The permit is to be issued in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-350, *Prevention of Significant Deterioration* (PSD) which adopt the federal standards, procedures, and requirements of 40 CFR 52.21 by reference. These air quality regulations apply to major stationary emission sources located in areas designated as "attainment" under the federal Clean Air Act (CAA). Attain-

ment areas are areas where the air quality meets or is better than the national ambient air quality standards (NAAQS).

The PSD regulations require evaluation of emission reduction techniques to identify the best available control technology (BACT) for each regulated pollutant, including GHG, for which the emission rate exceeds the PSD significant level. The purpose of BACT is to affect the maximum degree of reduction achievable, taking into account energy, environmental, and economic impacts for each pollutant under review. Evaluation of the estimated emissions increases for the new non-bonded insulation manufacturing line project indicates that the emission rates of PM, PM<sub>10</sub>, and PM<sub>2.5</sub> exceed the PSD significant emission rates. Johns Manville conducted the required BACT analyses and KDHE concurs with their findings.

An ambient air quality impact analysis was performed on the air emissions of  $PM_{10}$  and  $PM_{2.5}$  from the project. The analysis demonstrated that the proposed project was below the PSD Class II Significant Impact Levels for 24-hour and annual  $PM_{10}$  and 24-hour and annual  $PM_{2.5}$ . Therefore, no NAAQS or PSD Increment modeling analysis was conducted. The project did not require PSD Increment modeling analysis and thus, no maximum allowance increment was consumed.

No assessment of visibility impacts at a Class I area was performed by the facility because there are no Federal Class I areas located within 400 km of the proposed facility. The facility did a visibility impact analysis for a local Class II area, Themian Park. Themian Park is located approximately 44 kilometers southeast of Johns Manville. The results indicate that there are no exceedances of the screening criteria inside or outside of the Themian Park area. Therefore, there are no potential visibility impacts for Themian Park that would require additional analysis.

A public comment period has been established to allow citizens the opportunity to express any concerns they may have about this proposed permitting action. The public comment period is to begin Thursday, October 31, 2019 and ends at 12:00 p.m. Monday, December 2, 2019. Any member of the public may request to hold a public hearing to receive comments on the proposed issuance of the draft air quality construction permit. Kansas Ave., McPherson, KS 67640, beginning at 2:00 p.m. and continuing until audience members have an opportunity to submit comments. If no requests to hold the public hearing are received by 12:00 p.m. Monday, December 2, 2019, the public hearing will be cancelled. A notice of the cancellation will be posted at the KDHE website at http://www.kdheks.gov/bar/publicnotice.html.

If a hearing is conducted, all interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally or by submission of written materials during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to limit oral presentations to a specific time limit. Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed materials in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation must be made no later than Monday, November 18, 2019 by contacting the Bureau of Air at 785-296-1581.

### **Opinion No. 2019-05**

Written October 23, 2019, to Mr. John S. Robb, Somers, Robb and Robb, 110 E. Broadway, Newton, KS 67114-2222.

**Synopsis:** Under the facts provided, a superintendent does not have a substantial interest in a law firm that employs his brother as an attorney.

Cited herein: K.S.A. 75-4301a, 75-4302a, 75-4304, 75-4305 and *Dowling Realty v. City of Shawnee*, 32 Kan.App.2d 536, 85 P.3d 716 (2004).

Dear Mr. Robb,

In response to your October 2, 2019, letter request, this opinion is provided by the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission (commission), concerning application of the local conflict of interest law, K.S.A. 75-4301a *et seq.* The commission's jurisdiction is limited to applicability of this law. This opinion, provided pursuant to K.S.A. 75-4303a(a), does not address whether some other statutory system, common law theory, agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry.

### **Factual Statement**

We understand that your firm requests this opinion as counsel for Unified School District No. 265 (Goddard). Your letter provides the following facts:

[Goddard] has seen a tremendous increase in vaping and e-cigarette use by students in the past several years. Nicotine use during adolescence can impact learning, memory and attention as well as increase the risk for future addictions. The disruption to the learning process is increasing exponentially, is harming students and is consuming ever more district resources.

