The highest ranked firm will be asked to enter into negotiations with KDOT to update the Long-Range Transportation Plan. In the event KDOT cannot reach agreement with the highest ranked firm, it will terminate negotiations with such firm and commence negotiations with the next highest ranked firm, and so on, until either agreement is reached for a satisfactory scope of services for a fair and reasonable price, or KDOT decides to pursue other alternatives.

The proposed action is to issue a new State/NPDES permit to an existing facility to allow construction of an expansion to 4.0 MGD BNR (Biological Nutrient Removal) activated sludge wastewater treatment plant on the same site. The proposed plan is to construct the new facility in two phases. Phase I would construct the facility with a capacity of 2.0 MGD to treat an initial average daily flow of 1.1 MGD with capacity for area growth. Phase II would increase the permitted average daily design flow to 4.0 MGD within the same time frame as Pump Station No. 50 is decommissioned. The proposed permit contains limits for biochemical oxygen demand, total suspended solids, pH, dissolved oxygen, ammonia, whole effluent toxicity, and E. coli, as well as monitoring for total phosphorus, total Kjeldahl nitrogen, nitrate + nitrite, total nitrogen, priority pollutants and flow. In compliance with Kansas and federal law, KDHE has approved an antidegradation review for this new facility for increased concentrations and mass of some pollutants to the receiving stream. The water quality of the receiving stream will not be lowered below the quality necessary to support existing designated uses.

Article 302.—SPECIFIC LOTTERY FACILITY GAMES AT LOTTERY GAMING FACILITIES; CRAPS

111-302-2. Object of game. The object of the "Craps" game is to play with two six-sided cubes (dice) with one (1) to six (6) spots on each face, with the sum of opposite (1)sides of each die equaling (7) seven, giving 36 possible combinations. All odds and probabilities are calculated from this figure. Winning or losing decisions on craps are determined by the sum of the spots shown on the upward facing side of the two dice ("point value" or "total") that come to rest after being thrown by a player or "shooter." The shooter places a pass or don't pass line bet and then selects two of the dice offered by the dealer (stickperson). The shooter throws the dice so that they bounce off the opposite end of the craps table. On the initial throw, the shooter wins, loses or establishes a point. If a point is established, the shooter continues to throw the dice and on each subsequent roll either wins, loses, or continues as the shooter. Other players at the table may also make wagers without being the shooter. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-8710 and 74-8748; implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-12-24-09, Dec. 3, 2009; amended, T-111-2-4-19, Dec. 6, 2018.)

111-302-5. Wagers. (a) The following shall constitute the permissible wagers at the games of craps:

(1) A "pass bet" is a wager placed on the pass line of the layout immediately prior to the come out roll. A pass bet shall win if, on the come out roll:

(A) A total of 7 or 11 is thrown; or

(B) A total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown and that total is again thrown before a 7 total appears.

A pass bet shall lose if, on the come out roll:

(C) A total of 2, 3, or 12 is thrown; or

(D) A total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown and a total of 7 subsequently appears before that total is again thrown.

(2) A "don't pass bet" is a wager placed on the don't pass line of the layout immediately prior to the come out roll. A don't pass bet shall win if, on the come out roll:

(A) A total of 2 or 3 is thrown; or

(B) A total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown and a total of 7 subsequently appears before that total is again thrown.

A don't pass bet shall lose if, on the come out roll:

(C) A total of 7 or 11 is thrown; or

(D) A total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown and that total is again thrown before a total of 7 appears.

A don't pass bet shall be void if, on the come out roll, a total of 12 is thrown.

(3) A "come bet" is a wager placed on the come line of the layout at any time after the come out roll. A come bet shall win if, on the roll immediately following placement of such bet:

(A) A total of 7 or 11 is thrown; or

(B) A total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown and that total is again thrown before a total of 7 appears.

A come bet shall lose if, on the roll immediately following placement of such bet:

 (\hat{C}) A total of 2, 3, or 12 is thrown; or

(D) A total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown and a total of 7 subsequently appears before that total is again thrown.

(4) A "don't come bet" is a wager placed on the don't come area of the layout at any time after the come out roll. A don't come bet shall win if, on the roll immediately following placement of such bet:

(A) A total of 2 or 3 is thrown; or

(B) A total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown and a total of 7 subsequently appears before that total is again thrown.

