The following Interim Care Facility for Individuals with Intellectual Disabilities (ICF/IID) cost center limits are being set forth for public comment. Comments should be sent to Melissa Warfield, Director of Fiscal and Program Evaluation, Financial and Information Services, 503 Kansas Ave., Topeka, KS 66603. The comment period will expire 30 days from the publication of this notice.

K.A.R. 30-10-214 provides for the annual review and adjustment of Class II ICF/IID cost center limits, approved by the secretary of the Kansas Department for Aging and Disability Services (KDADS) or designee, based on current cost information supplied by the enrolled, licensed providers of ICF/IID services, and formula set forth in the Kansas State Medicaid Plan (Attachment 4.19-D, Part II, Subpart O, page 1). The formula is as follows: Total allowable costs, including an inflation factor, are compared to the amount to be reimbursed under the current limits.

The formula threshold requires that 60 percent of all ICF/IIDs are reimbursed 90 percent of their allowable costs. If less than 60 percent of the facilities are reimbursed 90 percent of their allowable costs, then the cost center limits are adjusted until the threshold is met. The inflation factor is based on the IHS Healthcare Cost CMS Nursing Home without Capital Market Basket.

To determine where to make the adjustments, two major cost centers are analyzed according to the following prescription:

- Administrative costs are based on facility size
- Habilitation costs are based on facility size and level of care (LOC)

The cost analysis for 2017 demonstrates 82 percent of the Class II ICF/IIDs are being reimbursed 90 percent or more of their allowable costs, once inflation factors are applied. Adjustments through rebasing were applied for rates effective October 1, 2018 to meet the criteria outlined in K.A.R. 30-10-214. KDADS rebased the cost reports used to compute the rates to 2017. Estimated inflation factors were applied to allowable base year costs from 2017 to the mid-point of the current rate year, so that at least 60% of the facilities are reimbursed at least 90% of allowable costs, as required by 4.19D Part II, Subpart O of the Medicaid State Plan.

## Opinion 2018-1

### Re: State Departments; Public Officers and Employees – Public Officers and Employees; Open Public Meetings – Closed or Executive Meetings; Conditions; Authorized Subjects for Discussion January 8, 2018

**Synopsis:** A motion to recess into a closed or executive meeting may only utilize one justification as listed in K.S.A. 2017 Supp. 75-4319(b), but multiple subjects may be discussed if those subjects fall within the justification stated in the motion to recess into a closed or executive meeting. A motion to recess into a closed or executive meeting must be recorded in its entirety in the minutes of the public body or agency. The recording of the motion is not "complete" if it merely summarizes the actual motion in a manner that addresses only the three statutory elements but omits other content of the motion as it was in fact made. The statement describing the subject(s) to be discussed must be more than a generic or vague summary, or a list of the subject(s) to be discussed. The deter-

mination of whether a motion to recess into a closed or executive meeting sufficiently describes the subject(s) to be discussed is a fact-sensitive question which must be determined on a case-by-case basis. Cited herein: K.S.A. 2017 Supp. 75-4317; 75-4319; K.S.A. 2016 Supp. 75-4319. CLW

## Unfair Trade and Consumer Protection—Consumer Protection—Miscellaneous—Method of Payment; Express Authorization Required January 10, 2018

**Synopsis:** A utility may violate the Kansas Consumer Protection Act (KCPA) by engaging in deceptive or unconscionable conduct related to a program whereby customer bills are rounded up to the next dollar and the proceeds donated to charity. Whether deceptive or unconscionable acts or practices occur in a particular consumer transaction is a question of fact. ## Opinion 2018-3

Re: Intoxicating Liquors and Beverages—Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control—Market Impact Study of Sale of Beer By Persons Licensed as Cereal Malt Beverage Retailers; Oversight By Director and Promulgation of Rules and Regulations January 19, 2018

**Synopsis:** The Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control may promulgate administrative rules and regulations to implement amendments to the Cereal Malt Beverage Act, K.S.A. 2017 Supp. 41-2701 et seq. This authority extends to regulating trade practices and below-cost sales of beer containing not more than 6.0 percent alcohol by volume as well as such necessary and appropriate matters as recordkeeping and inspections. The Legislature did not provide for a separate licensing scheme for cereal malt beverage retailers that sell beer containing not more than 6.0 percent alcohol by volume, nor did the Legislature provide new enforcement mechanisms. A public hearing will be conducted at 9:00 a.m. Monday, November 19, 2018 at the Kansas Real Estate Commission, 700 SW Jackson, Suite 404, Topeka, KS 66603, to consider the adoption of proposed regulations of the Kansas Real Estate Commission, on a permanent basis.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Kansas Real Estate Commission, 700 SW Jackson, Suite 404, Topeka, KS 66603 or by email to erik.wisner@ ks.gov. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally regarding the adoption of the proposed regulations during the public hearing. In order to provide all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request an accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation to participate in the hearing should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Erik Wisner at 785-296-3411.

Summaries of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follow. Copies of the proposed regulations and the Economic Impact Statement for the proposed regulations can be viewed at the following website: http://www.krec.ks.gov.

K.A.R. 86-1-3 adopts revisions to the expiration date for new licenses issued after January 1, 2019. The proposed change would set the license expiration date as the first day of the month of issuance two years after the issuance date. If a salesperson licensee is granted a broker's license they would have a new expiration date based on the same calculation method. Any license issued prior to the effec-(continued) tive date of the change would keep the same expiration date they currently have unless they change their license type or let their license lapse and must apply for a new license. The current method for calculating the license expiration date based on the first letter of the licensees last name was confusing to licensees because they would have to prorate their license fee during their initial renewal period or change their expiration date if the first letter of their last name changed. The changes proposed in this regulation will have no economic impact.