Desiring to take aggressive steps to protect children and minimize the effect on educational processes, the Goddard Board of Education began a dialog with [...] lawyers with the law firm of Wagstaff and Cartmell (hereinafter "Wagstaff.") This firm is on the leading edge of pursuing litigation against the companies that produce and market vaping e-cigarette products to children.

Finding Wagstaff to be qualified and aligned with Goddard Board of Education goals, the Board of Education adopted a resolution to employ the firm to represent Goddard in pursuing litigation against the offending companies. The contract is currently in the process of negotiation between the parties.

[The lawyers with the Wagstaff firm] were first introduced to Goddard Board of Education members through the Goddard Superintendent [...]. [The superintendent] became aware of the Wagstaff involvement in the issue because [...] [his] brother, [...] is employed at that firm. [The superintendent's brother] [...] does not currently work on the vaping e-cigarette pending litigation for the firm, because he is concentrated in other areas, but was aware of firm activities in the area such that he could connect his brother with the appropriate attorneys at the firm.

...

[The superintendent] did not enter a contract with Wagstaff and will not be a signatory to any agreement between the parties. The proposed contract with be entered into between Wagstaff and the Board of Education of U.S.D. No. 265. It will be executed by the President of the Board of Education on behalf of the district.

[The superintendent] is not and never has been employed by Wagstaff. Dr. Henry is not a member of the Board of Education of Goddard and thus will not be a participant in the making of the contract with Wagstaff. [The superintendent] does not have and never has had a substantial interest in Wagstaff. [The superintendent] will see no personal benefit whatsoever from this relationship.

### Question

Does the Goddard superintendent, or his spouse, have a substantial interest in the Wagstaff law firm by virtue of the superintendent's brother being a Wagstaff law firm attorney?

### **Analysis and Opinion**

Pursuant to K.S.A. 75-4301a(f), Goddard Unified School District No. 265 employees (including the superintendent) are governed by the local level conflict of interest laws found in K.S.A. 75-4301, et seq. If the Goddard superintendent, or his spouse, has a substantial interest, then it is required to be reported either by (1) filing a statement of substantial interests pursuant to K.S.A. 75-4302a, or (2) filing a report of interest, pursuant to K.S.A. 75-4305.

The request for an opinion concludes that the Goddard superintendent and his spouse do not have a substantial interest in Wagstaff. We agree. The facts provided in the request for an opinion do not indicate a basis for us to conclude the Goddard superintendent or his spouse have a *substantial interest* in Wagstaff as that term is defined in K.S.A. 75-4301a. Specifically, a local government employee having a near relative (other than a spouse) employed by a person or business is not a substantial interest even though a local governmental employee may make or participate in the making of a contract with such person or business.

The opinion request indicates that the Goddard superintendent will not enter into a contract between the Goddard school board and Wagstaff or be a signatory to any such contract pursuant to K.S.A. 75-4304(b). We recognize this is a moot point absent the existence of a substantial interest. To further clarify we note that involvement by Goddard superintendent in discussions and other interactions with the Goddard school board regarding the proposed contract with Wagstaff may be construed as making or participation in the making of a contract. To make or participate in the making of a contract is an act, as defined in K.S.A. 75-4301a(h), when done by a local governmental employee. Such an act is a violation of K.S.A. 75-4304(a) if a substantial interest exists. See *Dowling Realty v. City of Shawnee*, 32 Kan.App.2d 536, 85 P.3d 716 (2004), Syllabus ¶¶ 3, 5.