A don't come bet shall lose if, on the roll immediately following placement of such bet:

(C) A total of 7 or 11 is thrown; or

(D) A total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown and that total is again thrown before a total of 7 appears.

A don't come bet shall be void if, on the roll immediately following placement of such bet, a total of 12 thrown.

(5) "Place bet to win" is a wager that may be made at any time on any of the numbers 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10, which shall win if the number on which the wager was placed is thrown before a total of 7 and shall lose if a total of 7 is thrown before such number. All place to win bets, hardway bets and come odds bets shall be inactive on any come out roll unless called "on" by the player and confirmed by the dealer through placement of an "on" marker button on top of such player's wager.

(6) "Four the hardway" is a wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 4 is thrown the hardway (that is, with 2 spots appearing on each die) before a total of 4 is thrown in any other way and before a total of 7 is thrown.

(7) "Six the hardway" is a wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 6 is thrown the hardway (that is, with 3 spots appearing on each die) before a total of 6 is thrown in any other way and before a total of 7 is thrown.

(8) "Eight the hardway" is a wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 8 is thrown the hardway (that is, with 4 spots appearing on each die) before a total of 8 is thrown in any other way and before a total of 7 is thrown.

(9) "Ten the hardway" is a wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 10 is thrown the hardway (that is, with 5 spots appearing on each die) before a total of 10 is thrown in any other way and before a total of 7 is thrown.

(10) "Field bet" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if any one of the totals 2, 3, 4, 9, 10, 11, or 12 is thrown on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if a total of 5, 6, 7, or 8 is thrown on such roll.

(11) "Any seven" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 7 is thrown on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other total is thrown.

(12) "Any craps" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 2, 3 or 12 is thrown on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other total is thrown.

(13) "Craps two" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 2 is thrown on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other total is thrown.

(14) "Craps three" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 3 is thrown on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other total is thrown.

(15) "Craps twelve" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 12 is thrown on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other total is thrown.

(16) "11 in one roll" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 11 is thrown on the next roll and shall lose if any other total is thrown.

(17) "Craps-eleven" or "C and E" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if either a craps (a total of 2, 3 or 12) is rolled or a total of 11 is rolled immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other total is thrown.

(18) "Horn bet" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if any one of the totals 2, 3, 11 or 12 is thrown on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other total is thrown.

(19) "Horn high bet" is a wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if any one of the totals 2, 3, 11, or 12 is thrown on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other total is thrown. A horn high bet shall be placed in wager units of five with four units wagered as a horn bet and an additional unit wagered on one of the totals 2, 3, 11, or 12. If the craps table layout does not have a designated area for the acceptance of a horn high bet, a dealer shall break down the bet into two separate wagers on the horn and one of the totals 2, 3, 11, or 12.

(20) "Whirl bet" or "world bet" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which bet shall consist of a horn bet and an any seven wager. A whirl bet shall be placed in units of five, with four units wagered on 2, 3, 11 and 12 and the fifth unit wagered as an any seven wager. A dealer shall break down a whirl bet into two separate wagers on the horn bet and the any seven wager.

(21) "Four the hardway on the hop" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 4 is thrown the hardway (that is, with 2 spots appearing on each die) on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other combination is thrown.

(22) "Six the hardway on the hop" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 6 is thrown the hardway (that is, with 3 spots appearing on each die) on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other combination is thrown.

(23) "Eight the hardway on the hop" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 8 is thrown the hardway (that is, with 4 spots appearing on each die) on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other combination is thrown.

(24) "Ten the hardway on the hop" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 10 is thrown the hardway (that is, with 5 spots appearing on each die) on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other combination is thrown.

(25) "One-three (ace-trey) on the hop" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 4 is thrown with a 1 spot appearing on one die and a 3 spot appearing on the other die on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other combination is thrown.

(26) "One-four (ace-four) on the hop" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 5 is thrown with a 1 spot appearing on one die and a 4 spot appearing on the other die on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other combination is thrown.

(27) "Two-three (deuce-trey) on the hop" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 5 is thrown with a 2 spot appearing on one die and a 3 spot appearing on the other die on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other combination is thrown.

(28) "One-five (ace-five) on the hop" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 6 is thrown with a 1 spot appearing on one die and a 5 spot appearing on the other die on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other combination is thrown.

