocation, or incitement, which may consist of the use of fighting words or obscene gestures;
 - (2) willing presence in a vehicle operated by a person who is known to be under the influence of alcohol or an illegal substance;
 - (3) abuse of alcohol or an illegal substance;
 - (4) failure to retreat or withdraw from a threatening situation if an option to do so is readily available;
 - (5) failure to act as a prudent person; and
 - (6) unlawful activity.
- (b) The acts and behaviors listed in subsection (a) may be excused in cases involving domestic abuse or sexual assault. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7304; implementing K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 74-7305; effective Nov. 15, 1993; amended Jan. 10, 2014.)

20-2-9. Allowable expenses. (a) Reasonable charges for medical care shall be deemed allowable expenses only if the medical care provider is registered or licensed by the appropriate governmental licensing entity.

(b) Moving costs may be deemed allowable expenses if one of the following individuals has recommended the move in writing for reasons related to the crime:

- (1) A law enforcement officer;
- (2) a prosecutor; or
- (3) a victims' advocate working for a law enforcement agency or prosecutor's office.

(c) Mileage costs may be deemed allowable expenses for medically necessary travel. These costs shall be computed at a rate that does not exceed the rate established by the secretary of administration pursuant to K.S.A. 75-3203a, and amendments thereto.

(d) Meal costs shall not be deemed allowable expenses. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7304; implementing K.S.A. 2012 Supp. 74-7301; effective Nov. 15, 1993; amended Jan. 10, 2014.)