### **Notice of Proposed Constitutional Amendment**

### Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 1605

A PROPOSITION to amend section 1 of article 10 of the constitution of the state of Kansas; relating to reapportionment of senatorial and representative districts.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Kansas, twothirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the Senate and two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the House of Representatives concurring therein:

Section 1. The following proposition to amend the constitution of the state of Kansas shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for their approval or rejection: Section 1 of article 10 of the constitution of the state of Kansas is hereby amended to read as follows:

"§ 1. Reapportionment of senatorial and representative districts. (a) At its regular session in 1989, the legislature shall by law reapportion the state representative districts, the state senatorial districts or both the state representative and senatorial districts upon the basis of the latest census of the inhabitants of the state taken by authority of chapter 61 of the 1987 Session Laws of Kansas. At its regular session in 1992, and at its regular session every tenth year thereafter, the legislature shall by law reapportion the state senatorial districts and representative districts on the basis of the population of the state as established by the most recent census of population taken and published by the United States census bureau of the census. Senatorial and representative districts shall be reapportioned upon the basis of the population of the state adjusted: (1) To exclude nonresident military personnel stationed within the state and nonresident students attending colleges and universities within the state; and (2) to include military personnel stationed within the state who are residents of the state and students attending colleges and universities within the state who are residents of the state in the district of their permanent residence. Bills reapportioning legislative districts shall be published in the Kansas register immediately upon final passage and shall be effective

for the next following election of legislators and thereafter until again reapportioned.

- (b) Within 15 days after the publication of an act reapportioning the legislative districts within the time specified in (a), the attorney general shall petition the supreme court of the state to determine the validity thereof. The supreme court, within 30 days from the filing of the petition, shall enter its judgment. Should the supreme court determine that the reapportionment statute is invalid, the legislature shall enact a statute of reapportionment conforming to the judgment of the supreme court within 15 days.
- (c) Upon enactment of a reapportionment to conform with a judgment under (b), the attorney general shall apply to the supreme court of the state to determine the validity thereof. The supreme court, within 10 days from the filing of such application, shall enter its judgment. Should the supreme court determine that the reapportionment statute is invalid, the legislature shall again enact a statute reapportioning the legislative districts in compliance with the direction of and conforming to the mandate of the supreme court within 15 days after entry thereof.
- (d) Whenever a petition or application is filed under this section, the supreme court, in accordance with its rules, shall permit interested persons to present their views.
- (e) A judgment of the supreme court of the state determining a reapportionment to be valid shall be final until the legislative districts are again reapportioned in accordance herewith."
- Sec. 2. The following statement shall be printed on the ballot with the amendment as a whole:

"Explanatory statement. The purpose of this amendment is to eliminate the adjustment of census taken by the United States census bureau regarding nonresident military personnel and nonresident students when reapportioning the Kansas senate and house of representatives.

"A vote for this proposition would eliminate the adjustment of census taken by the United States census bureau regarding nonresident military personnel and nonresident students when reapportioning the Kansas senate and house of representatives.

"A vote against this proposition would continue in effect the requirement for the adjustment of census taken by the United States census bureau regarding nonresident military personnel and nonresident students when reapportioning the Kansas senate and house of representatives."

Sec. 3. This resolution, if approved by two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the Senate, and two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the House of Representatives shall be entered on the journals, together with the yeas and nays. The secretary of state shall cause this resolution to be published as provided by law and shall cause the proposed amendment to be submitted to the electors of the state at the general election in November in the year 2019, unless a special election is called at a sooner date by concurrent resolution of the legislature, in which case it shall be submitted to the electors of the state at the special election.

KAR 86-1-10 revises definitions, distance education standards, instructor requirements and renewal dates for courses of instruction approved by KREC. The changes proposed in this regulation should have no economic impact on any regulated entities.

KAR 86-1-11 revises standards and curriculum for courses approved by KREC. The revisions include adding a requirement to use an approved outline for the "Kansas real estate management course," repealing the "broker core," renaming the "salesperson/broker core" to "Kansas required core" course and allowing for a maximum of three hours of continuing education credit during a renewal period to be earned by attending a KREC meeting.

The changes proposed in this regulation should have no economic impact on any regulated entities.

**KAR 86-1-12** clarifies procedures for monitoring and withdrawing approval of approved courses. The changes proposed in this regulation should have no economic impact on any regulated entities.

KAR 86-1-13 and 86-1-16 repeal obsolete language related to education standards. The changes proposed in these regulations will have no economic impact.