(29) "Two-four (deuce-four) on the hop" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 6 is thrown with a 2 spot appearing on one die and a 4 spot appearing on the other die on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other combination is thrown.

(30) "One-six (ace-six) on the hop" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 7 is thrown with a 1 spot appearing on one die and a 6 spot appearing on the other die on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other combination is thrown.

(31) "Two-five (deuce-five) on the hop" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 7 is thrown with a 2 spot appearing on one die and a 5 spot appearing on the other die on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other combination is thrown.

(continued)

(32) "Three-four (trey-four) on the hop" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 7 is thrown with a 3 spot appearing on one die and a 4 spot appearing on the other die on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other combination is thrown.

(33) "Two-six (deuce-six) on the hop" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 8 is thrown with a 2 spot appearing on one die and a 6 spot appearing on the other die on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other combination is thrown.

(34) "Three-five (trey-five) on the hop" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 8 is thrown with a 3 spot appearing on one die and a 5 spot appearing on the other die on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other combination is thrown.

(35) "Three-six (trey-six) on the hop" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 9 is thrown with a 3 spot appearing on one die and a 6 spot appearing on the other die on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other combination is thrown.

(36) "Four-five on the hop" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 9 is thrown with a 4 spot appearing on one die and a 5 spot appearing on the other die on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other combination is thrown.

(37) "Four-six on the hop" is a one roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 10 is thrown with a 4 spot appearing on one die and a 6 spot appearing on the other die on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other combination is thrown.

(38) "Big 6," if offered, is a wager that may be made at any time on the big number 6 on the table layout, which shall win if a total of 6 is rolled before a total of 7 is rolled and shall lose if a total of 7 is thrown before a total of 6.

(39) "Big 8," if offered, is a wager that may be made at any time on the big number 8 on the table layout, which shall win if a total of 8 is rolled before a total of 7 is rolled and shall lose if a total of 7 is thrown before a total of 8.

(40) A "put bet" is a wager that may be made at any time on any of the numbers 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, and 10 which wins if the number on which the wager was placed is thrown before a 7 appears and loses if a 7 is thrown before such number.

(41) A "high low" bet is a one roll wager that wins if either a high (12) or low (2) is rolled and loses if any other total is thrown.

(42) "Three way craps" is a one roll wager that wins if either an ace deuce (3) or any craps (2, 3 or 12) is rolled and loses if any other total is thrown. This bet is broken down into separate wagers and placed on the appropriate areas of the "ace-deuce", "2", and "12" on the table layout.

(43) "Sharp shooter" is a wager made on the initial come out roll that wins if the shooter makes three or more come out points before rolling a losing pass line 7 and loses if the shooter makes fewer than three points before rolling a losing pass line 7. Wagers are only paid

based upon the highest number of come out points made before a losing pass line 7 is rolled.

(b) Wagers are made before the dice are thrown but they may also be made between the time the dice leave the shooter's hand and the time the dice come to rest, provided that the wager is confirmed orally by the dealer and a supervisor.

(c) All wagers at craps are made by placing gaming chips on the appropriate area of the table layout.

(d) A wager made on any bet may be removed or reduced at any time prior to a roll that decides the outcome of such wager except that a pass line bet and a come bet may not be removed or reduced after a come out point or come point is established with respect to such bet.

(e) A don't come bet and a don't pass bet may be removed or reduced at any time but may not be replaced or increased after such removal or reduction until a new come out roll.

(f) All place to win bets, hardway bets and come odds bets are inactive on any come out roll unless called "on" by the player and confirmed by the dealer through placement of an "on" marker button on the top of each player's wager. All other wagers are considered "on."

(g) The minimum and maximum wagers allowed at a table shall be posted at the table.

(h) No call bets are allowed. A "call bet" is a bet made verbally without actually placing gaming chips on the table layout.

(j) A horn bet and horn high bet shall be paid as if they were four separate wagers on 2, 3, 11, and 12.

(k) A craps-eleven or C and E bet shall be paid as if one half of the wagered amount had been placed on "any craps" and one half on "eleven," and shall be paid as if two separate wagers were made for the one roll.