K.A.R. 86-1-5 adopts revisions to the fees required for submission of a broker application and opening a primary or branch office for a company. The fee for submission of a broker application is proposed to increase from \$15 to \$50. The fee to open a primary or branch office is proposed to increase from \$25 to \$100. Both fee increases are proposed to more accurately reflect the administrative costs in reviewing broker applications and conducting compliance reviews on new offices. The revisions also eliminate language related to prorated fees since the new expiration date calculation established in K.A.R. 86-1-3 will make the calculation of a prorated fee obsolete. It is estimated the Commission will collect \$14,050 in additional fee revenue annually. The Commission has done an analysis of our direct regulatory cost over the past two years and have reduced or eliminated numerous fees. These include fees for name and address changes, duplicate licenses, certification license history and adding additional company affiliations. The Commission has also eliminated the convenience fee charged to licensees for submitting fee payments via our online licensing portal. Eliminating these fees has reduced the burden on licensees by \$55,000 annually which far exceeds the fee increase requested in the proposed change.

K.A.R. 86-1-15 is proposed for repeal because it refers to reporting a name change for licensing purposes which is no longer necessary pursuant to changes being proposed in K.A.R. 86-1-3. The requirement for reporting a name change for compliance purposes is covered in K.A.R. 86-3-15. Revoking this regulation will have no economic impact.

K.A.R. 86-1-19 modifies requirements for submitting supporting documents with a license application. The proposed changes would remove the requirement to report pending litigation. The requirement to report final court judgment or settlement would remain. The proposed changes would also remove the requirement that individuals must include documentation related to all criminal offenses. It gives the option for the commission to only require documentation for certain criminal charges and convictions. The proposed changes would also clarify that all misdemeanor charges and convictions would need to be reported to the commission. There are also technical changes that update language related to nonresident applications and requirements for renewal applications redundant with K.A.R. 86-3-15. Individuals applying for a license should see a decrease in their administrative burden due to a reduction in reporting requirements for pending litigation and certain criminal charges. The changes proposed in this regulation will have no economic impact.

K.A.R. 86-3-15 modifies requirements for current licensees to submit documentation to the commission. The proposed changes would remove the requirement to report pending litigation. The requirement to report final court judgment or settlement would remain. The proposed changes would remove the requirement that individuals must include documentation related to all criminal offenses. The proposed changes would clarify that all misdemeanor charges and convictions would need to be reported to the commission. In addition, any felony or misdemeanor charge or conviction would also need to be reported to the licensee's responsible broker within 10 days of occurrence. The regulation also requires a licensee to report any changes to the licensee's email address on file with the commission. Licensees should see a decrease in their administrative burden due to a reduction in reporting requirements for pending litigation and certain criminal charges. The changes proposed in this regulation will have no economic impact.

All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to express their views orally in regard to the adoption of the proposed regulations. During the hearing, all written and oral comments submitted by interested parties will be considered by the commission as a basis for approving, amending and approving, or rejecting the proposed regulations.

The regulations that will be heard during the regulatory hearing portion of the meeting are as follows:

**K.A.R. 115-2-3.** This permanent regulation establishes camping fees. The proposed amendments to the regulation would increase long term camping user fees.

**Economic Impact Summary:** The economic effect on long term state park campers in the form of a user fee would be an increase of \$100 per month per campsite for most state parks and \$150 per month per campsite in 5 state parks. The proposed increase would generate approximately \$104,800 annually, all of which would accrue to the park fee fund. Otherwise, no other economic impact to the department, other state agencies, small businesses, or individual members of the public is anticipated.

**K.A.R. 115-2-5.** This permanent regulation establishes the trail access pass fee requirement. The regulation is being proposed for revocation.

**Economic Impact Summary:** The revocation of the regulation should increase use on trails and therefore, stimulate local businesses. Otherwise, no other significant economic impact to department, other state agencies, small businesses, or individual members of the public is anticipated.

K.A.R. 115-7-3. This permanent regulation establishes taking and use of baitfish or minnows. The proposed

amendments to the regulation would increase mesh size for cast nets from  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch to 1 inch.

**Economic Impact Summary:** The proposed amendments are not anticipated to have any significant economic impact to the department, other state agencies, small businesses, or individual members of the public.

**K.A.R. 115-17-2.** This permanent regulation establishes provisions related to the commercial sale of fish bait. The proposed amendments to the regulation would remove common carp from the allowable list of fish bait commercially available in order to reduce vectors of introduction.

**Economic Impact Summary:** Less than 5 percent of the 200 commercial fish bait dealers in Kansas sell common carp as bait but many other species are allowed for sale under the regulation. Otherwise, the proposed amendments are not anticipated to have any significant economic impact to the department, other state agencies, small businesses, or individual members of the public.

**K.A.R. 115-18-10.** This permanent regulation establishes the prohibited species list for Kansas. The proposed amendments to the regulation would add the marbled crayfish to the list of prohibited species.

**Economic Impact Summary:** The proposed changes may have a potential impact on the pet industry but the species is not known to currently exist in Kansas. Otherwise, the proposed amendments are not anticipated to have any significant economic impact to the department, other state agencies, small businesses, or individual members of the public.