KAR 86-1-17 revises certain responsibilities of schools who offer approved courses. This includes issuance of certificates to students, submission of electronic course rosters and advertising requirements. The changes proposed in this regulation should have no economic impact on any regulated entities.

KAR 86-1-18, 86-3-6a and 86-3-20 repeal obsolete language due to the passage of 2019 SB 60. The changes proposed in these regulations will have no economic impact.

KAR 86-3-7 defines advertisement or advertising as it pertains to real estate license law and clarifies advertising requirements for affiliated licensees of a supervising broker contained in K.S.A. 58-3086. Any licensee who must change their advertising to comply with this proposed regulation could be financially impacted. In discussions with industry, it appears the major change that would require expenditure of resources is the requirement for the licensee's name or team name to be adjacent to the brokerage name. Since this only applies to digital advertisements, any costs should not be significant.

**K.A.R. 68-2-5. Pharmacist-in-charge; notice to board.** This regulation is being amended to clarify the requirements for notifying the Board of resignation as a pharmacist-in-charge of a pharmacy, including the opportunity to provide earlier notification.

**K.A.R. 68-5-16. Ratio of pharmacy technicians to pharmacists.** This regulation is being amended to increase the ratio of pharmacy technicians to pharmacists in the pharmacy from 3:1 to 4:1.

### **Summary of Economic Impact**

It is the mission of the Board to ensure that all persons practicing pharmacy are properly licensed and registered, and to ensure compliance with Kansas statutes regarding proper compounding, storage, and dispensing of prescription drugs, maintenance of professional standards, and proper manufacture, distribution, and sale of prescription and nonprescription drugs. Thus, the Board is proposing these regulatory changes.

The Board anticipates minimal impact on business activities or growth. KAR 68-2-5 is merely a clarification of current Board operating practice and no economic impact is anticipated. KAR 68-5-16 sets the maximum number of pharmacy technicians that can be working in a pharmacy under the supervision of one on-duty pharmacist. If technicians have passed a certification exam approved by the Board (now required for all technicians within two years of entry into the profession), the pharmacy will be able to employ four technicians instead of three for each supervising pharmacist. The Board anticipates many pharmacies will choose to operate at the increased ratio allowing more help within the pharmacy and a potential increase in the number of employees staffed during shifts. Any economic impact would be specifically related to the cost of staffing and cost/benefit of increased production depending on how pharmacies choose to operate and would be impossible to quantify. There is no mandate that pharmacies operate at the increased ratio or make any change resulting from these amendments.

### Article 21.—WESTERN KANSAS GROUNDWATER MANAGEMENT DISTRICT NO. 1

**5-21-7.** (Authorized by K.S.A. 82a-706a and K.S.A. 82a-1028, as amended by L. 2002, Ch. 137, § 5; implementing K.S.A. 82a-1028, as amended by L. 2002, Ch. 137, § 5 and K.S.A. 2001 Supp. 82a-1903, as amended by L. 2002, Ch. 137, § 7; effective Jan. 24, 2003; revoked Nov. 15, 2019.)

### Article 25.—BIG BEND GROUNDWATER MANAGEMENT DISTRICT NO. 5

- **5-25-2. Well spacing.** (a) With the exception of those wells described in subsection (b), the minimum spacing of all wells described in an application to appropriate water for beneficial use, other than those wells for domestic use, shall be 1,320 feet from the following:
- (1) All other non-domestic wells and proposed nondomestic wells that carry an earlier priority; and
  - (2) baseflow nodes.

Non-domestic wells shall be 660 feet from all existing domestic wells, except those domestic wells owned by the applicant.