(l) A lottery gaming facility manager ("manager") may offer true odds on place bets under the following circumstances:

(1) In addition to the payout odds set forth in above for place bets to win on 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, and 10, a manager may offer a player the option of receiving true odds on these bets in return for the player paying to manager, at the time of making the bet, a percentage of the amount which in no event shall exceed five percent of such wager;

(2) If a true odds place bet to win is made by a player, winning wagers shall be paid as follows:

4 to Win	2 to 1
5 to Win	3 to 2
6 to Win	6 to 5
8 to Win	6 to 5
9 to Win	3 to 2
10 to Win	2 to 1

(3) In addition to the payout odds set forth above, for lay bets on 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, and 10, a manager may offer a player the option of receiving true odds on these bets in return

for the player paying to manager, at the time of making the bet, a percentage of the amount to be won which in no event shall exceed five percent of such wager;

(4) Lay bets: If a true odds place bet to lose is made by a player, winning wagers shall be paid as follows:

5 to Lose	2 to 3
6 to Lose	5 to 6
8 to Lose	5 to 6
9 to Lose	2 to 3
10 to Lose	1 to 2

(m) Supplemental wagers shall also be allowed as follows:

(1) Whenever a player makes a pass bet and a total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown on the come out roll, the player shall have the right to make a supplemental wager in support of the pass bet which may be limited to an amount that is equal to the amount of the original pass bet. If, in such circumstances, the pass bet wins, the original pass bet shall be paid at odds of 1 to 1 and the supplemental wager shall be paid at odds of 2 to 1 if the come out point was 4 or 10, at odds of 3 to 2 if the come out point was 6 or 8. A player loses this supplemental wager if the pass bet loses.

(2) Whenever a player makes a don't pass bet and a total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown on the come out roll, the player shall have the right to make a supplemental wager in support of the don't pass bet which may be limited to an amount so calculated as to provide winnings not in excess of the amount originally wagered on the don't pass bet. If, in such circumstances, the don't pass bet wins, the original don't pass bet shall be paid at odds of 1 to 1 and the supplemental wager shall be paid at odds of 2 to 3 if the come out point was 5 or 9, and at odds of 5 to 6 if the come out point was 6 or 8. A player loses this supplemental wager if the don't pass bet loses.

(3) Whenever a player makes a come bet and a total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown on the roll immediately following placement of such bet, the player shall have the right to make a supplemental wager in support of the come bet which may be limited to an amount that is equal to the amount of the original come bet. If, in such circumstances, the come bet wins, the original come bet shall be paid at odds of 1 to 1 and the supplemental wager shall be paid at odds of 2 to 1 if the come point was 4 or 10, at odds of 3 to 2 if the come point was 5 or 9, and at odds of 6 to 5 if the come point was 6 or 8. A player loses this supplemental wager if the come bet loses.

(4) Whenever a player makes a don't come bet and a total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown on the roll immediately following placement of such bet, the player shall have the right to make a supplemental wager in support of the don't come bet which may be limited to an amount so calculated as to provide winnings not in excess of the amount originally wagered on the don't come bet. If, in such circumstances, the don't come bet wins, the original don't come bet shall be paid at odds of 1 to 1 and the supplemental wager shall be paid at odds of 1 to 2 if the *(continued)*

come point was a 4 or 10, at odds of 2 to 3 if the come point was 5 or 9, and at odds of 5 to 6 if the come point was 6 or 8. A player loses this supplemental wager if the don't come bet loses.

(5) The casino may allow a supplemental wager in support of a pass or come bet in an amount up to 10 (ten) times the amount of the original pass or come bet. Manager may allow a supplemental wager in support of a don't pass or don't come bet in an amount so calculated as to provide a winning player with winnings not in excess of up to 10 (ten) times the amount originally wagered on the don't pass or don't come bet. The original pass, don't pass, come or don't come bet and any supplemental wager allowed pursuant to this subsection shall be paid at the same odds as the original and supplemental wagers are paid under (1) through (4) above.

(6) Whenever a player makes a put bet, the player has the right to make an additional wager in support of the bet which may be limited to an amount equal to the table minimum or maximum odds. If, in such circumstances, the bet wins, the original amount of the bet is paid at odds of 1 to 1 and the supplemental amount is paid in multiples of 2 to 1 if the come point was 4 or 10, 3 to 2 if the come point was 5 or 9, and 6 to 5 if the come point was 6 or 8. A player loses this supplemental bet if the put bet loses.

(7) The casino may accept a supplemental wager that exceeds an amount that is otherwise authorized by this section or posted as the maximum wager permitted at the table, provided that the excess amount of the supplemental wager is necessary to facilitate the payouts permitted by this section. Article 601.–SOUTHEAST GAMING ZONE

111-601-37. Making and removal of wagers. (a) All wagers at craps shall be made by placing gaming chips on the appropriate areas of the craps layout.

(b) Wagers shall be made before the dice are thrown.

(c) Wagers may be made by a player or may be made by verbal confirmation of a desired bet communicated to the dealer by the player with subsequent placement of said bet on the appropriate portion of the layout by the dealer.

(d) A wager made on any bet may be removed or reduced at any time prior to a roll that decided the outcome of such wager except that a pass bet and a come bet shall not be removed or reduced after a come-out point or some point is established with respect to such bet. Pass and come bets are always active and may be increased between rolls, but cannot be withdrawn until the bet either wins or loses.

(e) A don't come bet and a don't pass bet may be removed or reduced at any time but may not be replaced or increased after such removal or reduction until a new come-out roll.

(f) All place bets, come bet odds and hardways shall be inactive on any come-out roll unless requested "on" by the player and confirmed by the dealer through placement of an "on" button on top of the wager. All other wagers shall be considered active unless a player requests to have his bets inactive. The dealer through placement of an "off" button must confirm this.

(g) Minimum and maximum table limits will be posted.

(h) If a player wagers less than the table minimum bet and the dealer does not notice it, the dealer shall take or pay the amount actually bet and instruct the player of the minimum amount that must be wagered on subsequent bets.

(i) If in error a player has been permitted to wager more than the table maximum, the dealer shall remove the excess and return it to the player, pay the bet at the correct odds for the maximum allowable wager, and inform the player of the permissible amount that can be wagered on subsequent bets.

(j) In the event of a dealer placing a bet for a player, chips shall not be taken from the player's hands or from the rack in front of the player. All chips for the bet shall be set down on the layout by the player and the dealer shall clarify the purpose of the chips before picking them up.

(l) A horn bet shall be paid as if it were four separate wagers on 2, 3, 11, and 12.

(m) All charges for vigorish that are less than one dollar amounts, will be rounded down to the nearest dollar figure.

(n) A player may remove the player's lay bet at any time before the number or seven is rolled. If the player removes the lay bet, the amount of the vigorish will also be returned.

(o) Players may take odds on their pass and come bets as follows:

(1) Pass line and come bet odds on a 4 or 10 can be taken up to 10 times the pass bet.

(2) Pass line and come bet odds on a 5 or 9 can be taken up to 10 times the pass bet.

(3) Pass line and come bet odds on a 6 or 8 can be taken up to 10 times the pass bet.

(p) Players may take odds on their put bets. Put bets are made the same way as pass and come bets, except that put bets are placed directly on the number without going through the pass or come, as follows:

(1) On a put bet of 4 and 10, odds can be taken up to ten times the pass bet.

(2) On a put bet of 5 and 9, odds can be taken up to ten times the pass bet.

(3) On a put bet of 6 and 8, odds can be taken up to ten times the pass bet.

(q) Players may lay odds on their don't pass and don't come bets up to:

(1) 4 and 10 can lay to win 10 times the don't pass/don't come bet.

(2) 5 and 9 can lay to win 10 times the don't pass/don't come bet.

(3) 6 and 8 can lay to win 10 times the don't pass/don't come bet.

(r) Minimum and maximum odds will be posted at each table.

(s) The payout odds on a winning fire bet are as follows:

Article 5.— ADMINISTRATIVE HEARINGS AND DISCIPLINARY ACTION

63-5-3. Potentially disqualifying civil and criminal records; advisory opinion; fee. (a) For purposes of this regulation, "conviction" shall mean a judgment or order of guilt by a court of competent jurisdiction in any state, or a subdivision thereof, or territory of the United States, by a court of the United States, or by a military court martial pursuant to the uniform code of military justice.