- (b)(1) Each replacement well drilled within 300 feet of the originally authorized point of diversion shall be exempt from the well spacing requirement of subsection (a).
- (2) Each non-domestic well that proposes the withdrawal of groundwater from the Dakota aquifer or any bedrock aquifer shall be one mile from all other wells withdrawing groundwater from the same formation, including domestic wells, except those domestic wells owned by the applicant.
- (3) Each new well that enables the establishment of augmentation in the Rattlesnake creek subbasin pursuant to K.S.A. 82a-706b, and amendments thereto, in relation to other wells that enable or provide augmentation shall be exempt from the well spacing requirement of subsection (a). (Authorized by K.S.A. 82a-706a and K.S.A. 2018 Supp. 82a-1028; implementing K.S.A. 82a-706a and K.S.A. 2018 Supp. 82a-1028; effective May 1, 1980; amended April 19, 1996; amended Oct. 31, 2003; amended Nov. 15, 2019.)
- **5-25-4.** Sustainable yield. (a) Except as specified in subsections (b) and (c), the entire district shall be closed to further new surface water and groundwater appropriations.
- (b) The following types of applications shall be exempt from the closure of the district to new appropriations of water described in subsection (a):
  - Domestic use;
  - (2) temporary permits;
- (3) applications for a change in the point of diversion for which the diversion works have been completed under the original approved application;
  - (4) standby wells used for emergency purposes only;

- (5) permits to appropriate 15 acre-feet of water or less per year that are exempt pursuant to K.A.R. 5-25-15;
- (6) term permit applications of one year or less and those term applications meeting the requirements of K.A.R. 5-25-13;
  - (7) permits to appropriate water from a bedrock aquifer;
- (8) permits to appropriate water from the Dakota aquifer if the applicant can show either of the following:
- (A) No Pleistocene aquifer exists within 5,280 feet of the proposed well location; or
- (B) there is a significant difference in hydraulic head between the Pleistocene aquifer and the Dakota aquifer;
- (9) an application that proposes to use water in a manner so that there is no significant consumptive use of the local source of supply either in quantity or availability of water for use by other appropriators;
- (10) any application that will enable or provide augmentation in the Rattlesnake creek subbasin pursuant to K.S.A. 82a-706b and amendments thereto, except that no application shall be approved if the application would impair an existing use. The proposed well location shall meet the spacing requirements of K.A.R. 5-25-2; and
  - (11) any application filed pursuant to K.A.R. 5-25-22.
- (c)(1) For each application for a change in the point of diversion, if the diversion works have not been completed, the application shall be exempt from the closure to new appropriations specified in subsection (a). However, the proposed appropriation, when added to the vested rights, prior appropriation rights, earlier priority applications, term permits for more than a year, and all baseflow node allocations within a two-mile-radius circle whose center is the location of the proposed well, shall not exceed 1,500 acre-feet. It shall be assumed for purposes of analysis that all prior applications, permits, certificates, and vested rights are being fully exercised and that all limitation clauses listed on permits and certificates are in force.
- (2) If part of the area within the two-mile-radius circle around the proposed well location is outside the district boundaries, the 1,500 acre-feet quantity of water specified in paragraph (c)(1) shall be reduced proportionately by the percentage of the circle lying outside of the district boundaries. Only the baseflow node allocations, vested rights, prior appropriations, earlier priority applications, and term permits for more than one year assigned to wells within the portion of the circle within the district shall be considered.
- (3) If all of the wells authorized under a vested right or an application are not included inside the circumference of the circle, then a reasonable quantity shall be allocated to each well based upon the best available information.
- (4) Each analysis for an application for a change in the point of diversion specified in subsection (c) shall include all applications with a priority earlier than the priority established by the filing of the application for change. (Authorized by K.S.A. 82a-706a and K.S.A. 2018 Supp. 82a-1028; implementing K.S.A. 82a-706, K.S.A. 82a-706a, K.S.A. 2018 Supp. 82a-708b, and K.S.A. 2018 Supp. 82a-1028; effective May 1, 1980; amended May 1, 1981; amended, T-86-4, March 22, 1985; amended May 1, 1986; amended May 1, 1987; amended May 1, 1988; amended April 19, 1996; amended March 16, 2001; amended Oct. 31, 2003; amended Nov. 15, 2019.)

- **5-25-22.** Movement of water rights affecting streamflow at Rattlesnake creek. (a) To improve streamflow at the zenith gage on Rattlesnake creek, otherwise known as United States geological survey gage #07142575, each vested or certified water right located within zone D of the division of water resources' map titled "Rattlesnake creek streamflow response regions," dated February 14, 2018, hereby adopted by reference, and subsequently referred to in this regulation as "response map," shall be eligible to offset new appropriations of water located within the district if all of the following conditions are met:
- (1) The source of water supply for the currently authorized well is located within zone D of the response map.
- (2) The rate and quantity of the existing water right are the maximum rate and quantity available for the new application. The rate and quantity of a new application for irrigation use shall be determined under K.A.R. 5-5-11. A new application may change the use made of water. However, the new application shall not allow for an increase in the net consumptive use greater than the existing water right under K.A.R. 5-5-3.
- (3) The water right has reported use between January 1, 2003 and December 31, 2012, and the reported use is equal to or greater than 50 percent of the authorized use in at least two years. Each water right enrolled in a state or federal conservation program during this period that required the voluntary cessation of water use shall be eligible for movement under this regulation if all other requirements are met and the applicant demonstrates the existing water right's ability to pump at least 50 percent of authorized use during any year.
- (4) The new location will reduce the impact at the zenith gage by 30 percent or more compared to the current location of the well as determined by the response map. The new location is in an area with less than 40 percent impact at the zenith gage as determined by the response map.
- (5) The average saturated thickness in the two-mile-radius circle in which the proposed well will be located is greater than 40 feet as shown on the saturated thickness map in K.A.R. 5-25-19. However, additional site-specific information, including data from more recently drilled wells or test holes, may be submitted to demonstrate that the average saturated thickness is greater than 40 feet.
- (6) The water level within the two-mile-radius circle surrounding the proposed well location has not declined more than five percent from the predevelopment water level as shown in the relevant Kansas geological survey bulletins, including bulletin numbers 65, 80, 88, 120, 205, and 206. Any applicant may submit additional site-specific information, including data from more recently drilled wells or test holes, to demonstrate that the area has not declined more than five percent from the predevelopment water level.
- (7) The new location will meet the safe-yield analysis based on a two-mile-radius circle with a recharge rate of 2.25 inches and 75 percent available for appropriation pursuant to K.A.R. 5-3-11 or a safe-yield analysis utilizing modeling as completed by the applicant or district.
- (8) No other well has previously been authorized by the chief engineer to be relocated within a one-mile radi
  (continued)

us of the proposed well location under this regulation, or the applicant demonstrates that the proposed well will not impair existing water rights.

- (9) All other statutory and regulatory requirements for approval of a new appropriation of water for a beneficial use that do not conflict with this regulation are met.
- (b) Any new application may request the movement of the entire existing water right to a new location, the movement of an entire existing water right to multiple locations, or the movement of a partial amount of the existing water right to a new location.
- (1) Upon approval of any application under this regulation and the completion of diversion works and the application of water to a beneficial use at each new location, the dismissal of the entire existing water right shall be required except for the portion, if any, remaining in the original location. If the location of a new application is determined to be unfeasible after filing an application, the applicant may submit a new application for another location if diversion works have not been completed and water has not been applied to a beneficial use at the previously proposed location.
- (2) If any portion of the existing water right remains in the original location, then the water right owner shall file an application to divide the water right proportionally

- based on the quantity that will remain and the quantity that will be dismissed to offset each new appropriation before submitting a new application to appropriate water in the district.
- (3) For any quantity of the existing water right that remains in the original location, the place of use shall be reduced to the number of acres that can reasonably be irrigated under K.A.R. 5-3-24. This reduction shall be calculated by dividing the remaining quantity of water by the county value according to K.A.R. 5-3-24 to establish the number of acres that can reasonably be irrigated.
- (4) A separate application shall be required for each different location that a portion of the existing water right is proposed to offset.
- (c) Upon the establishment of a new appropriation under this regulation, the quantity of water dismissed to offset the new appropriation shall not be available for reappropriation in the previous or original location of the water right. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 82a-706a and K.S.A. 2018 Supp. 82a-1028; effective Nov. 15, 2019.)