(b) The following criminal records may disqualify an applicant from receiving a license:

(1) A conviction of any offense classified as a felony in the jurisdiction in which the conviction occurred;

(2) a conviction of criminal desecration as defined in K.S.A. 2018 Supp. 21-6205, and amendments thereto, or a crime defined as substantially similar in the jurisdiction in which the conviction occurred;

(3) a conviction of any offense classified as a class A misdemeanor, or a similar classification in the jurisdiction in which the conviction occurred, that involves any of the following:

(A) A crime whose victim was a client, customer, or other individual with whom the applicant had a professional or fiduciary relationship;

(B) a crime that occurred at the applicant's work site or while the applicant was on work duty;

(C) a crime involving fraud, theft, or misappropriation of another person's money, property, or services;

(D) giving a worthless check or causing unlawful prosecution for a worthless check;

(E) counterfeiting;

(F) criminal use of a financial card;

(G) a crime classified as a sex offense or requiring registration as a sex offender by the jurisdiction in which the conviction occurred;

(H) a crime involving assault, battery, domestic battery, battery of a law enforcement officer, sexual battery, stalking, or criminal restraint as defined by the jurisdiction in which the conviction occurred;

(I) a crime involving promoting obscenity, promoting material to minors that is harmful, or promoting prostitution;

(J) a crime that involved knowingly violating a protection from abuse order, a protective order, or a restraining order; (K) cruelty to animals;

(L) a crime involving the unlawful use, possession, or distribution of any illegal drug or controlled substance;

(M) a crime involving the unlawful use or possession of paraphernalia with intent to use to manufacture, cultivate, plant, propagate, harvest, test, analyze, or distribute a controlled substance;

(N) a crime involving harassment by telephone, any telecommunications device, or telefacsimile communication;

(O) unlawful administration of a substance as defined in K.S.A. 2018 Supp. 21-5425, and amendments thereto, (continued) or defined as substantially similar in the jurisdiction in which the conviction occurred;

(P) driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol, or any other crime in which the applicant was intoxicated when the applicant committed the crime;

(Q) a crime involving the abuse, neglect, or exploitation of a child, elderly person, or disabled person as defined by the jurisdiction in which the conviction occurred; or

(R) a crime involving the unlawful use, possession, distribution, or discharge of a firearm; and

(4) conviction of a misdemeanor offense that meets both of the following conditions:

(A) The crime involved at least one of the circumstances described in paragraph (b)(3); and

(B) one of the following conditions is met:

(i) Fewer than five years have passed since the applicant completed the applicant's sentence, including any term of incarceration, probation, or community supervision or payment of any fine, fees, or restitution; or

(ii) the applicant has been convicted of another crime in the five years immediately preceding the date of the application for license.

(c) Civil or administrative records that may disqualify an applicant from receiving a license shall be any records of any court or administrative agency judgment, order, or a settlement in which the applicant admitted or was found to have engaged in conduct that would constitute a violation of the mortuary arts act or any of the implementing regulations. Those records shall not be used to disqualify an applicant for more than five years after the applicant satisfied the judgment, order, or settlement agreement.

(d) Any individual with a criminal, civil, or administrative record described in this regulation may submit a petition on a form provided by the board for an informal, advisory opinion concerning whether the individual's civil, administrative, or criminal record may disqualify the individual from licensure. Each petition shall include the following:

(1) The details of the individual's civil, administrative, or criminal record, including a copy of each court or administrative record or any settlement by the parties;

(2) an explanation of the circumstances that resulted in the civil, administrative, or criminal record; and

(3) a check or money order in the amount of \$50.00. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-1712, 65-1723, 65-1730, 65-1766, and 74-120; implementing K.S.A. 65-1751, 65-1766, and 74-120; effective March 8, 2019.)

Article 28a.—PHYSICIAN ASSISTANTS

100-28a-14. Different practice location. Any physician assistant may perform acts that constitute the practice of medicine and surgery at a different practice location if all of the following requirements are met:

(a) Before providing any services at the different practice location, the physician assistant shall have spent at least 80 hours since being licensed under the direct supervision of a physician licensed in this state.

(b) The supervising physician or substitute supervising physician shall remain available to provide guidance, direction, and coordination of the activities of the physician assistant. This availability may be provided by electronic means.

(c) The different practice location shall be listed on the active practice request form required by K.A.R. 100-28a-9.

(d) Written notice that the different practice location is staffed primarily by a physician assistant shall be posted in a location where the notice is likely to be seen by patients.
